THE DIVINE DOCTRINE OF PROSPERITY

A Republican organ has the following sample of argument:

Editor Hofer of the Salem Journal, one of the fellows who never make incoherent remarks about the alleged prosperous condition of the country, is financially able to be enjoying himself at the beach this week.

THE JOURNAL is about the only newspaper in Oregon with anything like a state circulation that represents the opposition to the party that claims to produce prosperity.

It excites the envy and animosity of the Postoffice editors that a newspaper can exist that dares to differ from the divine decrees of the prosperity producers. Like the old doctrine of the divine right of kings, the new apostles of prosperity distrust a free press. These prosperity howlers frequently are so prosperous that they can't pay their grocery bills.

But all personality and badinage aside the Republican party has assumed a role that no party can fulfill in the long run. Government cannot be made a flowing fountain of prosperity. The stream may be started under a Republican administration, but it will not flow forever. When it ceases, the party will be left stranded in political bankruptcy. It will be branded as a colossal fraud. The ebb and flow of prosperity is not in the keeping of any political party. Government can be more or less of a burden, but perpetual prosperity will not be supplied by any party.

A high tide of speculation and development prevailed for about seven years from 1883 to 1889. Then the wave subsided and low tide set in from 1890 to 1897. Both these periods saw Republican and Democratic administration. The tide has set the other way somewhat since 1897. Stimulated by the Spanish and Philippine wars, with nearly 250,000 men taken from civil into military life, enormous expenditures for naval and military expenses, have heightened the wasteful and destructive processes, but this artificial prosperity will be paid for dearly in the long run.

Intelligent Republicans do not believe it is the specific duty of a political party to make people prosperous. Economical administration, not undertaking too many things in the name of the state, governing well and as little as possible, dealing justly and equally as between all classes of citizens, these are primary functions of all government. They apply to all parties and to all times. But the Republican party is committed to the doctrine that it is especially commissioned to make people prosperous, and that therefore it is a crime to oppose its policies enter, shut-law heads.

THE WEATHER AND CROPS.

United States Department of Agriculture, U. S. and C. P. Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the Week Ending Monday, August 13.

PORTLAND, OR., Aug. 13, 1900.
The week has been much cooler than the previous one, especially during the day time.

In Western Oregon the maximum, or day, temperatures ranged between 67 and 84 degrees, and the minimum, or night, temperatures between 44 and 55 degrees. In Eastern Oregon these variations were for day temperatures between 60 and 84 degrees, and for night temperatures between 42 and 60 degrees.

Considerable cloudy weather has prevailed, and moderately heavy to heavy showers occurred the fore part of the week that were pretty generally distributed throughout the Willamette and Columbia River valleys and over North-eastern Oregon. No rain has fallen in the Southern half of the state.

Spring wheat in the Willamette valley, although generally better than the fall sown, is a very light crop, and a great deal of it has been either plowed up or cut for hay.

The showers caused but little interruption to harvest work, and good progress has been made in this direction in all sections of the state.

The following threshing yields have been reported: Wasco county, wheat 18 to 23 bushels, oats 35 bushels, to the acre; Sherman county, wheat 16; Umatilla county, wheat 35; Douglas county, wheat 2 to 10; Lane county, wheat 3 to 12, oats 15; Clackamas county, wheat 6 to 15, oats 15 to 25; Marion county, wheat about 8, oats about 12; Linn county, wheat 4 to 10, oats 15 to 25; Polk county, wheat 7 to 11; Benton county, wheat 2 1/2 to 17, oats 15 to 25; Washington county, wheat 8 to 15; Yamhill county, wheat 4 to 14.

The cutworms are disappearing, but in a few sections they are still damaging clover, potatoes and gardens.

Corn and hops are doing nicely, and it is expected that hop picking will begin about the first of the month.

Potatoes were benefitted by the rains, but the crop as a whole has been injured very much by blight and cutworms, and will be rather short on that account.

Pasturage, as usual at this time of year, is short, but range cattle a rein good condition, and it is only the milch cows have to be helped with feed.

Apples and prunes are ripening, and the outlook is very favorable for an extra good crop of apples and a fair crop of prunes.

Willamette Valley.

Wilsonville, Clackamas county, G. F. Stein.—The week has been cloudy and cool. Heavy showers on the 5th and 8th were beneficial to potatoes. A number of fields have been destroyed by the worms. Clover seed a total failure. Threshing has begun. Wheat averages eight bushels and oats twenty bushels to the acre. A good deal of the wheat crop has been plowed under or cut for hay. Hops promise a good crop; few lice have so far appeared.

Forest Grove, Washington county, S. T. Walker.—Another week favorable for harvesting; not enough rain has fallen to seriously retard work. No reports of spring grain in yet. Some grain is being cut for hay. There is still complaint of damage from cutworms. Gardens do not as yet seem to be suffering from rain. Pastures are falling. Fruit continues plentiful and of better quality than for some years.

Saver, Polk county, O. A. Wolverton.—Thrashing of fall wheat well under way and is yielding from seven to eleven bushels per acre. Spring wheat is rusted and will be a short crop. The weather has been favorable for the filling of spring oats, which are, however, rusted and in some places badly damaged.

Philomath, Benton county, W. H. Boles.—Thrashing in progress. Wheat yielding from 2 1/2 to 17 bushels per acre, oats 15 to 25. Cutworms injuring cabbage and tomatoes. Prunes ripening and will be a fair crop.

Wheatland, Yamhill county, A. P. Magness.—Thrashing of fall wheat is getting along well considering the stuff

to be thrashed, containing more weeds than wheat; the yield is from 4 to 14 bushels, and the best land has the poorest grain. Spring wheat will yield more to the acre, and oats and barley are fair. Hops and potatoes are doing well.

Battleship Alabama.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 14.—The new United States battleship Alabama left the Cramp's shipyard today for her trial trip. Experts say she is a staunch fighting craft and there is no doubt that she will exceed the requirements in point of speed, which is to be an average of 10 knots during a run of four hours. The trial will take place over the regular course off Cape Ann, Mass.

Bankers in Convention.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 14.—The annual convention of the Wisconsin State Bankers' Association is being held here today. The money question as it affects American politics will be given much consideration in the field of discussion by the delegates. The attendance is larger than that of last year.
