BRICKLAYERS STRIKE

Workmen on New Prison Wing Walk Out.

Cause Was Inconvenience Arising From Closing Of Prison Gates At Certain Hours
—Men Go Back to Work

Salem may not be up to date in all respects, but she can have a strike once in a while.

This time it is a strike of the brick layers working on the new wing of the penitentiary. There were nine of them working on the building for Erixson & Van Patton, the contractors, and they all walked out this morning.

There is some conflict of evidence as to the cause of the strike, but it seems to arise from the fact that the hours for opening and closing of the gates of the prison enclosure, interfere somewhat with the hours of work on the building.

The outer gates are closed while the convicts go to and from their work in the stove foundry, and the bricklayers claim that they are put to great inconvenience thereby.

They say that they are obliged to go out on the 6:30 a. m. car so as to get in before the gates are closed at 7 o'clock, to go to work at 7:30, and this obliges them to get out nearly an hour earlier than is necessary. Again at night, they quit work at 5:50 and want to take the car which leaves the pen at 5:45, but the gates are closed at that time until about three minutes after the car has gone, obliging them to either wait three-quarters of an hour from the time that they quit work or else walk to town.

This they say knocks them out of about one hour and a half every day unnecessarily.

On the other hand it is said that the trouble arises over the refusal of the workmen to make up either at night or in the morning about ten or fifteen minutes which are lost at noon because they are obliged to quit before the gates close at 11:55 and cannot go to work until five or ten minutes after 1 o'clock. As they are supposed to work nine hours, the contractors want them to make up this time.

Superintendent Lee says that he was not cognizant of the fact that the rules of the prison were interfering so seriously with the convenience of the workmen, and he could see no good reason why some adjustment should not be made which would avoid depriving the workmen of an hour and a half daily of their time.

Later, the trouble was satisfactorily adjusted and the men are all at work again this afternoon.

Stranger in Trouble.

A colored man, hailing from Portland and giving the name of George Lamar was arrested by Night Officer Smith at an early hour this morning and thrown into the city jail on a charge of vagrancy. This afternoon he pleaded guilty before recorder Judah and was given "40, 20 days, or 30 minutes." He accepted the 30 minutes in which to get out of town.

Doubt the Hold-Up.

Walter J. Shelley, formerly night clerk at the Hotel Eugene, was arrested in that city, Wednesday, on a charge of larceny by bailee of \$50 entrusted to him by a guest of the hotel, and which Shelley claimed was taken from him by footpads, the incident occurring a couple of weeks ago.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Aug. 23.—A special meeting of the stockholders of the Boston and Maine Railroad was held here today for the purpose of ratifying the purchase of 30,000 of preferred stock of the Central Massachusetts Railroad Company at \$95 a share. The agreement under the above purchase calls for payment by Oct. 1, and it is likely by that date that the Railroad Commissioners will have decided what price shall be paid for the additional 10,000 shares of minority preferred stock and 35,000 shares of common stock.
