BLASTING IN THE OCEAN.

Wonderful Scene at Newport When 500 Pounds
of Powder Exploded in the Bay.

A writer describing the scene at New-
port last week, when the government
undertook to blow some rocks out of the
channel says:

A huge column of water, apparently
100 feet in diameter, solid and unbroken,
rolled up like dense smoke from a burn-
ing building to a height in the air of
about 300 feet. After reaching its height
it stood apparently for a half a minute,
a vast and magnificent column, and then
began to descend. The sight was grand
beyond description.

In the evening the spectacle was re-
peated. In the latter instance, the sun
was shining in the west as the huge
column of water broke for its descent
from its enormous height and the out-
side spray tinged with myriad colors,
made a dazzling spectacle.

In each instance the report was like a
huge cannon fired in the distance. In
each blast 500 pounds of powder was
used. The powder was placed into po-
sition at the base of the rocks by Fritz
Derock, a professional diver. Arrayed
in a diving suit that weighed 300 pounds
he descended from the tug General
Wright, drawing after him with ropes
the powder required for the blast. When
all was ready the tug steamed away to a
distance of several hundred yards, and
at a signal from her whistle the blast was
fired. The results of the blasting so far
are very satisfactory, there now being
20 feet of water and before only 14. The
blasting will continue for several days.

ROBERTS RAIDING THE BOER FARMS

LONDON, August 13.—The way the
South Africa war drags out
weary upon Englishmen and no
news would be so welcome as that some
well wisher of the Transvaal had con-
vinced President Kruger that nothing
in Europe or China will make Great
Britain relax her ever tightening grip
on South Africa. Everybody in the
army, or who has anything to do with it
in South Africa, wants to come home
and is heartily sick of the whole thing.
But, knowing that it must go on to a
finish, the drags of war are leaving some
bitterness. The plot to kill British of-
ficers at Pretoria is taken in England
as showing the savage temper of the
Boers, while the Britishers are reported
to be doing some things which are pro-
voking adverse comments in great Brit-
ain. Thus the Standard prints a pre-
toria dispatch dated August 9, saying:
"The Boers sniped a train at Bronk-
horst yesterday on the line between
Pretoria and Middleburg. Two of its
occupants were wounded. In ac-
cordance with Lord Roberts' warning,
all the farms were fired within a radius
of ten miles."

Even the English papers say there
must be a mistake somewhere. A couple
of Boers fired at a train, perfectly with-
in their rights, as warriors, and every farm
house within ten miles in every direction
is committed to the flames.

They are in favor of treating the Boers
now in arms as mere banditti, instead
of soldiers, and they argue that the pac-
ification of the country will be indefini-
tely postponed unless drastic ex-
amples are promptly made.

They say that snipers, train wreckers
and burglars found in arms after taking
the oath of allegiance should be promptly
shot and their property confiscated.

The fact is, Englishmen are beginning
to lose their temper over the irritating
delay of the Boer war, and Lord Rob-
erts, if his own prudence and sense of
justice would permit, might adopt a
rigorous policy of repression without
being condemned by public opinion at
home.
