LATE HOP NEWS.

Reports of The Growth of Hops in The English Plantations.

For the week ending Wednesday, July 18th 1900, are furnished by The Kenilworth Observer, of Canterbury, Kent, and presented with the compliments of M. H. Dunn, of 27, Ebra Road, Brighton, S. W., London, resident agent in England for The Broom River Hops, of Vaux County, California.

Ashford.—The change to warmer weather is all in favour of the hops, but there are many gardens in which the bine cannot possibly produce more than half a crop whatever the weather may be. There has been a fresh arrival of fly in the district since Sunday, and there are considerable deposits of lice on the bines as a result of the earlier visitation which could not be properly dealt with by washing owing to the unfavorable weather at the time. The prospects cannot be considered good for the time of year in any respect.

Boughton and Neighborhood.—The laterals are looking vigorous and the bine a good color. Washing is continued, vermin being abundant.

Bridge and Neighborhood.—Where no washing has been done, or where there has been only one washing, there is much vermin, and where they have been thoroughly done, there is some. In the latter case the bine is looking fairly healthy, but not in the former ones.

Chilham.—The hops have not done much the last few days the weather having been too cold. There is fresh fly to be found also mould at places.

Chilham and Chatham.—The bine has grown during the last week. Mould is on the increase, and hops unwashed are very bad.

Harbledown.—The bine makes progress where fairly clean. Lice still hang about even where washing has been persistently attended to. Honey dew is showing in even the cleanest grounds. Fly not so numerous, and mould seems checked. The bine at places is still black.

Hernhill.—The bine looks very well where it has been well washed, otherwise they are looking black and shining very much with honeydew. In these grounds the vermin increases fast and there is a tendency to mould.

Petham and District.—The hops that have been thoroughly washed are now doing well. Those that have been neglected in some grounds are in a very deplorable state with vermin and mould.

Sturry.—Hops in this district are fairly well off for the year, but are suffering from a very severe attack of vermin. Cultivation generally good. A little mould is to be found.

Thanet.—The hops are mostly short of bine excepting here and there a piece. They are full of fly and lice and washing is going on everywhere, but the fly continues to make its appearance. Certainly the foliage does not look as it should do, it is too dark in color and no brightness about it, and unless a sudden and great improvement takes place but a very short crop will be grown. Warm suns and a higher temperature at night are much required.

Wingham.—The bines are still infested with aphid, but under the genial weather of today (Tuesday), and drier grounds to get the washers at work, shall hope soon to see an improvement. There cannot any way be anything like the growth of last year, and it looks at present like growing about half of last year.

Woodnesborough.—The bine has grown where it has been well washed but the vermin still comes fresh, and it seems almost impossible to clean them. Washing will have to be continued in some gardens.

Canterbury.—Prospects have continued to improve, and the bine has developed very rapidly, the great heat being just what it needed. Most of the grounds have been washed, but there is still some vermin at places. Mould has entirely disappeared.

Rainham and Newington.—Washing still being carried on in many grounds, though most of the vermin has been got rid of. Under the influence of the hot weather the bine has increased in vigour.

Shieldwich, Faversham.—Bine increasing, lice decreasing, mould absent, weather right.

Wye and Boughton Aluph.—There are some very poor pieces of hops in these parishes, the blight having fairly mastered them. At the same time there are some good. At present the crop

looks like two-thirds of last year. The blight still hangs about in the best gardens, and there is also mould.

Mid Kent.

Around Maidstone the development of the laterals under the forcing temperature has been very satisfactory, and in all the best grounds the bine is looking vigorous and healthy. There is, however, a lot of vermin still remaining to be dealt with and washing is continually going on.

Very favorable reports come from Allington, Aylesford, and Ditton, while in the Farleigh and Barning districts all the washed grounds are stated to be looking well.

At Malling, East and West, and Mere-worth and West Peckham the bine where it has been well washed is improving daily, but the unwashed grounds are getting very foul and there is mould at places.

At Brentley, Paddock Wood, Capel and neighborhood the aphid blight is decreasing, especially where there has been vigorous washing, but as fresh fly continues to come the danger is not over.

At Yalding and district the intense heat has benefited the strong bine, but is proving too much for the weakly pieces. Vermin still lingers and some mould is to be seen.

Surrey.

Oxted.—Our hops continue to grow and the laterals come out very well, the hot weather being suitable. Vermin still clinging to the bines even where washed.

Sussex.

In the well-cultivated plantations the bine has considerably improved since last week, the growth being strong and the colour good. The vermin is evidently decreasing, though some of the unwashed pieces are looking queer, and will, it is feared, go into a black blight. The high temperature is bringing out the burr on the early sorts. There is a little mould, but not enough to necessitate sulphuring.

Worcester.

Trade has again become quiet for all classes of Worcesters. No hops passed the public scales here last week and values remain without alteration. Under the beneficial influence of more favorable weather, the bine in the well cultivated and thoroughly well washed plantations, is making good progress, laterals are well developed and pin showing for burr on the earlier. But where the bine is slack and washing neglected or only half done, the plant has almost stopped growing, and in such cases the result must be very unsatisfactory, and materially reduce the average yield of the coming crop.
