LEARNING TO SMILE.

One of the Hardest Things For the Gymnast to Do.

"The thing I found hardest to learn in my business was to smile," said a professional gymnast who did a very clever specialty recently at one of the local theaters. "I started out in acrobatic work when I was only 15 years old as one of a 'family' of five. My instructor was Charles McDonald, an old time circus performer and one of the best of his day. While he was putting me through my paces he was continually yelling: 'Look pleasant! Look pleasant!' And my main trouble for years was in following that same order."

"No matter how hard I tried I would forget myself, and when I was doing an extra hard 'turn' I was certain to make horrible faces, screw up my eyes and grit my teeth. It took all the effect out of my act and must have seemed very funny to the people in the audience. Often, after performing some difficult feat, I have been mortified to hear a roar of laughter, and at last I determined to either learn how to smile or quit the business. I got the knack at last, and now it has become a sort of second nature."

"The point is a great deal more important than one would suppose. I know an equilibrist, for instance, who is very popular on the vaudeville circuit, not so much on account of the difficulty of his act as the smiling ease with which it is apparently done. You would never suppose from his face that he was making any special exertion, and that of itself gives remarkable grace and finish to his work."

"I am not the only one in the business, however, who has found it hard to smile at the right time. Almost every ballet dancer, eccentric character dancer and skirt dancer has had trouble on the same score. Most of them finally acquire a horrible fixed grimace that is supposed to be a smile, but has no more suggestion of merriment than a brick wall. It is produced by cultivating a certain set of muscles and made to appear and disappear on the principle of pulling a string."—New Orleans Times Democrat.

North Atlantic Squadron.

Portland, Me., Aug. 8.—The vessels of the North Atlantic squadron, under command of Admiral Farquhar, sailed from this port this morning for Rockland. During the cruise of the squadron in Maine waters Admiral Farquhar, under orders from the navy department will enlist as many seamen as possible for service in the navy and fill up the complements of the several ships all of which are considerably short of their number, the squadron acting as a movable recruiting station. The fleet is composed of the cruiser New York, battleships Kentucky, Indiana, Massachusetts, Texas and Kearsarge.

To Stop Gigantic Political Grab.

New York, Aug. 8.—A meeting of the stockholders of the Republican Loan and Savings Association was called to order at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, at 31 Broadway. This association was recently thrown into the hands of a receiver by Bank Examiner Kilburn. Although the association has its main office and place of business within hailing distance of the Supreme Court building in New York City, the Republican machinery took the application for a receiver to another county, where there was a Republican judge, and in due course of time, notwithstanding interdicted experts were produced and fortified with facts, proved conclusively it was solvent, it was placed in the hands of partisan receivers. The receivers are entitled to five percent of the assets of the association and liberal attorneys' fees and other expenses. It is a well-known fact that in this State there is practically nothing ever left after the receivers get through with any property placed in their hands. It is "disposed of," too, within the bounds of the law. The stockholders who met today represent six thousand members, chiefly located in New York. They are determined that in this case the vast property of their association, aggregating over one million dollars, shall not be wiped out by receivers. They have arranged a program for today's meeting which provides for the removal, by resignation and reorganization, of all the features that were not in accordance with the views of the bank examiner. This done they will petition for the removal of the temporary receivers and take into their hands the continuance or voluntary liquidation of the affairs of the association. In this way they expected to pay one hundred cents on the dollar.

The association membership is largely composed of church people and school teachers, and they have taken the matter in their own hands and are vigorously agitating it.

Where Everything Grows.
