OUR NEWPORT LETTER.

Fishing and Other Events at Olsson's Bay-Sunsets, Dynamite-Mussels Seal Rocks.
Newport, Aug. 18:-

No trip to the seaside is complete without taking in Seal Rocks. The ride of eight miles down the beach, the row across the bay, the return at low tide, are all intensely interesting and develop an appetite that is destructive to hotel profits at the terminal points.

Fishing on the bay has not been so good the past week. The water has not been clear, but the river water is sick-looking as it gets in all streams in mid-summer. E. J. Swafford has captured the champion flounder, weighing ten and a-half pounds. The largest taken before was probably the mate to this, a ten pounder in Ford Bros' seine. Stafford's fish was 28 inches long and as wide as the top of a barrel. He thought he had hooked a woolen blanket. Down at the Cape Foulweather light there is fine cod-fishing off the rocks, but it takes several days to get onto their curves.

Improving the Harbor.

Exploding dynamite under the rocks that obstruct the entrance to Yaquina bay has been part of the entertainment afforded summer resorters at Newport. Thursday the first blasts were fired, one of 400 pounds and one of 200 pounds. Both sent the salt spray about the same height into the air-nearly two hundred feet, a towering column of white foam resembling the pictures of a discharge of the Old Faithful geyser in Yellowstone national park. The dull thud, that shook the bay made the hills tremble and must have cooked the fish for several hundred feet around.

\$25,000 is to be expended on blowing up Pinnacle rock. About ten shots have been fired and samples of blue rock are shown that were thrown up by the dynamite. The fact is, the jetties need repairing much more than this rock needs blowing out. The repairs could have been made for \$25,000 a few years ago, but now will cost \$75,000 or \$100,000. As they are there is water enough for a great commerce.

Amateur photographers have been kept busy taking snapshots of the explosions. The steamer General Wright gives an alarm whistle a half minute before the blast is touched off by electricity, and all get ready to catch the great columns of water that leap up into the air. Capt. Clark of the Life Saving station has some of the finest views that have been taken.

The Bay Night.

The Salem campers and cottagers at Olsson's had a bonfire the other night and about forty young and old enjoyed the occasion immensely. As the full moon rose over the head of the bay it converted that body at high tide into a shimmering sea of silver. In the midst of our festivities the search light of the Manzanita, (the lighthouse tender that has been in this harbor several days), was turned full on our party. All responded with a cheer which was answered from the boat across the water. Then an excursion party went up the bay, and a launch went down, the occupants singing and Japanese lanterns swinging on the bow. Old fashioned games were played until the high tide put out our bonfire on the beach.

Death to Mussels.

On an early morning trip to the lighthouse on Yaquina head we learned to

eat mussels roasted on the rocks. There are endless quantities of these beautiful bivalves, deep pearl blue on the inside, blue and black on the outside and looking as if they were varnished. The mussel is richly orange color with a slightly pungent salt water flavor. It adheres to the rock and to other mussels by a cluster of bristles. While at the lighthouse Indian women were gathering them in creels and packing them up the cliff by a band over their forehead.

We built a fire on the rocks to brew our coffee and toast our bread. The coffee was settled by a dash of cold water and the Armours' choicest breakfast bacon was broiled to a turn on the coals, when we put our mussels on the hot rocks and covered them over with others. In five minutes they were announced by their own tempting flavor that breakfast was ready. The mussel has no sand in it, but is salted and peppered by old dame nature just to my taste, and put the finishing course on an outdoor breakfast.

Sunsets on the Sea

The sunsets at the western coast are alone worth the cost of a trip here. On the Atlantic people only see the sunrises but here we only see his majesty take his evening dip into the endless Pacific. Often there is a bank of clouds revealed "just as the sun goes down." Then there are wonderful revelations of a sun-down city of gold, with towers and castles, spires and minarets. Sometimes a whole city appears. It is almost impossible to describe the beauty of a perfect sunset at sea, and we see a good many of them at Newport this month and next. The afterglow is as beautiful as the descent into the waves is impressive. As the sun goes under it changes in shape. It flattens out and at last seems to quiver like a molten mass of gold. Then the western skies light up with yellows, pale greens and finally merges into pale blue, with the stars peeping through.

Life at Seal Rocks.

There are only four families here in cottages, and not many at the hotel. Squire Farrer's family are here and, with improvements made this year, have the best appointed cottage we have seen on these coasts. It has wide porches, beautiful views of the ocean on three sides, with large windows to the sea from the dining room and sitting room, and interiors made cosy and inviting. The library and parlor are carpeted with Brussels and plenty of rugs and the Squire likes it too well he wants to live here the year round.

Seal Rocks have the richest natural bill of fare of any place in the world that I know of. There is venison and salmon, trout and shellfish, mutton, beef and poultry, blue berries and in this latter part of August, the finest strawberries I ever saw, and I think I know what strawberries are. The vegetables are all fine, and Mrs. Stitt knows how to prepare it all with a homelike relish. Then there is the wonderful Alsea honey, good milk and butter.

Sea Lion and Fishing.

Sea Lion hunters from New York have been operating at Heceta head and the herds have been taking refuge by the thousand at Seal Rocks. Here they are undisturbed, as some old act of the legislature forbids killing animals on these rocks. Still some one shot a kitten or baby sea lion the other day and cowardly left it to beat and die on the rocks. It came ashore and some one skinned it to make himself a bit of brown fur.

Fishing at Seal Rocks is a head of any summer resort on this coast. There are salmon trout at Beaver creek two miles north, mountain trout in the lakes and creek a mile south, and deep sea fishing just off the rocks whenever the sea is not

rough, and that is quite often. Mr. Stitt takes people out almost daily in an open row boat, and the boat is easily filled in an hour or two with the finest sea bass, cod and other choice fish. He supplies the Newport market part of the time.

Seal Rock Personal.

Win. Stitt has kept the hotel for six years. He and his good wife, son and two daughters are very devoted to their guests and leave nothing undone to entertain them all. Mr. Stitt is an old sailor and fisherman, brought up to the sea and loves it still. He will quit the hotel about the middle of September, when he will take salmon in the Alsea, and his family will remove to Newport, the hotel having passed to other hands.

Mr. John Fogarty who runs a hack line to points on the South beach has a ranch adjoining the Life Saving station.

One of his sons now in Alaska was on the force here for years and a younger son has taken his place. Mr. Fogarty has fast horses and safe rigs and knows the country and the history of the ranchers, as well as those who have left the country, having made failures. He knows the story of every wreck and is one of the best of entertainers. If he sells his ranch he is a man who will be missed on these beaches.

Joe Fontaine, Sr., of Salem, has been at Seal Rocks for two weeks. When he came here he was hardly expected to live and it was feared a trip would be required back to Newport for a coffin. But at the end of a week this ill-luck had him on his feet and he was gaining in appetite, walking about and doing well when we left. Jos. Jr., came from Eastern Oregon to attend his father, and has been enjoying the fishing.

Important Railroad Case.

CANTON, S. D., Aug. 20.—The State board of railroad commissioners which met here to-day began a case which will have important bearing on whether or not the various railroad companies having lines in the State will be required to virtually double-track their roads. The hearing was granted in accordance with a petition of a number of farmers who ask that the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad be compelled to construct a side track midway between Canton and Harrisburg.

The track would save them from hauling grain and moving live stock a long way. The opponents of the petition say that if it is granted similar applications will be made from all parts of the State; that besides being a great expense to the railroads, it would injure the towns, which would lose shipments of grain aggregating millions of bushels each season. Railroads in other States are interested in the outcome.

Saturday Night Runaway.

Late Saturday night a team hitched to the Salem Soda works wagon, which was being used by Ringling's bill-posters, ran away but were caught before any great damage was done. They started for Francis barn and made things lively for a short time. Spilling a little paste and breaking their harness was the only damage done.
