SALEM WATER SUPPLY

A DEEP WATER SUCTION BEING PLACED IN THE CRIB

The Salem Water Company Further Improves its New Crib For Supplying the Consumers of the City.

The Salem Water Company is pushing the work of improvement at its crib on the Minto gravel bar, and the work will be completed in the near future.

The complications sought to be overcome commenced on a Saturday evening, after an excessively hot day when an unusual volume of water had been used throughout the city for irrigating purposes and both pumps were worked to their full capacity. The low stage of the river had lowered the pressure from the outside which forces the water through the gravel into the crib, and on the day in question the water in the crib was lowered to the point where the suction created swirls and the pipe began to suck air. This air collected in the large water pipe which was so lightened that it floated to the surface of the water.

As soon as these conditions developed the whole force of water company employees was put to work at remedial measures. The pumping was checked temporarily; the air was drawn out of the pipe which then sank to its proper bed; and early Sunday forenoon the entire plant was again in good working order.

The disturbance of the pipe, however, and the churning caused by the air, stirred up all the sediment which had collected on the bottom of the long line of pipe from the crib to the pump. This was unavoidably pumped into the mains Sunday morning and gave rise to all sorts of notions among the consumers.

In order to understand how the company proposes to guard against such trouble in future it must be stated that the 24 inch pipe enters the crib some 12 or 14 feet from the bottom of the same. An elbow turned downward seven feet in length will now be put on the end of the pipe inside the crib. This will have exactly the same effect as raising the level of the river that much, as the lower the water is drawn in the crib, the greater becomes the "head" which forces water in through the filtering gravel.

It also gives a reserve supply of a body of water 20 x 60 feet and 7 feet deep, above the present available reserve in the crib. But however will cut little figure in comparison with the increased inflow which results from the lowering of the surface of the water in the crib. In the mean time, a double row of piping has been driven along the pipe from the crib to the pumping station and it has been securely fastened in place.

These are the improvements under way and they will prevent any further trouble and insure even better water in the future.

During the dinner hour the younger members of the party furnished sweet instrumental music, interspersed with vocal music by nature's sweetest songsters as they flitted about the branches of the large trees. After conversing upon reminiscences of the past, we were finally reminded that the younger guests were yet unversed, and so dispersed to other parts of the yard and house.

HEAVY TO HANDLE.

Girders for the Opera House Ceiling Weigh Six Tons Each. Put Up This Week.

The large girders to support the ceiling of the new opera house have been transferred to the site of the Odd Fellows' building by the Salem Truck & Dray Co., and A. T. Moffit, the house mover has the job of placing them in position.

Each girder when put together will be 58 feet long and will weigh six tons. The work of raising the three to the top of the second story of the building and placing them across the 56 foot opening of the opera house is quite an undertaking for the appliances at hand here, and will probably take all of this week.

These three pieces of iron work were made at the Pittsburgh works of Carnegie & Co., and were ordered through the Albany Iron Works.

It has probably cost more actual expenditure of labor to take them from the car on the depot switch and land them at the corner of High and Court street, than it did to load them on the cars in Pittsburgh and bring them to Salem, which illustrates the difference between doing things by main strength and doing them by steam power.

The contractors, Erison & Van Patton this morning obtained permission to close High street for part of the day on Monday Tuesday and Wednesday while the girders are being raised, to guard against possible accident from breaking tackle.

Three Convicts.

Frank Baker, Burt Griffith and Walter Ben were received at the penitentiary Saturday from Lincoln county. The last named will serve two years for larceny. Baker and Griffith have five years each for cattle stealing. It appears that for several years past cattle stealing and other depredations have been prevalent in the vicinity of Drift Creek. The neighborhood has suffered much from the operations of the gang, which was a sort of Jesse James variety. The events in the Toledo court show that Baker and Griffith were the guilty parties. Both have formerly served out sentences in the penitentiary.

Old Bridges Renewed.

Our county court, with the county court of Clackamas county, examined several joint bridges at the north end of the county last Friday. The Killan bridge across Butte creek was ordered repaired, and the Morris bridge, also across Butte creek was ordered rebuilt.

Threshing Has Commenced.

Reports are coming in from various parts of the county of the threshing machines starting up. The grain is in a good dry condition, thus facilitating the work, but there are no satisfactory reports as yet relative to the yield.

Prepared for the Worst.

CHICAGO, July 30.—Mrs. M. D. Woodward, of Evanston, when she wrote the last letter received by her husband from Pekin, was armed with a five-shot revolver. It was her intention, according to the letter, to use the first three cartridges on the assassinating Chinese.

Then, if with what other defenders were doing, the Boxers were not repulsed, she had decided to kill her daughter, Ione, with one of the remaining bullets, and shoot herself with the last, so they would not fall alive into the hands of the Boxers.

This piece of news was contained in the letter written by Mrs. Woodward, June 11, last, after she and her daughter had made futile attempts to escape from Pekin. They found, when they arrived at the depot, that so much of the track had been torn up it was impossible for them to depart, so they made their way with difficulty back to the legation.

PRINCE OF NAPLES HIS SUCCESSOR

By Associated Press to the Journal. KANSAS CITY, July 29.—Jerome Fedeli, Italian Vice-Consul, in Kansas City, was greatly shocked when he learned of the assassination of King Humbert of Italy.

"King Humbert was greatly beloved by his people," said Mr. Fedeli, "and I cannot conceive how anyone but a crank or an anarchist should wish to take his life. He was good and kind and charitable. I knew him well. He will be succeeded in all probability by his oldest son, the Prince of Naples, who is a young man, not yet 30 years old."

CORRECTION, July 30.—The new King of Italy is expected to arrive here tonight.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—The U. S. government has been officially notified of the succession of Prince Victor Emanuel to the throne of Italy. He is the son of the dead king.
