The Aged Pioneer Laid to Rest in the Family Vault.

The funeral of the late Mrs. E. N. Cooke took place Thursday afternoon from the first M. E. Church, which was well filled with the older generation of the city, who had known and loved the aged pioneer.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful. Services were conducted by Rev. P. S. Knight, an old friend of the family and his remarks were fitting and appropriate to the occasion.

Music was furnished by a quartet consisting of Misses Lona White and Myra Raymond, Fred Wiggins and G. J. Thomas, with Miss Genevieve Hughes at the organ.

The pall bearers were John G. Wright, W. T. Slater, J. P. Frisell, Geo. H. Burnett, E. P. McCormick, M. L. Chamberlain, P. H. Raymond and A. T. Gilbert.

Brief services took place at the residence before the remains were taken to the church. From the church a large number followed the remains to Rural cemetery where they were deposited in the family vault, and the friends were dismissed with the benediction. A SMOOTH YOUNG MAN.

Steals Wool and Ships It to Portland Clearing Up Several Hundreds.

Last Wednesday afternoon a stranger drove into Page & Stevens' salaried stable with a fine dark-colored horse and a buckboard. He left the rig to be taken care of and walked out, and has not returned for his rig.

This morning Geo. F. Egin, a Corvallis livery man arrived in the city in search of a missing horse and identified the one above mentioned. The rig had been hired Tuesday, by a smooth young man who seems to have been engaged in some transaction more profitable to himself than to some other.

Mr. Egin says that about Aug. 15, the same chap called at his stable and hired a team and drove into the country. Later he brought the team back, paid for it and left.

About this time a lot of wool and other produce was stolen in that vicinity, and the stranger is suspected to have been the thief. The produce was taken to Will station and shipped to Helborn & Co. at Portland, and the enterprising shipper is said to have cleaned up three or four hundred dollars on the deal.

The young fellow gave his name as J. C. Wilson and is apparently about 19 years of age. He is about 5 feet 9 inches in height, weighs about 160 pounds, and wore a brown hat and grey clothes.

Rev. P. A. Powell Called.

The First Christian church of this city has extended a call to Rev. P. A. Powell, of Missouri, as pastor of the Christian church. Rev. Powell is a native Oregonian and well known here, his parents Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Powell of Monmouth being highly respected pioneers. Rev. Powell was a member of the class of '84 of Christian college, now the Oregon State Normal School at Monmouth. He afterwards graduated from Lexington, Ky. university and has since occupied many prominent pulpits in the East. He will be warmly welcomed to his native state on his return, which will be about the last of September.

Walter McKee Dead.

Walter McKee, a native son, died at his home, at McKee, yesterday morning, aged 33 years. Deceased was born at McKee, and was widely known and a highly esteemed citizen. He was a consistent member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and also an active member of the Woodmen of the World. His father, David A. McKee, and five brothers and four sisters, survive. The funeral will take place Saturday.

A Wounded Pioneer.

Boyd Richardson, who is assistant house physician at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland, had the misfortune recently of injuring one of his fingers by some small accident. Blood poisoning set in, and for a short time it was feared that amputation would be necessary, but the injured member is now considered out of danger.

Will Use the Wallace Warehouse.

The Willamette Valley Fruit Growers' Association, of Rosedale, of which H. S. Gile is the moving spirit, has changed its plans and will not build a warehouse as intended. Instead, the Wallace brick warehouse, in this city, will be used by the Association.

Linn County Pioneer Dead.

David Peabody died at Lebanon on August 20th at the remarkable age of 97 years and 23 days. He was the oldest resident in the county. Linn county thus loses one of its best pioneer citizens, one whose life was a credit to the state as well as to his family.—Albany Democrat.

Fire at Union Hill.

Thomas Hare, a well known farmer from Union Hill, near Whiteaker was in the city today, and brings the news that the residence of James Decker together with all the contents and some money was entirely destroyed by fire August 22. The fire caught from the stovepipe at 6 p. m. There was no insurance on the property.

The Oregonian strikes the key note when it hints at the disgrace it is to supercede Minister Conger at this critical juncture just in order to have a "real live hero" for campaigning purposes. No wonder that great paper is turning its back on McKinleyism or Hannaism.

Many financiers have discovered that 2 per cent. bonds are just 50 per cent. better for the government than 4 per cent. bonds. Abe Lincoln discovered that greenbacks were just 100 per cent. better for the government than any kind of bonds, but he's a back number.

The Oregonian in its uncanny support of McKinleyism, has this editorial item in its issue of August 23:

"Conger to stay at Pekin and negotiate? Ha! Who would take his place on the stump? Permit a real live hero to abide quietly in China when he can be brought home and carted around the country to raise cheers about Republican plumes? Not if Mr. Hanna knows himself."

"Slot Machines" Proved to be an Outrageous Form of Robbery." is the big head in an article in the Examiner, covering two pages with illustrations to prove the assertion. The Examiner says the machines as they leave the factory are guaranteed to give the operator 65 per cent. the best of the bargain, the man with the nickel having the 35 per cent. chance of getting even. The article is considerable of a revelation of the ways of the world.

The following item is being published in many Republican papers:
