St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 11.—In answer to a call from the Missouri State Barbers' Protective Association for a State convention of barbers, to take action regarding the State barbers' law, many barbers from all parts of the State will be here to-morrow to attend such a meeting. As the law now stands it only effects barbers in St. Louis, Kansas City and St. Joseph. Owing to the fact that barbers in these cities are required to pass an examination in workmanship and their technical knowledge, the country barbers say incompetent men pass from the cities out into the country, thereby injuring their business.

PRICE FOR PICKING.

Indications are That Forty Cents Per Box Will be Paid Hoppickers.

Mac Smith, who is now traveling over this county contracting and selling supplies to the hop growers says the hop yards are all looking fine and that some growers have contracted this year's crop at 9 and 10 cents. In the vicinity of Butteville, the growers expect to pay forty cents per box for picking. While in other parts of the county some growers think they can secure their pickers for 35 cents.

Mr. Smith says he believes the growers will conclude to pay the regular price for picking and says from what he can learn it will be a difficult matter for growers to obtain all the help necessary to harvest their crop, unless the regular price is paid, which is 40 cents per box. Advice from Independence indicates that the hopyard owners and their agents are busy making engagements for pickers. Picking will commence shortly after September 1, in some yards. The price for picking has not yet been agreed upon, but it is thought that it will not be less than 35 cents a box.

There is a meeting of the Oregon Hoppickers Association at Butteville today at which it will probably be decided what price the members of the association will pay.

The Fuggle hop is now ready to harvest and picking will begin in some yards in a few days. Al. Jerman, who runs a large hop yard on Howell Prairie, has 14 acres of Fuggle hops that are ready to pick, but will not start in on them until August 25.

He also has about seventy acres of late hops and says they are doing well and that this weather keeps down the lice. In his section he says the hop crop is not as large as last year, but if the good weather continues they will be able to save their entire crop. In his yard they pick by weight at the rate of 80c per hundred pounds, and from experience in the past he believes it is the only way to be safe in harvesting the crop.

James Finny of Brooks has 30 acres that will be ready to harvest by September 1, and says his yard is looking well.

THE NEW GAME BIRD.

Marion County Rod Gun Club Will Buy Fourteen Pairs.
At the meeting of the Marion County Rod and Gun Club, Friday evening, steps were taken to secure some of the English partridges which are about to be imported to this state. An assessment of \$1 was levied on each member of the Club, and the general public will also be invited to subscribe.

The deputy game warden at Portland was notified that the Club will take 14 pairs of the birds, which will cost about \$6 per pair.

Dr. J. C. Griffith, E. C. Croes and T. O. Barker were appointed a committee to receive the shipment of greyling and brook trout, which are expected here shortly for distribution among the brooks and streams of Marion county.

Foreclosure Suit.

Robert G. Morrow has commenced a foreclosure suit against Geo. P. and Carrie Gregory, in Dept No. 2 of the circuit court. The suit is brought to foreclose a certain mortgage given by defendants to the Oregon Land Co in 1894, said mortgage having been transferred to plaintiff. Judgment is asked for the sum of \$170 with interest and \$50 attorney's fees, and \$2500 with interest and \$200 attorney fees, and the foreclosure of a mortgage on lot 1 in Sunnyside Fruit Farm No. 10, in Multnomah county. Watson & Beekman are attorneys for plaintiff.
