PROGRESSIVE VIEWS.

TAKEN ABOUT HANDLING PUBLIC FUNDS BY A SALEM BANKER.

Suggests a Change in Disposition of State Money—Prospects for a Good Crop of Hops.

A. T. Gilbert, of Gilbert Bros., bankers at Salem and Moscow, Idaho, takes progressive views of public finance. He was instrumental in securing the adoption of the public school savings bank at Salem, and has favored the popular loan funding plan. He was at Portland Sunday and in an interview he said money was very plentiful at the state capital as farmers and stockmen nearly all have deposits to their credit and interest is consequently low. Borrowing on personal application, without security, has fallen into disuse of late, and loans now are mostly made on the basis of property security, and finances have therefore assumed a more stable foundation than formerly.

The state also has a good deal of money to loan, but as there are a good many restrictions to be complied with, on the part of borrowers, property owners have not been very eager to borrow from the state, preferring to deal with banks or private capitalists, who do not demand that the land shall be three times the value of the loan, without the buildings and improvements. The state has heretofore been a little to free in making loans on farm property, he thought, and as a consequence has farm lands in every county on its hands. He thinks the idle money to the credit of the school fund, which now must be nearly \$500,000, should be made available for the general fund, as a deficiency is beginning to be noticeable in this latter fund, and by the time the Legislature meets again state warrants to an amount equaling the idle moneys in the school fund will be drawing 6 per cent interest. In other words, the state should not be paying interest on \$500,000 when it has that amount locked up in its vaults.

"The hopraisers of Marion county are happy, and they are now arranging to pick their crops as soon as ripe although a few weeks ago they talked of letting the hops go by default. Hopbuyers have been around among them, offering to contract for 9 and 10 cents, and as the hops can be put into the bale for 6 cents the prospects are good for a small margin of profit to the grower. The hop crop of Marion county is likely to be heavy this year, and the quality will be first-class.

H. B. CONDIT INJURED.

Truck Loaded With 700 Lbs. of Flour Falls Upon Him.

H. B. Condit, brother of A. O. Condit of this city, was badly injured at West Stayton, Saturday. Mr. Condit, who is agent for the Southern Pacific Company at West Stayton was engaged in moving some flour from the depot to the cars and in so doing was using a common truck and had the same loaded with about 700 pounds of flour, and when he wheeled upon the gang plank one end of it slipped off the platform.

Mr. Condit was thrown to the ground below, a distance of about 6 feet. His head struck the platform, which rendered him unconscious, and the truck and flour fell upon him. In the fall, Mr. Condit had the misfortune to have three of his ribs broken. He was picked up by helping hands and placed on the train and taken to Silverton, where Dr. Frank Brooks the S. P. doctor at that place was called and Mr. Condit was found to be still unconscious.

Dr. Brooks attended the injured man until they arrived at Woodburn and from there Dr. McCorkle accompanied him to Portland where he was taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital.

Mr. Condit is 42 years of age and it was a pretty hard jolt for him, but though badly bruised up he will recover.

The Smith Funeral.

The funeral of the late Luke Smith who was accidentally killed Friday was held from the home of the deceased near Gervais Sunday afternoon. People were present from all over the county and the procession to the cemetery was a mile and a quarter long of vehicles alone.

The sermon at the house was brief, but Rev. Brouillette conducted an impressive ceremony at the grave. There were people present from all over the county.

Although Mr. Smith was not a member of any church, there was a large attendance of his Catholic neighbors, and the Catholic choir of Gervais presented the deceased with a beautiful floral emblem.

Mr. Smith's sister, Mrs. Shields of Spokane did not arrive in time for the funeral but came today.

Deceased leaves a large farm and considerable property. He was not a member of any lodge and his death being so sudden he had prepared no will. In 1897 he was married to Miss Florence Esson, but leaves no children. Mrs. Smith is in delicate health but has stood the shock with great fortitude.

THE SCHOOL LOAN.

SUBSCRIPTIONS REACH AN AGGREGATE OF \$46,400. BOOKS CLOSED.

Board of Directors Order the Apportionment of \$30,000. All Large Subscriptions Shut Out.

The board of directors of the Salem school district held a meeting Saturday evening, at the office of School Clerk Joseph Baumgartner, all the directors being present excepting H. A. Johnson, who was out of town.

Some routine business was transacted and the subscriptions to the popular loan which closed at 3 p. m. were considered. The subscriptions were found to amount \$46,400, exceeding the amount required, \$30,000, by more than 50 per cent.

It was decided that in awarding the loan, all subscriptions made by the same persons, and not plainly distinguishable as being for different parties, would be considered as one subscription. This was to carry out the spirit of the intention to fill the smallest subscriptions first, scattering the loan among as many small holders as possible.

It will be seen by the list of subscriptions that this will shut out all items of over \$500. The subscriptions of \$500 and less aggregate \$28,900, and there are three of \$600. This is "on the face of the returns." If some of the smaller ones are lumped and rejected it will raise the limit.

A SAD JOURNEY.

Mont. Berry Died of Blood Poisoning in Eugene

Last Friday Eugene Evening Guard, Saturday: Montgomery Berry, an employee of the Oregon Hospital for the Insane, died at the Minnesota hotel in this city from blood poisoning, having reached here from John Hill's, 45 miles up the Middle Fork, after a continuous ride since 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon in a futile attempt to save his life.

The circumstances of the affair are most distressing. Berry and his wife were members of a party which left Turner about a week ago for an outing at Odell and Crescent lakes. Two or three days ago Berry blistered one hand on a rope, but gave the matter no attention. Yesterday morning he knocked off the blister and shortly afterward the hand began to turn dark, and pains extended up the arm. He hired a man to bring him to Eugene for medical treatment, as it was evident that blood poisoning had set in. They left John Hill's at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the injured man, his faithful wife and driver. They drove constantly all night and arrived in Eugene about 9:30 this morning, and Berry was taken to the Minnesota hotel, where he expired about 30 minutes later. He was not thought to be in such a bad condition when he arrived, as they stopped on the street for awhile looking for a good room and Berry talked with a number of people who happened along.
