THE SALEM REFORMS

ARE ATTRACTING ATTENTION EVERYWHERE.

A. W. Prescott interviewed in Astoria about the Capital City's System of Reducing Interest and Running Expenses.

"Astoria is having the same experience with the street lighting question that Salem had two years ago," said A. W. Prescott, of the Capital City, last evening, in conversation with an Astorian representative.

The people of Salem had been paying \$10 per month, per light, for 2,000 candle power street lamps and the people thought that this was too much. They were working under a 10-year contract with the electric light company and were using 45 lamps at an annual expense of \$5,400 per year. In the city elections the issues were drawn upon retrenchment and reform, with the result that the candidates pledged to a reduction of expenses were elected. One of the chief items in which a reduction of expenses was demanded, was that of street lighting. When the street lighting contract expired in June the reform council and the electric light company were unable to agree upon terms and all lights were shut off.

The city remained in darkness over three months, when the light company acceded to the city's demands and agreed to furnish 35 lights at \$5.95 per light per month. The company is using the 2,000-candle power lamps yet and we have reduced the annual expenditure on account of street lights from \$5,400 to \$2,500 per year, or a saving of \$2,900 per year. After the first few nights of darkness no great inconvenience was experienced, and although we now have 10 less lights than formerly, no one complains.

"Our reform city council inaugurated several measures which have materially reduced our current expenses and thus lightened the burdens of taxpayers. One of these measures was the making of a popular 4 per cent loan for the purpose of refunding an outstanding indebtedness of \$65,000, drawing 8 per cent interest. This loan was so successful that it attracted wide attention and was given favorable comment in several leading papers of the United States. The bonds issued were in small amounts and were payable on call. For this reason they were practically all taken by small investors who reside in Salem and the interest will consequently remain at home instead of going to Eastern bondholders. It was predicted by able financiers that the popular loan could not be successfully made but the results were so satisfactory that the Salem school board has recently made a similar loan of \$30,000.

"The council also made a reduction of \$1,000 per year in the salary account and reduced the police force to two men—the chief of police and a night watchman. The peace and dignity of the city has never been better maintained than during the time in which but one man has been guarding the city at night. This is accounted for in part by the fact Salem has a pretty nice class of saloonkeepers, who take pride in the good order of the city and assist in maintaining it by preventing drunkenness and saloon rows.

"In connection with the reduction of salaries, the chief of police and city recorder agreed to turn into the city treasury all the fees that they might receive in criminal cases. The reduction in criminal fees has been about \$2000 per annum, of which the city of Salem saves about one-third, and the rest of the county the balance.

"These reforms, beginning with a reduction in street lighting expenses, have

The funeral expenses of little Katie were delayed by a purse made up by friends and neighbors.
