The unexpectedly liberal arrivals are upsetting the calculations of holders. Sixteen hundred bales for the first two weeks in August is very unusual. So much of this stock has come forward, mostly from the Pacific Coast, that it has prevented a rapid reduction of local stocks as dealers would like to see so near the close of the season. Brewers have had to make some purchases, the exceedingly warm weather making a large consumption of liquor, but they have felt inclined to work down their own stock to a low point as the quality of last year's hops will probably be no comparison to the 1900 crop, which promises to be fine.

We do not think the situation warrants any change in the quotations for State hops, but the better grades of Pacific Coast are slightly easier, and 13@13 1/2 is a full price for choice. Crop reports in this country are about the same as last year but late London cables report continued unfavorable weather and crop not doing well. In the interior of this State a few bales of seedlings have been picked, and buyers were found at 19c for Palmers and 18c for Wests. After last year's experience we advise farmers not to pick until the hops are fully ripe; and in New York state we hope to see the crop harvested in better shape than last year, which was the dirtiest crop ever picked in this country.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 24.—The final day's proceedings of the Farmers' National Congress, in session here, was devoted almost entirely to the question of farming in the South. The storage reservoir subject, which was urged by the state officials at yesterday's meeting, again came in for some little discussion this morning. E. A. Callahan, of New York, opened the regular program with a paper on "The State Farmers' Congress." E. N. Nicky, of Ocean Springs, Mass., then opened the question of Southern farming with a paper on "The Northern Farmer in Dixie." The paper was discussed for the remainder of the morning's session. In the afternoon Hon. H. S. Berry, of Owensboro, Ky., addressed the meeting on "The Farmers' Outlook in the South," calling forth much favorable comment. The last speaker of the session and of the congress was the Hon. L. B. Elrick, of Colorado, on "The Farmer and the Republic."
