LETTERS OF A TRAVELER

SALEM LADY WRITES ENTERTAININGLY OF HER EXPERIENCES IN EUROPE.

Describes the Sights in England, at the Paris Exposition and on the Continent.

ROTTERDAM, Holland, 5 p. m., July 24. I have been a week without mail, and it will be another week before I reach Paris, where I hope to hear from you. Well, Holland far surpasses my fondest dreams so far, and we have only seen a very little of it—but the canals and boats and large windmills are up to my expectations, and there are a great many more of them than I thought.

We left London at 8:30 last evening, rode on the train for about two hours—an awful crowd—then took a large steamer which could not begin to furnish sleeping accommodations for all. I was pretty blue with the thought of sitting on deck all night, for, with all my wraps on, I was chilled through. But a bright thought came to me and I went to the stewardess and asked her if she could not possibly find me a place to lie down, at the same time holding out in my hand a silver piece. "Money talks," over here, especially, and I had a real comfortable lounge. Papa went and did likewise, so we both got some sleep, but we had to get up about four o'clock and did not get to bed till 12, so we have been sleeping this afternoon. We are in luck to have our wheels here, but mine has cost me a small fortune already. There are no cabs or buses that I have seen, and only one street car, but the roads are splendid and no hills.

The Hague is only 14 miles from here, and we expect to go there tomorrow on our wheels—we will take a ride this evening, too.

Papa reached London Friday night, and all day Saturday we were together down town and in the afternoon we took a ride down the Thames to Greenwich and how I did enjoy it. We took a good many snap shots—reached home just in time for supper and then went to the opera to hear Melba, in "Romeo and Juliet," at 80 cents per head. How is that? We heard Edouard de Reszki (forget how to spell it), too. Oh, it was fine! But we suffered with the heat. It is very warm today, and I am melting away just now. We are at the Victoria Hotel, which is right on the bank of the Maas river, and a canal at the side—so we can sit and see hundreds and thousands of boats go by. I never saw so many before in all my life.

HARLEM, July 26.—We have been "on the go" constantly. Came here from Rotterdam yesterday morning. Went to Amsterdam by train yesterday noon and returned in the evening. I would love to stay here a month if you and baby were still here. We go to the Hague today.

THE HAGUE, Saturday, July 28. I finally persuaded papa to go on to Paris and leave me here, and if I had my choice I would only be in Paris three or four days and spend all the time here. It is simply charming. Papa and I went on our wheels yesterday morning to the coast, about three miles out over a fine sandy beach; and today I went alone and made a sketch of an old fishing boat up on the beach. It is so interesting there, with the people in their Dutch costumes and the fishing boats coming and going. This morning as I was sketching I had about 20 Dutch children all around me, and I had a fine time. I would tell them the names of things in English and they would tell me what they were in Dutch.

Unless we explain that we are Americans and not English they make fun of us. Yesterday the children followed me, pointing their fingers at me and hooting, until I said in a very vigorous manner: "Not English, not English; American!" Then they were very much interested and could not know enough about me. They all think I am rich (because I have a fine looking camera and a watch, I guess) and they continually beg for money. I made them understand this morning that the children don't do that in America. I told them to sing for me, and there was such a din that I had to stop painting to hold it up for them to see and they were very appreciative and shouted and yelled as if I had paid them for it. Yesterday I bought the cutest pair of baby's wooden shoes you could imagine. I saw them sitting on a sand heap, where the children had put them while they were playing, and I never saw anything so cunning in my life. I began to bargain for them right away, offering 35 of their cents, 14 cents in our money, which is more than a new pair would cost. The little girl who had the baby in charge did not want to let me have them because her mother was not at home to ask, but the other children just made her do it because they knew it was a bargain.

I want to go into their houses so much, but I can't because I don't speak Dutch. I have had some experience trying to make them understand me, and it is really awful not to know a few words. Today I was looking about so much that I lost my way coming home, and when I inquired of a policeman I had to try several words before I could get one that he understood. I said, with a great deal of sign language: "I am lost," and he understood that. Then I said: "Where is city—town—stores—shops—hotel," and only the last word he understood, but that put me right. You see, I did not even know the name of my hotel, it is such a terrible one to pronounce.

There is a good joke on papa and myself: when we left Harlem the other evening we took the wrong train and went to a city up north instead of coming south to the Hague. I insisted that we were going in the wrong direction, but papa thought not, so we were on the train for an hour, which is a long time in this small country; and how horrified

the passengers looked when they found that we intended to go to the Hague. We simply got off and waited on the platform till the Hague train came along, which was about half an hour's wait. We struck up quite an acquaintance with a Dutchman at the station, who could speak a little English and who had two sons in Chicago. He put us on our right train and must have told our conductor about us, for all the conductors along the line (they change often here) knew of our mistake without our telling them, and each one wore a peculiar grin when he punched our ticket, which was full of holes. But we did not have to pay any other fare, and reached our hotel here about midnight. Then there were not two rooms left, so many Americans had come in that day. But they had one large room with two beds, one in a little alcove with portieres, and we took it, and I still have that room, because the house is full. There are four ladies here who made the same mistake as we did—went to Amsterdam instead of the Hague—and they not only had to pay extra fares, but were fined \$3.50 each for riding without a ticket to that place—so papa and I got off easy.

The cooking in Holland is more like ours than any we have found yet, and their butter is salted. Their little silver ten cent pieces (four cents in our money) are so pretty I am going to try to save one—it bears the queen's head when she was a little girl. I can make change pretty well in English, French and Dutch money. All I have against this country are the fleas. Speaking of fleas reminds me of dogs, and you never find a lazy dog here unless he is a very small one. They all work hard. They are hatched to the vegetable and other carts, so that they are under the cart in the shade, and the boy or man pushes from behind.

They say it is terribly hot in Paris, and I wrote to papa this morning telling him I would stay in Holland till next Friday if he would let me. I will go to Delft (where numerous windmills are) about Tuesday if all goes well, and then on to Rotterdam.

I was sorry to miss the photo progress, but I would miss more than that to get to stay in Holland and sketch.
