BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 31.—Organized labor representatives from all over the state are holding a meeting here today for the purpose of forming a state federation. It is held by the labor leader here that such a federation is the only missing link in the almost perfect chain of labor organizations in the state, and it is to supply this that the meeting was called. The allotment in attendance is: five delegates to each central body; one delegate for each hundred members of any union; one delegate for each union with less than one hundred members.

Turkey's Jubilee.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Turkey, Aug. 31.—Sultan Abdul Hamid has ordered for today a grand jubilee in celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of his accession to the throne. Great preparations have been made to give due honor to the auspicious occasion. All the buildings along both sides of the Bosphorus, which is 20 miles long and varies from one to one-half mile in breadth, are gaily decorated, and tonight will undergo magnificent electrical illuminating. Thousands of electric lamps are strung along this much-used water-way and when lighted will present an imposing spectacle. Grand services are being held in the mosques and temples and will continue tonight. This afternoon a magnificent banquet is spread for vast crowds of people. Deputations from all Mussulman communities in the world are present, including the Shah, Khedive, and several of the rulers of the Balkan states.

The Sultan also intends to inaugurate some great works for the public good. Among these are a new water-supply for this city and a new university. The poets and historians of the empire will contribute with accounts of the Sultan's pious works and the great things he has accomplished. These will be translated into all languages and distributed throughout the world.

SALEM HAS A PRESS CLUB.

Newspaper Workers of the Capital City Form a Union.

A meeting was held Thursday evening at the office of Frank Davey to organize a local press club. There was a good attendance of the newspaper men of the city and a permanent organization was effected.

The purpose expressed by those present at the meeting was to bring all legitimate newspaper people of the city into a closer fraternal and social relation, to encourage literary workers who are connected with the press, and by united effort to promote their own interests and through the organization to look after matters of a public nature.

The Proceedings.

Ex-Gov. J. H. Fletcher was chosen chairman, and Frank Davey secretary. The chair appointed A. W. Prescott, Frank Davey and E. Hofer a committee on constitution and by laws. During a recess the committee drafted a constitution which provides that the membership shall consist of men and women actively engaged in newspaper work in Salem or whose chief occupation is journalism. The usual officers are provided for and were elected as follows, after the adoption of the report:

J. H. Fletcher, president; E. Hofer, vice-president; Frank Davey, secretary; treasurer: A. W. Prescott, H. G. Guild and Scott Bosworth, executive committee, the president and secretary being also members of the committee, ex-officio.

It was agreed that the officers and members of the club should meet with Mrs. Edyth Tozier Weathered on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock to ascertain what is necessary to be done on Press Day at the State Fair, and to assist in doing it.

The club adjourned at the call of the president.

An Evening Runaway.

Thursday afternoon Mrs. Florence Moran, an employee of the asylum hired a team in this city to drive to Riley Cooper's hop yard near Independence, to bring home her son who was working there. On their return they left the hop yard just before dark and when near Mrs. Holston's farm near Eola, the team became frightened at a broken down wagon and shied out of the road and the buggy was overturned and the occupants hurled to the ground. Both escaped without being injured.

The team arrived in this city last night about 9 o'clock without any buggy, and the liverman in company with a Journal reporter drove to Folk county in search of the missing driver. When the lady left yesterday she did not inform the liverman as to what hop yard she was going to and it was some time before they could find which direction she had taken; but she was finally located at Eola and brought back home. The buggy was found in west Salem somewhat demoralized, and brought in.

LETTERS OF A SALEM TRAVELER

Mrs. Wiggins Writes of Her Experiences in Europe.

Describes the Slights in England, at the Paris Exposition and on the Continent.

THE HAGUE, July 31st, 1900.

Just had a note from Papa, inclosing your letter. Papa says it is still awfully hot in Paris, and that I was wise to stay where it is cool. I had to wear my jacket all day today, you know this is so near the coast.

I want to tell you of my good fortune—no, not good fortune, but Providence. You know I was so disappointed not to go into the Dutch houses here in the country, well this morning I went out on my wheel—followed a canal into the country, taking a few photos and looking for something to sketch this afternoon.

I found a fine old wind-mill, put my camera on the tripod, and in moving around in the deep grass and weeds I almost stumbled over a young man who was painting in oils. He spoke to me in Dutch and I answered in English. Then he said: "Oh, You are English, are you?" and we proceeded to converse in English. As usual there were a dozen children following me, and the boys were bound to be in the picture, right in front of the lens.

I could do nothing with them, but he made them stand around, and posed a little girl for me. He is a very nice young man, a Christian, and interested in the Y. M. C. A. work, too, when he offered to go with me on a wheel to his country relatives to sketch and photograph the interior of their houses I did not hesitate to accept his offer, and he seemed so pleased to be able to show me Holland. I'll never come here again without learning a little Dutch, or Holland, rather; they don't call it Dutch.

Yesterday the "Great Market" was held, and I got on my wheel about four o'clock and wandered down there. I did not expect to see much; but what was my surprise to see three or four long blocks of tent booths, with everything you could imagine for sale; clothing, flowers, pottery, stoves, fish, regular junk shops, fruit, hotcakes and bread, shoes, hats, candy, etc., etc.

Of course you can guess which ones drew me like powerful magnets—the junk shops—and oh, what a temptation it was to buy the things I could not carry home. I see, I don't covet the beautiful jewels I see, but I'm afraid I do the copper and brass.

The people here hate the English and write books against them and sell them right here.

Thursday is the queen's mother's birthday. They are making great preparations for a celebration.

August 5.—It has been very stormy for two days. Yesterday I sat in the dining room window and sketched the street. There were two beautiful Holland flags floating in the breeze, left from the decorations of the day before.

Thursday we went out to some old houses belonging to the servants of a friend of Mr. Vanderhoop, and because it was a holiday they had gone to the city, so we could not get in. I was so disappointed. Mr. Vanderhoop thinks that we Americans are so reckless, and when I would ride my wheel within six feet of the canal he was sure I would fall in! And when I carried an umbrella on my wheel he fairly held his breath, and then exclaimed: "My woe! but you are clever!" That sounds just like an Englishman, doesn't it?

I expect to leave here early Monday morning, so that I may reach Rotterdam by 8 a. m., and Paris that night. I received a telegram from papa on Thursday, saying that he had left for Germany to get away from the heat of Paris. I have been almost too cold all day, and had to sit with my jacket on part of the time. It has been so pleasant here, and I have been feeling so well all the time, but I fear that Paris will take away all of my ambition. I am more than ready to go home.

I must tell you about my narrow escape. I thought I would go around the corner, about two of our blocks away, to get some fruit, as I could buy five times as much for the money as at the hotel, so I rode my wheel to avoid wet feet, as my rubbers are in Rotterdam, and had to carry an umbrella, as it was raining quite hard. I got there all right and was just starting back when I had the narrowest escape of my life. A man was walking directly in front of my wheel, crowsaw, and the wind was blowing so he couldn't hear my bell. He finally heard just in time to keep me from striking him, and by that time I was on the street car track, and looked up to see a heavy wagon and horse coming toward me at a very fast pace and almost upon me. I hesitated half a second as to which way I should turn and then it was too late, for the horse's head was over my handle bars, still coming, with his head drawn back to keep from striking me. Oh! but he looked like a monster. I thought of a thousand things in that instant, and then jumped, wheel and all, onto the narrow two and one-half foot sidewalk without a hundredth part of a second to spare, and then I thought my foot would be run over. I landed on the spokes of my wheel, and I tell you I was thankful for that escape. The horse was going too fast to stop, and he would have trampled me to death. The driver did not even stop, and the men who came to my help jabbered away and looked daggers at him. My handle bars were twisted, but the wheel was uninjured. You know "pride always goes before a fall," and the lady who sold the fruit came to see the "wonder" mount with an umbrella in her hand, and she looked so admiringly at me when I mounted easily, that I was quite pleased with myself, hence deserved my fall.
