Answer Filed.
F. R. Anson, formerly manager of the Salem Light & Traction Company, this afternoon filed his answer in the suit brought by the London & San Francisco Bank to foreclose its mortgage on the Salem street railway and electric light plants. He alleges that he is the owner of certain personal property valued at \$4,455, upon which the bank wrongfully claims to have a mortgage; that he loaned part of this property to the Salem Light & Traction Company; that the use of the property is worth \$200 per month from June 1, 1898; that he should have return of his property, and that the rental should be a lien upon the Traction Company's property prior to the lien of the bank's mortgage. The London & San Francisco bank claims that all the property in question is owned by the Salem Light & Traction Company, and that it is subject to the bank's mortgage.

Boy Arrested.
A small boy by the name of Charley Wiley was arrested today on a warrant out of Justice O'Donald's court, issued on complaint of Joe Bartoz. The parties live in East Salem, and it is alleged that the boy has been firing shots at Bartoz's wife. The trial was to take place at 3 p. m.

Remains Shipped.
The remains of C. A. Galarneau, who died at the asylum Wednesday, aged 35 years, were shipped to Portland today by Rigdon & Clough, undertakers.

From Baker City.
Rev. Verhang has been appointed Dean of Washington, Yamhill and Tillamook counties.

The parishoners of St. Francis Catholic church assembled at the pastoral residence to bid farewell to Rev. Father Verhang who is to take charge of the parish at Verboort, Washington county. He has been appointed dean and the territory over which he will have supervision includes Washington, Yamhill and Tillamook counties.

Rev. Father Verhang has been in charge of St. Francis parish for nearly seven years. The new parish to which Father Verhang has been assigned was settled on by a Dutch colony 27 years ago by Rev. Father Verboort, from whom the place was named. It is a very prosperous community and has a large Catholic congregation. The departure of Father Verhang is much regretted by the Catholics of Baker City as well as by many outside the church. His successor has not yet been made public but it is said that Rev. Father Demare, of Portland has been chosen.

Two Oregon Cadets.

Thos. W. Hammond, of Ashland, has been named by Senator Geo. W. McBride as a cadet for West Point Military Academy. Thomas Hammond is a student 20 years of age and has been a student of the Oregon University at Eugene. The examination for entrance to West Point will take place in March next. Official announcement of the appointment has not been made yet but doubtless will be very soon.

The army reorganization bill passed at the recent session of Congress provided for a large increase in the number of cadets at West Point, permitting two additional appointments from each state. The appointment of a son of Ex-Gov. W. P. Lord, to one of the two places open to Oregon boys was recently announced, he having been recommended by Senator Simon.

One Thrashing Report.

The crop on the Thos. Walker farm on Salem prairie has been threshed and 90 acres produced 600 bushels of wheat. It was on clover sod. The best yields reported are from fields that were stubbed in.
