#### HUBBARD IN A LAWSUIT.

The Ordinances of That Town Involved in a Replevin Action.

Before Justice of the Peace Ramsey at Silverton this afternoon the case of Mrs. Julia Hubbard vs. Emil Klinger is on trial. This case involves the validity of an ordinance of the town of Hubbard and the legality of certain proceedings thereunder, and may be a noted case by the time it is finally settled, as it is likely to go to the highest court of the state.

The plaintiff, Mrs. Hubbard, seeks to recover possession of a horse which strayed from her farm in the Waldo Hills several weeks ago and was impounded in the town of Hubbard and afterward sold by the city authorities to defendant, Klinger. Plaintiff claims to have made diligent search for the horse and to have advertised for it, but acknowledges that she placed the advertisement in the Statesman.

It seems that under the Hubbard ordinance the sale of the horse was positive, no provision being made for redemption. Plaintiff places the value of the animal at \$150 and asks \$50 damages for its detention.

There were, in fact, two horses belonging to plaintiff which shared the same fate, but one is involved in this action.

L. H. McMahon is attorney for plaintiff and arrayed against him are Kaiser & Slater of this city and Geo. C. Brownell of Oregon City.

#### East Indian Buried.

The East Indian, Mahomet Ali, who died at the Salem hospital Monday from the effects of injuries received near Brooks, was buried today in the Terrell burying grounds north of the city. The remains were taken from the Rigdon & Clough undertaking establishment, where they were prepared for burial and brief services were conducted at the grave by Rev. John Parsons.

No inquest was held over the body. Coroner Lane looked into the matter, and decided that as no definite information as to how the man came to his death, was available there was no chance of developing anything by an inquest and it would be useless expense on the county to hold one.

#### After Mr. Beardsley Again.

It seems that O. P. Beardsley is not to be allowed to pay up and be let alone. He was again placed under arrest yesterday afternoon on complaint of B. I. Ferguson, the man whom he assaulted on the streets of Salem, with the result that he had to pay a fine and the costs of two actions in Justice court last week. Ferguson now swears out a complaint charging Beardsley with threatening his life, and asks that he be placed under bonds to keep the peace. The matter was to be settled in Justice O'Donald's court at 3 p. m. today.

#### In Probate Court.

On petition of W. W. Hepburn and A. W. Hepburn, Mrs. Myrtle Card has been appointed guardian of the persons and estates of Arthur W. and Ethel E. Hepburn, aged 18 and 13 years respectively, minor children of Nancy M. Hepburn, deceased, who are entitled to some \$900 as beneficiaries in insurance policies.

Matilda M. Kirk and R. E. Kirk, executors of the will of Peter Kirk, deceased, have filed their second report, showing a balance on hand of \$136.69 and further reporting that the estate is about ready for settlement.

#### A Round Barn.

G. H. Hoyer who lives on the Independence road between Independence and Hills Ferry is constructing a barn on a novel plan. The barn is 83 feet high and is built round and the diameter is 52 feet. A silo 16 by 30 is built in the center. The barn will contain 41 stalls and is the only barn in this section of the valley built on that plan. Geo. Weeks of Laurence has an octagon barn and it is said to be a very convenient barn.

#### Smith Having a Hearing.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 14.—The case of Lloyd J. Smith, Lincoln Park Commissioner and Republican candidate for member of the board of sanitary trustees, who was formally charged with dishonorable and dishonest commercial conduct, is being heard in Criminal Court here today. Both city and State politicians of note are much interested in the outcome and many of them are in attendance at the hearing. The offense consists of permitting grain to be shipped out of elevators under his control as manager of the Chicago Elevator Company, without canceling the warehouse receipts involved. This is the technical term for charging the theft of hundreds of thousands of bushels of grain.

#### FUNERAL OF MRS. MAURITZEN.

Laid to Rest in Rural Cemetery—Sketch of the Life of Deceased.

The funeral of Mrs. A. M. Mauritzen who died at the Salem hospital Saturday night, was held this morning at 9 o'clock from the W. C. T. U. hall, which had been kindly offered for the purpose.

There was a considerable attendance, considering the early hour and the fact that deceased was little known here. Many beautiful flowers were brought and the handsome casket was nicely decorated by kind hands.

The services were conducted by Rev. John Parsons of the First M. E. Church, and the remains were laid to rest in Rural Cemetery.

The following particulars of the life of the deceased lady are furnished by the bereaved husband.

Lula V. Williams, was born in Kentucky in 1875. She came to Oregon with the family of her uncle Daniel Frederick in 1892, and settled at Aurora, afternoon moving to Woodburn.

She was married to E. M. Mauritzen, at Woodburn in 1894. One boy was born to them in 1895, who with the husband survives her. They lived at Newberg two years, where Mr. Mauritzen was engaged in the mercantile business. In 1898 they moved over to Camp Martin on Little Neusteca, where they have since resided.

Deceased was a member of the Methodist church, and of the Epworth League, and was highly esteemed by all who knew her. She had been in poor health for a couple of years and had visited California and different health resorts without relief. For the last few months she had been very low and growing worse, and on the advice of physicians and friends, Mr. Mauritzen brought her out to the hospital, on July 31. Here she continued to fail until death ended her suffering at about 10 p. m. Saturday, August 11.

#### DIED.

PATTEE.—At the Florence Sanitarium, in this city, at 4 p. m. Monday, August 13, 1900, John P. Patee, aged 32 years, from a surgical operation.

Deceased had been suffering from a tumor just above the left knee and came up from Chemawa, Monday, to have it removed, going to the Florence Sanitarium for that purpose. It is said that his mind was greatly disturbed with nervous apprehension, and this probably accentuated the effect of the operation, so that he did not rally from the shock.

Deceased was born at the Cole Creek Indian Agency, in South Dakota, his father being a former captain in the United States Army, and his mother a member of the Sioux tribe. He received an excellent education, graduating with high honors from the Hampton Indian Normal Training School, and from White's Institute, at Wabash, Ind. He then entered the government service, and had been at Chemawa about four years. He was a man of fine physical and mental attributes and won the warm respect and regard of all with whom he came in contact.

He was a valued member of the Episcopal church and president of the Chemawa Y. M. C. A. He carried a policy in the New York Life Insurance Company for \$3,000. A wife and three bright children survive him.

The funeral was held at the Chemawa school at 2:30 this afternoon and was largely attended, many going down from this city. Rev. John Parsons, of the First M. E. church, conducted the services and interment was had in the Chemawa cemetery.
