**THE WEATHER AND CROPS**

United States Department of Agriculture, Circular and Report of the Weather Bureau Oregon section, for the week ending Monday, August 27.

PORTLAND, Ore., Monday Aug. 27, 1900.

The temperatures in the western part of the State averaged about the same as last week, but east of the Cascade mountains it was considerably cooler, especially during the daytime.

In western Oregon the maximum, or day, temperatures ranged between 65° and 80°, and the minimum, or night, temperatures between 45° and 60°.

In eastern Oregon these variations were for day temperatures between 62° and 90°, and for night temperatures between 40° and 64°.

Good rains fell in the Willamette valley and coast districts Friday and Saturday, and showers occurred Saturday in southern Oregon.

In the Columbia River valley and about Baker City the weather was cloudy and threatening all the week and small showers occurred nearly every day. The cut grain in this section has not yet been injured to any great extent by these rains, but threshing has been hindered and fears are entertained that the unprotected grain will be damaged unless fair weather comes soon.

The late sown wheat in Umatilla county is turning out better than the early sown, and some 40 bushel yields are reported.

Correspondents report the following thrashing yields this week: Multnomah county, wheat 4 to 8 bushels, oats 10 to 15, peas about 15; Polk county, wheat 3 to 12, oats 10 to 22; Columbia county, wheat 7 to 10, oats 15 to 20, barley 25 to 35; Douglas county, wheat about 7; Marion county, wheat 7, oats 13; Yamhill county, oats 10 to 20, barley 15 to 30; Linn county, wheat 3 to 17, oats 8 to 30; Lane county, wheat 5, oats 12½; Clackamas county, fall wheat 8, spring wheat 8, fall oats 20, spring oats 18; Coos county, barley about 40.

Wheat and oats in the Willamette valley, besides yielding very poorly, are light in weight, and the crops as a whole, is very unsatisfactory.

Corn and potatoes are doing nicely.

Hop picking has just begun and the hops are reported of extra good quality, and nearly an average crop will be harvested.

Gardens and pastures have been improved by the rains, and stock generally is in fine condition.

Prune drying will be general this week. The little prunes are abundant and of a fine flavor, but they are rather smaller than usual. The Fellenberg prunes are extra good, both in size and quality, but owing to the spring frosts, a very short crop will be marketed.

Apples continue promising.

**That Game Law.**

ED JOURNAL.—Since there are various plans proposed for the amendment of the game laws concerning upland birds, and also claims of numerous violations of these laws, a short discussion of present conditions under the law, and of some of the proposed amendments may be of interest to the readers of THE JOURNAL. It must be admitted that something is wrong either in the law itself or in the respect for it which people ought to feel, as a game warden would be dead indeed did he fail to hear the reports of game in all directions from Salem, on certain days.

If the law is for the protection of the birds it is a dismal failure, but if it is for the protection of a few people who will attempt to kill off all the birds before the season opens and before those who keep the law have a chance to hunt for them, it is an eminent success.

If we are to have a game law at all, let us observe it and all have an equal chance. If not let us repeal it and have an equal chance in the extermination of our beautiful game birds.

If the law is to be used to raise thousands of these magnificent fowls for slaughter, let it be done in such a manner that the food supply they furnish will, as nearly as possible, benefit all the people, and not a few only who kill them before the open season. If the law is so amended as to change the open season, it ought not to commence earlier than the first of September as the youngest birds are then rather small for shooting. Perhaps under the circumstances it would be better to have the open season, for these birds, extend from Sept. 1st to Nov. 1st, of each year.

Upon reflection, it savors too much of monopoly to have game warden drawing pay for hounding free American citizens. Besides there is the danger of the law being enforced against the unfortunate and excusable violator, while the guilty and inexcusable one escapes. True ordinary guardians of the law, backed by the law-abiding citizens, ought to be as trustworthy in the enforcement of one law as another.

Woodburn and all points north \$1. Tickets will be good only on the Albany local going and returning, and under no circumstances will they be extended or use permitted on other trains.

This will give Sunday visitors to Portland six hours in the city, and will afford the country people, who cannot find time to make the trip on week days, an opportunity to spend a pleasant Sunday in the metropolis at a small expense.

If the experiment is successful these excursions will be continued during the summer months next season.
