THE ELKS EXCURSION

UNDER THE AUSPICES OF SALEM LODGE NO. 336, ON SEPT. 6, 7, AND 8.

Special Cars, Elks Band, New Uniforms and Plenty of Enthusiasm Will Insure a Good Time.



THE Elks Excursion from this city to Portland on Sept. 6, 7, and 8, promises to be a grand affair. Salem Lodge No. 336 have hold of the matter

with the energy for which the Elks are noted, and nothing will be left undone to make the excursion the popular event of the season.

The Salem lodge will place 300 tickets on sale at different places in town in a few days. These will be good for three days, August 6, 7, and 8, and the price has been put down to the ridiculously low figure of \$1.00 for the round trip.

The three days covered by the excursion will be the best of the Portland Street Fair and carnival which will be held from Sept. 4th to 15th inclusive.

Thursday, the 6th is "Elks Day," and the Elks parade and prize drill will take place on that day. The tallest, shortest, fattest and leanest elks will be on exhibition. The competition for the prizes between the different lodges will be keen. Lodges from Butte, Boise, Spokane, Walla Walla, Pendleton, Tacoma, Seattle Roseburg and other points will compete, and the Salem lodge will make them hustle.

This lodge has nearly two hundred members. One hundred uniforms have been ordered, and a band of sixteen pieces has been organized, composed of Elks only.

Friday at the street fair will be Woman's day, and the Queen of Flowers will reign.

Saturday will be Commercial Travelers' Day and the ubiquitous drummer will make a showing for his profession.

The excursion will take in these three days. Special cars will be provided for the advance purchasers of the 300 tickets which will be placed on sale by the Salem lodge, and these cars will be decorated with Elks' colors and emblems.

There is no doubt that the excursion will be well patronized and will reflect credit on Salem Lodge No. 336 B. P. O. Elks.

BICYCLE THIEF CAPTURED.

Wanted in Oregon City. Gives Many Aliases and Different Stories.

Chief of police Charley Burns of Oregon City came up today after a young fellow who is wanted in Oregon City for the theft of a bicycle.

The fellow was in town yesterday trying to sell the wheel here, but got out of town, going north before Chief of Police Gibson got onto his curves. The Chief then phoned to Gervais and the constable there gathered up the thief on his arrival. He notified Gibson who at once phoned to Oregon City, and Chief Burns boarded the southbound overland this morning. He picked up his man at Gervais and brought him to Salem for identification and to recover the wheel, which the fellow did not take to Gervais with him, claiming that he had thrown it in the brush near Chemawa.

After dinner he was taken out by team to recover the wheel and was to be taken to Oregon City on the 4 o'clock train.

After the team was hitched up he changed his tale and said he had left the wheel in Portland, but as he had one here yesterday his first story was deemed worthy of investigation. He has given a different name whenever asked and is evidently a would-be tough.

COMMERCIAL STREET BRIDGE

Will Be Put in Order for the Passage of Teams at Once.

The action taken by the city council last evening will result in the immediate repair of the Commercial street bridge over North Mill creek.

The committee on streets and public property, to whom the matter was referred, consulted this morning with County Judge Scott and Superintendent Lambirth, of the street car company, and with C. F. Royal, the bridge builder.

Arrangements were made whereby Mr. Royal will strengthen the two weak spans with piling and lay down a roadway 12 feet in width clear of the car track, putting the bridge in good order for teams, at an expense of \$150.

A Gold Medal Machine.

"The Chicago" typewriter, for which E. L. King, of Albany, is general agent for the State of Oregon, has been awarded the gold medal at the Paris exposition, as per a dispatch received today. This machine is represented in Salem
