THE POSITION OF THE LINCOLN-REPUBLICAN CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

Isn't it about time The Sacramento Bee ceased to be referred to as a Republican paper? The editor and part owner of The Bee is a member of the Press Committee of the Democratic State Central Committee. That surely ought to be sufficient evidence of the political faith of any gentleman. It is unthinkable that a gentleman belonging to any party should allow himself on a Committee working for an opposing party. The Bee is an out-and-out Bryanite, and should be placed where it rightfully belongs.—Redlands Telegraph.

There were tens of thousands of good Republicans who were out-and-out Bryanites in 1896, and the year 1900 will not find any diminution in their ranks.

What is it to be a Republican? It is to take it to be a believer in and a defender of the essential principles of Liberty and Humanity put forth by the martyr of that great organization. A man is all the better Republican at heart if he refuses to steal the liberty of Abraham Lincoln to serve Mark Hanna in—Sacramento Bee.

In his letter declining the honor of membership in the State Democratic Press Committee Chas. K. McClatchy, editor of The Bee says:

I have just reached home on my return from the annual Summer vacation, and I take the very first opportunity to respectfully decline the honor of membership in the Press Committee of the Democratic State Central Committee. The reason therefor is that neither my brother nor myself, although both enthusiastic supporters of Wm. J. Bryan, is a Democrat, or have ever been a Democrat. We believe that we still voice the principles fought for through so many years by that stalwart Republican founder of the Bee, James McClatchy, and that in ardently championing Wm. J. Bryan and the essentials for which he stands, we have not gone over to the Democracy but are still faithful to the sterling doctrines of true Republicanism, laid down by Abraham Lincoln and the other founders of the great party.

Although compelled in consistency to decline this honor, I can assure you that The Bee will fight for Wm. J. Bryan and great truths of which he is the ablest advocate in this campaign, as earnestly, as unflinchingly, and as consistently as it did in the campaign of 1896. As The Bee now battles for Bryan and the vital principles of his campaign, it can be said in a way to be working in the cause of Democracy. But it will just as earnestly denounce the doctrines of the Democratic Party and oppose its candidates, whenever those doctrines shall assert from the principles which this paper has advocated for forty-three years, and whenever its candidates stand for the claims as against the masses.

The above expresses the position of the Silver-Republican or Lincoln-Republican press so forcibly that The JOURNAL reproduces it for the purpose of setting itself clearly before the public in this campaign.

Twelve or fifteen years ago and from its origin the Republican party, "from tradition and interest," favored bimetalism. Everybody nearly was a bimetalist, and especially the Oregon Republicans, who as late as 1896 in their state convention voted down the single gold standard offered by Senator Dolph and reaffirmed the above quoted platform adopted at Minneapolis.

Senator Mitchell was re-elected without a protest against his free silver record, and he undoubtedly carried the legislature 1896 for a third term, when the Republican party declared for the gold standard in its national convention, with a pledge to use its best endeavors to secure international bimetalism. All that occurred after that is recent history. Mr. Mitchell, stumped the state for McKinley and held the Silver Republicans, or enough of them, to carry the state against Bryan on a narrow margin, by representing that the Republican party was as good a silver party as ever and would prove the true friend of

the white metal. Of course, Mitchell was defeated as he deserved.

Since then the country has been committed to the gold standard, and as the financial and revenue policies of the country should not be changed every few years, The JOURNAL has taken the position that the monetary and tariff policy of the country has been settled for a period of years at least, and that the newer issues of trusts and expansion will decide this presidential election. These are very important matters. How far we should attempt to control organizations of capital and great industries is an open question, and both the Republican and the Democratic platforms take grounds for control, though we think the Bryan platform and Mr. Bryan's record and utterances are more specific than McKinley's.

What the foreign policy of the American people should be, there is the great issue. While The JOURNAL upheld the administration in its conduct of the war from the first move toward expelling Spain from Cuba, even unto quelling the insurrection in the Philippines, and it takes a hopeful optimistic view as to the final outcome of the problems growing out of the war with Spain, it believes Mr. Bryan is right in opposing the holding of any of these provinces as conquered territory. If they are not fit for a territorial form of government and finally to become self-governing states. They can never properly come under the provisions of the constitution. They cannot remain under the American flag as colonial dependencies or subjected races. This is a serious problem for any American administration to deal with, and whoever is elected president will be entitled to the support of all intelligent citizens.

When Mark Hanna and his crowd make their appeal almost exclusively to what they are pleased to call the business interests of the country, it is just as well for thinking people to see that the laboring and producing class have some interests in government that our rulers ought to respect. So far as we are concerned, it is dignified at the crowd who run the administration, from Oregon to Washington, more than love of democracy that impels us to support Bryan, and if Oregon is carried for Bryan it will be as an expression of this disgust on the part of Republicans who stand by the old principles of the founders of their party. This is an attempt at a fair statement of the whole situation from the standpoint of an independent non-partisan newspaper. The reasons given for the support of Bryan may not be satisfactory to all our readers but we accord them the privilege of every American citizen, and we shall not impugn their motives if they vote the Socialist, or Prohibition, or any other ticket.

WHY THEY LIE ABOUT THE JOURNAL.
The impoverished intellectual Siwash who writes on the Woodburn paper lies about The JOURNAL in order to attack the striking draymen of Portland. The JOURNAL quoted the Portland gold standard paper which showed that the draymen could not live on the wages they were getting and pay the advanced prices for everything they had to buy. Then the degenerate digger of the Woodburn baggage asserts that this office does not pay living wages.

After running a newspaper ten years at Salem where there are more chances of getting employment than in most towns of this size, the matter of wages that are paid in any business can safely be left to the conditions surrounding the businessman and wage-earner, conditions from which no businessman can escape

and do business. No one has ever worked on The JOURNAL and been faithful to its interests but was paid all that the same person could get elsewhere, and sometimes more.

But these petty \$1.50 a week liars do not lie without a purpose. There is method in their persistent slanders, because all these fellows are the crumb-pickers of the mercenary brigade that has lived off plundering the people of Oregon from time past. Give one of these camp-following flates a bone and he will bark at anyone he is directed to, and the whole predatory gang know of but one obstacle in their way to a living and that is the existence of an independent paper at Salem. From the Patterson-Bingham-Mitchell-McBride gang down to the smallest tail-curling cur their sole duty in life is to lie about The JOURNAL and its editor, because it gets across their path. They know that its policies are fatal to their graft and small, and unless the supreme court of Oregon renews their injunction and gives them a receiver, The JOURNAL will continue to be run in the interest of the people.
