TWO NEW OFFICERS.

The List of City Officials Growing Rapidly. Two New Ones Added.

The city of Salem has been attaining the reputation of a peaceable town, and one governed with a small corps of peace officers, but a start has now become necessary in the other direction.

At least temporarily, two new members have been added to the force. They are Johnny Patterson and Fletch Long, and they are proudly enrolled under Chief of Police Gibson as dog catchers. They do not appear on the city payroll, but Chief Gibson pays them out of his own pocket.

He is supposed to reimburse himself out of the fees paid by parties whose dogs are impounded; but as a matter of fact, so few are redeemed that by the time Gibson pays for catching, feeding, killing and disposing of the dogs he is out, on the average, about four bits a head.

This, however, is not the fault of the two new officers and they are rounding up the stray canines with commendable energy. They have some rough experiences, and young Patterson had his hand quite severely bitten yesterday.

The dog tax was due on Aug. 1st, and only 42 have been paid to date. Chief Gibson found that it was necessary to take energetic measures, so he put the boys at work and they have already nearly filled the pound.

WANT OUR MONEY.

Eastern Investment Brokers Sending Circulars to Subscribers of the School Loans.

Salem's new popular school loan has attracted attention all over the country, especially among bankers and investment companies and loan brokers.

Parties whose names have appeared in the list of subscribers, as published in THE JOURNAL, have been bombarded with circulars from distant cities, offering alluring investments for their surplus cash.

Court Sherwood Forest No. 19, F. of A., whose title appeared among the list of subscribers is in receipt of several of such communications from bankers and investment agents in Cincinnati, St. Louis and New York.

It is not likely that any of our local capital will be sent away for investment. The new method of placing public loans with our home people on a popular plan is highly appreciated by the local small capitalists, as well as the larger ones, and is likely to be continued.

About Another Bubble Loan Association.

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 18.—The hearing of the petition to levy a ratable assessment upon the stockholders in Kennebec County of the Northwest Western Loan and Investment Company, of Duluth, Minn., began here to-day. The company is defunct and in the hands of a receiver. Thousands of dollars were poured into this company, which was one of the many Western bubble concerns that sprung up a few years ago.

A. C. Otis, of Duluth, who formerly resided in Augusta, Maine, wealthy citizens of the East, principally in Maine, subscribed heavily to said company and took all their holdings for years from the savings banks and invested, lured by prospective big profits. Among the money invested was an academy fund. If an assessment should fall upon the investors it will be a serious matter and serve as one more lesson to those disposed to indulge in speculation. The effort to assess will be contested strenuously by the stockholders.

Bible Conference in Indiana.

WINONA LAKE, Minn., Aug. 18.—The Winona conference, which was inaugurated four years ago, will begin here tomorrow. The average attendance has grown from 2,500 to 3,500. The speakers secured are Drs. George T. Purves, of New York; W. G. Morehead, Xenia, O.; J. M. Stiffer, of Crozer Theological Seminary, Upland, Pa.; J. F. Carson, Cornelius Walkin, of Brooklyn, and others from various sections of the country. A special series of Bible studies is the principal feature.

Purchasing Chinese Pheasants.

A gentleman from Chico, California, accompanied by Hil Page, of the Red Front stables, drove out to the Griffith farm in the Wa'do Hills yesterday and the gentleman purchased three pair of Chinese pheasants for shipment to California. Miss Griffith has orders for about one hundred pair of these game birds which sell for about \$5 per pair. She has been breeding and raising them for a number of years.

War Causes Mill to Close.

BIDDEFORD, Me., Aug. 18.—The mills of the Peppercorn Manufacturing Company, of this city, which includes the Peppercorn and Lagoon divisions of the corporation, closed today and will remain shut until September 4. About one-half of the goods manufactured by these mills goes to China, but for the last month this market as far as the Biddeford people are concerned, has been cut off. About 3,000 hands will be affected by the shut down.

Speedy Automobiles Contest.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 18.—About twenty-five automobiles started here today at Michigan avenue and Congress street for a contest of speed. The run way laid out over a course of about twenty-five miles. The Western Automobile Association, of this city, the object of which is primarily the advancement of automobile driving as a recreation, inaugurated the run.

United States Bonds Redeemed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18.—The interest on the bonds of the funded loan of 1891, amounting to \$25,304,500, ceases today. Holders of the bonds are notified to present said bonds before this date.

Medical Director for Naval Hospital.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 18.—Dr. H. J. Babin today assumed his duties as medical director of the Naval Hospital, on Flushing Avenue. He replaces Dr. G. N. Woods, who was detached.

LETTERS OF A TRAVELER

A SALEM LADY WRITES ENTERTAININGLY OF HER EXPERIENCES IN EUROPE.

Describes the Sights in England, at the Paris Exposition and on the Continent.

THE JOURNAL takes great pleasure in presenting to its readers a series of charming letters written home by Mrs. Myra A. Wiggins while traveling in Europe and visiting the Paris Exposition, in company with her father, J. H. Albert. These letters were written to her husband, Fred A. Wiggins, at such odd times as were available, and with no thought that they would ever appear in print. Those who were permitted to read them, however, were enthusiastic, that they should be published, and Mr. Wiggins yielded to the solicitation of THE JOURNAL with the result that the first two letters are presented today, and others will follow.

U. S. M. S. St. Paul, 10:30 A. M. Wednesday, July 4th.

We have been in sight of the beautiful land since early morning—Merrie Old England—we have just passed Eddystone lighthouse, and are very near a point of land now, with another lighthouse just coming into view. It seems good to see the land again, and everyone is happy. Beautiful white seagulls have hovered over our steamer all morning—they just follow us and they look so pretty. We have streamers flying from the bow and stern; don't know whether it is for the Fourth or whether it is customary. *** We are just passing a pretty lighthouse and a village, and it won't be long now till land will be on both sides of us, and then we will be towed in. Some poor people have been sick the whole trip. ***

Friday evening—This is the end of a hard day's sight-seeing in London, and I am simply dazed, I have seen so much; but I will try and begin back at the steamer Wednesday afternoon. The pilot boat did not meet us as I supposed, but just a pilot and he carefully and slowly steered us into Southampton. I managed to take a snap at an immense boat in the harbor loading up with soldiers for China or Africa; couldn't find out which. Well, we got off the St. Paul and found our baggage on the wharf under the initial letter of our name. The customs officer looked into my trunk, but that is all, and then we got everything together and sat down to wait for our special train to London. In about fifteen minutes it steamed in—the funniest looking thing you ever saw—little squeaky whistle (they all have that kind), a little bit of an engine and those queer compartment cars. All our luggage (don't say baggage here) and us, except my trunk and the wheels, went in with us (you know they don't check anything) and the rest of the baggage on a box car on the same train.

We were soon out of the wharf section into the beautiful country, and I was so overcome that I could scarcely keep from crying. Maybe it was because we had seen nothing but water for so long, but anyway I thought it had ever been beautiful than anything I had ever seen. Beautiful Merrie England—no fences at all, but miles and miles of green hedges—and the houses, I never in the world can tell you about them—you must see them. Everyone whether in the city or country, a row of houses all alike or
