

THE WORM PEST.

classists Say It is Not the Army Worn But the Common Bobtalled Cut Worm. Farmers and gardeners in Western

Oregon whose crops have been so much damaged recently by an army of worms, may not be much interested in knowing that the pest is not the army worm, as many suppose, but the variegated cutworm, a pest of no mean pretensions; but they will be interested in knowing that its ravages are not likely to be long ontinued.

Professor Piper, the entomologist of Washington Agricultural college, has been studying this nocturnal depredator. and finds that it is possible to resist it necessfully if the farmers are sufficiently enterprising. The most effective way to fight it he says is with Paris green. It


