3000 CHINESE ARE KILLED

By Russian Soldiers Fighting About Tasi Chow.

VICEROY TAO TAI OF NEW CHWANG REFUSES TO SURRENDER HIS FORTS

Gen. Chaffee Gives Plans of the Allied Attack Sunday-- American and English Soldiers Predominate in Numbers.

3000 CHINESE KILLED

LONDON, Aug. 7.--Russians who have been fighting around Tasi Chow, are reported to have killed 3,000 Chinese.

Tao Tai, of New Chwang, has refused the Russian demand to give up the forts there. The Fourth brigade of Indian troops have been ordered to China.

HEAVY FIGHTING IS EXPECTED

By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.--The war department has received the following from Chaffee:

"Tien Tsin, Aug. 3.--A conference today decided on a battle Sunday. The Chinese are entrenched east and west through Pei Tsang. The rest of the Chinese are protected by flooded ground practically unassailable. The Japanese, English and American forces, about 10,000 strong, will attack the Chinese right west of river in flank. The Russian and French forces about 4,000 strong, are on the opposite side between the river and the railroad. Our force is 2,000 and battery. The Sixth cavalry were left at Tien Tsin for guard and awaiting mounts. Ministers were safe on the 28th of July."

The above dispatch of Chaffee, written before the battle of Sunday, confirms the dispatches received yesterday concerning the attack on the Chinese at Pei Tsang. Chaffee's dispatch dated Friday was not sent from Che Foo until today, an inexplicable delay. The most interesting feature of the dispatch is the information regarding the positions of Chinese army and the fact that the advance upon Pekin is made by two columns, one on each side of the Pei Ho river.

It is evident that the foreign commanders do not underestimate the task before them as a thorough reconnaissance of the Chinese position has been made. The present objective point of the column is Yang Tsung. This is a town about 15 miles beyond Pei Tsang, where the railroad crosses the Pei river. Once in possession of this point the international forces would have both the river and the railroad in its rear for keeping open communication with Tien Tsin.

Without a doubt after the fight at Pei Tsang, the Chinese force, if the report of Admiral Remy that it was forced to retreat proves correct, retired to Yang Tsung. The general feeling at the war department is that unless the Chinese generals are completely demoralized by the Pei Tsang attack, there is some severe fighting ahead for the international forces, and the ground will be disputed all the way to Pekin.

ENGLAND SUGGESTS AN ULTIMATUM

By Associated Press to the Journal. LONDON, Aug. 7.--The parliamentary secretary of foreign office, in the house of commons said that her Majesty's government had informed the Chinese government that its members will be held personally responsible if the members of the foreign legations or other foreigners at Pekin suffer injury.

Broderick added that Her Majesty's government did not think any useful purpose would be served by further communications.

RECRUITS AND GUNS START FOR CHINA

YELLOW FEVER IN MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.--Consul Thompson, at Progreso, Mexico, informs the state department that yellow fever is on the increase there and is virulent at Mirida, Yucatan.

YELLOWSTONE PARK BLAZING WITH FIRE

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 7.--Fire is raging in the Yellowstone National park. It is being fought by every soldier in the park and by all the men engaged in road construction work. In United States Marshal Jackson's opinion it will be impossible for the force engaged to make any headway against the fire. The fire is now under control. A heavy rain and hailstorm stayed the progress of the fire.

TURKISH CLAIMS PUSHED AGAIN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.--Reports from Constantinople that Grisco, the American charge is renewing the request for the settlement of the American claims are due to original instructions from Washington.

These instructions were that the matter be pressed continuously about every fortnight in order that there might be no lapse of negotiations. Grisco appears to be keeping up the semi-monthly reminder with great regularity.

MEMORIAL FUNERAL FOR KING HUMBERT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.--A memorial funeral will be held in Washington, August 10, in honor of King Humbert. President McKinley has signified his purpose of being present.

GEN. MILES TURNED DOWN

NOT WANTED IN THE CHINESE WAR SERVICE.

No Good Reasons Given, But Our Greatest General Is Kept at Home--Miles Assists in Chaffee's Work

By Associated Press to the Journal. New York, Aug. 7.--A special to the Herald from Washington says:

It is learned, on excellent authority, that General Nelson A. Miles has recently applied for service in China. His application was not granted. War Department officials say that General Chaffee was sent to China to command the American troops, and to relieve him at this time would be a reflection upon his conduct of affairs.

Friends of General Miles say that General Miles, in addition to his experience and ability, has the rank to meet the commanding officers of other troops upon the same footing. They even go so far as to assert that General Miles' reputation would go far toward causing the commanders of other columns to defer to his judgment, and the result would be a more effective co-operation.

General Miles declines to discuss the attitude of the War Department upon his application, though he admitted that he had indicated his willingness to serve in the far East. He thinks the situation in China is most serious, and, setting aside all questions of his own wishes, he is making every effort to equip General Chaffee's command to stand the rigorous duty.

SHUTTING DOWN BIG IRON WORKS

CLEVELAND, Aug. 7.--At a meeting of the Bessemer Association yesterday it was decided, with the object of preventing another decline in the price of pig iron, that all the furnaces producing Bessemer pig iron should go out of blast September 1, with the exception of furnaces of the Brier Hill Iron Company and the M. F. Andrews-Hitchcock Co., at Youngstown, Ohio. The members of the Bessemer Association say this step is necessary. Not a ton of this iron has been contracted in several weeks, and, notwithstanding a reduction of \$8 a ton in the price, it cannot be sold. It is hoped that the shut-down will result in a restoration of prices by working off the surplus stock.

EMBALMED BEEF FOR OUR SOLDIERS
