LATE HOP NEWS.

Reports of the Growth of Hops in the English Plantations.

For the week ending Wednesday, July 11th, 1900, are furnished by the Kentish Observer, of Canterbury, Kent, and presented with the compliments of M. H. Durr, of 47, Abchurch Lane, London, E.C. 4, England, resident agent in England for the Portland River Hops, of Vauxhall, London, E.C. 4, England.

Amford.—The rains have been plentiful and warmer, drier weather is now needed both for cultivation and for forcing the vines to grow. The vines are still troubleless, and washing is kept in check owing to the impossibility of getting on the ground with machines in the present sodden state of the soil. There is some mould at places, and the midsummer shoots do not at present look at all healthy or thriving.

Bridge and Neighborhood.—In the best cultivated grounds vine is going on well, but there is a good deal of weak vine about, some so weak that there can only be a light crop. There is a decrease of vermin where washing has been thoroughly done.

Boughton.—The vine has made little progress during the past week. Vermin abundant and washing continued. The irregularity of vine especially on poor ground is apparent. Altogether the prospect is not encouraging.

Chilham and Chatham.—Where the vine has not been washed there are plenty of lice, also in the washed grounds there are a lot left. Nigger are appearing. Mould seems as if it will be a bother this year.

Goldstone Next Wingham.—The hope which were first washed are going on well. Wet weather has hindered the cleansing process, and here the vine hangs a bit. On the whole there is nothing much to complain of.

Habbledown.—We have had quite enough rain, the new foliage showing a pale unhealthy color, and the growth has not made much progress during the past few days. The unwashed hops of which there are still a considerable quantity (partly owing to the inclement weather) are in a very critical state; even where thoroughly attended to, fresh fly and lice appear on the new growth. Mold is making rapid strides and cultivation is practically at a standstill. "Bucks" are set for bloom.

Isleham and Wickham.—The occasional spells of cold weather check the hops and there is not that abundance of laterals which we like to see by now. Notwithstanding the washing the vermin are very vigorous and mould, is still in evidence. A large proportion of the vine is very weak.

Littlebourne and Borksbourn.—The vine grows apace and midsummer shoots are strong and healthy. Vermin still persistent and washing has to be continued, though the frequent rain retard the work. A little mould is to be found, but nothing to cause alarm. There is not enough vine to grow a large crop. Cultivation is good in all grounds.

Pekham South and Waltham.—The vine has grown considerably lately, but is full of vermin, and mould is on the increase. A fresh deposit of fly has also appeared.

Wingham.—This continuous wet weather hinders cultivation and washing. The vermin is very persistent with fresh attacks. This and cold nights prevents the vine from making much headway.

Woodnesborough.—Where the hops are well cultivated they have made progress. When the weather permits, washing is in full swing, but the fly and lice are very persistent, especially where the hops are weak.

Hants.

Hop growers are fairly beaten this season by the continued wet weather. Although fly are decreasing the amount of lice is slowly and surely impoverishing the plants, and where not washed they are in a very bad way. One grower of fifty acres has only been able to wash on four days in the last fortnight, and no doubt others are in the same predicament. Crop prospects are very bad for the time of year, and unless fine weather sets in speedily so as the washing machines can be put to work prospects must grow worse, as the attack of blight is very bad indeed.

Biddenden.—The best washed and cultivated grounds are doing fairly well. There is a lot of backward weak vine, that does not get on. Warmer weather much wanted.

Canterbury.—Under the influence of the hot weather which has prevailed since Sunday the vine is making very good progress and the prospects have improved all around. There is very little vermin left.

Faversham District.—The strongest vine continues to make good progress, and is throwing out laterals in good style. Many places, especially those that are not well cultivated, are slack and uneven. A lot of washing has been done in all parishes, and the aphid attack appears to be decreasing in virulence. Mould has made its appearance, and sulphuring will be started in a few days.

St. Stephens.—There is very little improvement to report as to the state of the plantations in this parish. Vermen very persistent, and fresh fly are constantly coming.

Tenham.—The vine in this neighborhood has grown in spite of the cold nights, but there is a fresh attack of fly, and mould is to be found in nearly all grounds.

Rainham and Newington.—At the end of the week the vine in this district was evidently suffering from the effect of the March-like weather that had prevailed since Thursday, but now with the heat and sunshine there is marked improvement. A favorable change of wind is, however, much desired. There is still a great deal of vermin at places.

Wye and Boughton Almon.—The blight is very persistent and things have not improved on the whole. The vine has grown and the lice have multiplied. Mould threatens seriously.

Mid Kent.

Around Maidstone there is still a lot of vermin, but on the whole less than last week. The higher temperature of the last few days and the generally improved weather have had a marked effect on the vine, which is still, however, somewhat backward. There is mould showing in several grounds. At Bexley the vine has grown a good deal since the rains, and with the warmer and brighter weather of the present week it has assumed a much more healthy appearance. There is still some vermin in all grounds, but where washing has been done the vine is clean. The crop is not likely to be a large one. At Bearested the prospect is brighter, but washing has to be continued owing to the presence of lice. At Allington, Aylesford and Ditton, washing has got rid of most of the vermin, but mould has made its appearance and sulphuring will have to be done. At the Farleighs and the Barmings a check was given to the vine by the cold nights and rough

weather of last week, but since Sunday, with greatly improved conditions, the plants have made good progress, and are now looking healthy and strong. The same remarks apply to East and West Malling, East and West Peckham, the Tonbridge district, Paddock Wood, Brechley, and the North Kent district.

Sussex.
The vine in all the well framed grounds is growing vigorously, although at the end of the week, owing to the extremely cold and rough weather, it appeared to be at a standstill. Some grounds are still infested with vermin, while others are comparatively clean.

Worcester Hop Report.
Plantation reports vary considerably. In the best cultivated grounds where the blight has been kept under by persistent washing, the vine continues to make fair progress, and is now throwing out side shoots, but where neglected, no improvement is visible, and the severe vermin attack begins to tell upon the plant, which in many small grounds is consequently very poor and weakly. More business than usual at this season is being done in Worcesters, and 534 packets passed the public scales last week. Some growers are rather less inclined to sacrifice their hops at the unremunerative rates recently current, but values are not appreciably higher.—J. H. Meredith & Co., Worcester, July 9.

Americans Among the Bidders.

Montevideo, July 31.—The bids and specifications to be presented to the Hungarian government for consideration in connection with the extensive improvements in the harbor here, were closed today. Among those who have sent in bids for this work are several prominent American engineers and construction corporations. The project contemplates the expenditure of \$12,500,000 in gold in the immediate future, and there are large extensions of the plan held in reserve. The plans are prepared by the eminent engineer, Adolfo Guaran, and what is wanted at once is the construction of a canal, port, and anteport, up to at least seven and a half metres depth; docks, moles and breakwaters. The port revenues of Montevideo, amounting to a minimum of \$1,500,000 gold year, are pledged as security for the payment of the contractors. It will be a week or more before the contract will be awarded.

International Tennis Tournament.

Honolulu, N. J., July 31.—The international tennis tournament opened here today, and the grounds were crowded with enthusiastic admirers of this class of refined sport from both sides of the ocean. British visitors are very much in evidence, and the best players they have yet turned out will compete for the prizes. Canada is represented by the largest delegation of any foreign country. France and Germany are also represented by small delegations of players. The tournament will continue until Saturday. American players are present from San Francisco, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Philadelphia and many other cities. The tournament is for the Davis Challenge Cup.

May Be Satisfactorily Settled.

New York, July 31.—The trouble which sprang up about a month ago concerning the wage scale in the mills operated by the tin plate trust seems likely to be settled satisfactorily to both sides. A committee of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, are in conference today with the officials of the Tin Plate Trust, and a proposition for a settlement of the difficulty without resorting to a strike, will be presented.

Christian Workers Conference.
Boston, July 31.—The National Christian Workers' Union, after being in session here ten days, today closed its twelfth annual conference. The meeting was a very successful one and the attendance each day was large.

Epworth League at Lincoln.

Lincoln, Neb., July 31.—The Epworth League Assembly met in annual session here today. There is a larger attendance of League than has ever participated in any previous assembly in this district and the proceedings are of an especially interesting character.

Trust Lumber Mills Re-opened.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 31.—By order of the Puget Sound Timbermen's Association, the various camps in this association, after having been shut down since June 30, re-opened for business today. The cause of the camps shutting down was that the supply of logs at the various camps was much greater this year than in any season since 1892, there being over 113,000,000 feet to work up into lumber and shingles. It was decided not to start any of the camps until 40,000,000 feet of the logs could be sold, and this having been done, the order was given for the same to start this morning and the camps are all in operation with a full complement of men.

BREILIN, July 31.—The twenty-ninth annual meeting of the German Photographers' Association in session here, is said today to be the most interesting gathering in the association's history. The attendance is larger than on the opening day and this is accounted for by the fact that many of the delegates did not arrive until this morning. Indianapolis, Ind., July 31.—The national convention of the American Protective League opened here today. Arrangements will be made for establishing a league bank to be located at either Cincinnati, St. Louis, Chicago or this city. The decision will rest in favor of the city showing the largest paying membership, per capita.

Dr. Brown Will Speak in Paris.
PARIS, July 31.—Dr. Elmer E. Brown, professor of pedagogy in the University of California, is one of the speakers from abroad who will deliver an address before the International Congress of Secondary Education which opened here today. Nearly all countries have representatives present and the congress will not close until August 6th.
