MANILLA, July 30.—A banquet in commemoration of the amnesty proved a failure owing to a misunderstanding between the Filipinos tending it and the American civil and military authorities regarding the speeches.

After two hours' delay the banquet was finally finished. Commissioner Taft and Wright and General MacArthur were in attendance. No political speeches were made.

England, who has been ill at the Salem hospital for some time, and as soon as the identification took place he returned the patient to his comfortable quarters. Mr. England is very weak physically and not in a vigorous state mentally, owing to his long suffering. His host of old-time friends hope to see him recover at an early date.

Grand Circuit Races at Columbus.

COLUMBUS, O., July 30.—The Grand Circuit races opened here today with a fair-sized crowd in attendance. Coal Miners in Session.

HARTLEIGH, Pa., July 30.—The joint conference of United Mine Workers, embracing the entire anthracite coal region met here today and much interest in the program to be carried out is developing among the delegates. One of the principal matters that will come up for discussion is the adoption of some needed reforms without resorting to strikes.

Houses Will Come Into Court.

SIOUX CITY, Ia., July 30.—The case of House of the Sioux City Baseball Club, charged with assault with intent to do great bodily injury on the person of "Scrappy Bill" Wilson two weeks ago, will be called in the police court today. The matter has caused much talk in baseball circles and it is believed that the result of this case will have some effect in doing away with these disgruntled features of the ball field.

Military Festival at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 30.—The military festival under the auspices of Col. Hasendrabel Post, No. 13, which was arranged to take place at Lemps Concordia Park on May 14 and was postponed on account of the strike, which is in progress and the program, which is of a very pleasing nature, is being carried out with military precision. A crowd of many thousands are enjoying the festival.

Cardinal Gibbons at Westminster.

WESTMINSTER, England, July 30.—The dedication and opening of the new cathedral here on Sunday was one of the most prominent events that has taken place in England for a long time, and the occasion will long be remembered as one in which a most graceful and distinguished citizen of the United States, Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, on an invitation from Cardinal Herbert Vaughan, preached the dedicatory sermon in the forenoon.
