Storage Reservoirs. COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 23.—At the third day's session of the Farmers' National Congress, held here today, the building of great storage reservoirs throughout the North and West was urged by the State officials. Many speakers of note were heard on the subject, among them being State Engineer McCune, Superintendent of Irrigation Armstrong and Governor Thomas. The bill pending before Congress looking to the ultimate establishing of storage reservoirs throughout the arid west is receiving the attention of the entire country. People in the South are beginning to realize that it means less devastation by flood and a saving to general government in the matter of millions that are now appropriated to sustain river and harbor levee construction. It is not improbable that a committee will be appointed from this organization to go before Congress as representative members to urge the passage of the bill for surveys for the storage reservoir system.

The regular program of the session comprised a paper on "The Common Interest of Farmers Over the World," by Baron Herman, agricultural attaché German legation, of Washington, D. C.; "The Cream," by Hon. T. E. Orr, of Pittsburg, Pa.; "Agricultural requirements in the west," by Hon. F. D. Coburn, secretary of agriculture, of Topeka, Kans.; and "The redemption of the arid west," by Prof. N. N. Campbell, of Holdrege, Neb.

Indians Object to Curils Bill. MESQUERA, Ind., Aug. 23.—A convention of business men of the Indian Territory is in session here today to frame resolutions objecting to the Curtis Bill. The creek Indians have manifested a decided objection to the bill, and representations have been made to the business men of the surrounding States, a large number of whom are in attendance at the convention. J. Fishman, of this city, has been most active in bringing about the movement, having visited the prominent cities of Kansas, and Missouri in behalf of the merchants of this section. At the meeting today, the bill was condemned and resolutions to be placed before Congress urging a treaty with the Reds to take the place of the bill was adopted.

Testing of New Guns. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 23.—The Board of Ordnance and Fortification will hold a meeting today at Sandy Hook, to examine and test several types of new guns and explosives. The meeting is significant, in that it will decide the protest of General Ellet against the action of General Buffington calling for bids for the manufacture of a number of field guns of a type not approved by the board. The matter had been brought to the attention of the Board by General Miles, and at a meeting held on Aug. 4 it was recommended to Secretary Root that no award be made for the manufacture of the guns until after a satisfactory test by the Board. It is expected that some interesting facts will be brought to light.
