Among the late historical romances none is attracting so much attention on the Pacific coast today as Eva Emery Dye's "McLaughlin and Old Oregon." As its title implies, the volume is most directly concerning Oregon and the early settlements on the Columbia and Willamette rivers. The volume can be found in every community, and is at present more discussed hereabouts than any other volume. The caller at Oregon's state capitol will find this rare chronicle on Governor Geer's private desk, where he confesses to stealing all the old moments he can to peruse its interesting pages. It will only be a matter of time when it will be in every school library, in fact in every family not only of Oregon, but of the entire Northwest.

The rugged, unmechanical variety that is well suited to a work of this kind, between flights of description she has wedged here and there facts that seem to fit, and among the most thrilling tales of adventure bits of historical data are interspersed with a magic that seems to narrate the narrative, but adds flavor to the story.
