NEW YORK HOPS.

Crop Will be Considerably Short and Growers Are Not Contracting.

N. Y. Journal & Bulletin, Aug. 10.

The only features in the market today were cable reports from England that as a result of recent wet and unsettled weather crop prospects are not so favorable. It is also stated that the gale of Tuesday injured the English crop, but to what extent is not yet known. Nothing new was reported concerning crop conditions in the State or on the Pacific Coast. Dealers report an increasing injury for 1899 crops, but orders are small. The limited supply is held with confidence and reported sales are at full quoted prices.

Waterbury Market.
There is nothing new to say of the growing crop. The weather has been very warm for the past week but the vine seems to be enduring well though in some cases blight is reported. Several small growths of Palmer and West Seedings are being harvested this week. They have been sold for 18c to 19c. We hear of no contracts of the late crop.

New York Market.
Oneida Union, August 4: As yet our local dealers are doing no contracting for the coming crop. They have had authority for the past two months to secure 1900 hops on the basis of 12c per pound, but growers are in no hurry, confidently believing that they can do better when the true situation becomes known to brewers and shippers. As a rule, however, very few hop contracts are entered into before the middle of August.

From all accounts hops are looking better through Stockbridge valley than anywhere else in the State, and if the crop is secured in good shape—carefully picked and rightly cured—the hops grown in this county this year will command a price second to none produced in this State. The Otego county hops are usually considered a little ahead of those grown in Madison and Oneida counties, but the chances are this year will form an exception.

A. J. Luce, the well known hop producer and dealer, who is now making a trip through the hop regions of Otego and Schoharie counties, writes E. J. Smith of this city, that the hops in those regions are looking "sick," compared with the plantations through the Stockbridge valley. The vines are yellow and feeble, showing the bad effects of the June drought. The yield there must be light, at best.

Malone Gazette, August 3: With the hop harvest in Franklin county only a month ahead, the prospect is for a light crop in most yards under the most favorable conditions during the next few weeks. We have heard no complaints thus far of lice indications, but the vines are generally light, and the arms inclined to be short.

Cooperstown Republican, August 1: There have been a few purchases of hops within a few days—64 bales at about 9 1/2c. The growing crop is doing well. The vine looks clean and is not effected by vermin. The crop will certainly be considerable short of last year.

Examined by X-Rays.

N. H. French, of Fruitland, who has been in ill health for the past year went to Albany yesterday and was examined by Dr. Hill with an x-ray. Mr. French while at work in the timber about a year ago was injured by a large limb falling and striking him across the hips and is left a cripple. Mr. French says Dr. Hill soon discovered that he had been injured about the hip and informed him that the hip bone is badly shattered. Mr. French had been doctoring for stomach trouble, but the x-ray has revealed the real cause of his illness.

New Cable.

The Salem water company, is today putting in a new cable for power transportation from the water power to the pumping station. The old cable has outlived its usefulness and will be relegated to the scrap pile. The new cable consists of a single piece of pure manila rope 3 1/2 inches in circumference and 6500 feet long. It was made in San Francisco and has been kept on hand here for some time in readiness for emergencies. It is quite an undertaking to put it in place, but Supt. Brown and his crew are making short work of it.

Big Oregon Apples.

G. A. Rockwell has a tree in his door yard that has a fine crop of Gravenstein apples ever seen here. The tree is loaded to the guards, and the apples are as large as peas at this season usually grow, and nearly everyone would. When one of the big fellows falls from the upper part of the tree it is apt to bring a peck more with it, owing to its weight and consequent force. The fact that the tree is irrigated on the lawn is believed to account for the unusual size of the fruit.

Arm Broken.

A hay rack ride at Scio Wednesday evening resulted in Miss Myers being thrown from the wagon, receiving a serious injury of the left arm. One bone was broken near the wrist, and the other bone was dislocated. The following morning Dr. Pril, of Scio, and Dr. Hill, of Albany, adjusted the injured bones and at last accounts Miss Myers was resting better. Miss Myers is a sister of Hon. Jeff Meyers of this city and is well known here.
