Ben. Taylor Returns From Nome City

Tells of Postal Facilities in the Far North. Help Establish First Free Delivery. News From Salemites.

Ben Taylor, the well-known Salem letter carrier, who has been at Cape Nome since last May and who returned Thursday morning, was seen at his home on Asylum Avenue, by a JOURNAL reporter and gave an account of his experiences substantially as follows:

He left here May 24th, in company with his brother, Oscar Taylor, Fred Lockley, Thomas Holman, the George Brothers, Billy Wright, Gus, George and Frank Kaiser, Mrs. Finster and Mrs. Ingersoll. Had a very pleasant voyage going up and met the first ice in Behring's sea. It was the captain's first trip up but he took his boat through all all right. At Dutch Harbor the passengers coaled the ship thereby saving the company about \$2000 for labor. The accommodations were good except for the crowding. They arrived at Nome June 17th, landing two days later and pitching their tent on the beach.

Taylor and Lockley went to work immediately for Uncle Sam, and under the supervision of John Clum, established the first free delivery system.

The postoffice was a little wooden building 23 by 30 feet, one story and employed 33 clerks. It was the largest general delivery system in the United States, and there were 700 boxes, 70 of them for one single letter of the alphabet. The post office was open day and night.

Ben had 1200 people to whom to deliver mail and it took him 20 hours to make up his load and go his rounds. It was a difficult matter to establish the system, owing to the fact that all were strangers; that there was a constant shifting of location; changes in the streets, tents coming down and wooden buildings going up as if by magic; and the population constantly coming and going.

When the free delivery was first started the people would not believe that it could or would be done, but when it was in successful operation, they were immensely pleased. When Ben would start down a street with his sack of mail, the whole population would crowd around him as though he was Santa Claus, all asking for mail.

The carriers were paid \$5 a day and boarded themselves.

For several weeks after his arrival Ben suffered considerably from the Alaska grip, which was epidemic amongst the natives. They were dying by hundreds and in many cases did not bury their dead.

Considering the number of people, the town was quiet and orderly. Toward the last there was some robbery going on at night from the tents, but not so much as has been represented. There are a good many saloons and a great deal of drinking but not much drunkenness. The military is doing good work in keeping order.

Mr. Taylor corroborates what has been reported regarding the former richness of the beach and its present work-out condition; the fact that all claims are over staked and in litigation; that too many people rushed in; that there are some rich mines being operated. He saw one cleanup of \$30,000 from two days run in an ordinary sluice box, the expense being less than 5 per cent.

There are plenty of provisions and fuel and a good many will winter there. The first rains commenced two weeks ago, providing water for the creek claims.

Ben saw nearly all the Salem people who were up there. Capt. Bert Hatch, brother of Geo. Hatch, is running a confectionery and cigar store. Ben Kummer has built a cabin and will remain all winter. Holt and Reeves left Nome in a boat, well fixed with provisions and are probably all right. Arthur, Fred and Abe West and Jack Harding are retailing beef at the "Oregon Market" and will come out all right. L. A. Davidson, formerly in the Court street fish market was at Nome. Mrs. Finster and Mrs. Ingersoll were still at Nome and well.

Mrs. Nichols is running her hospital successfully. Tom Holman, the George Brothers, B. C. Ward and J. C. Martin have a good mine on Hungry creek.

Don Truett was met in Seattle on his way home from Dawson and will be here in a few days.

Ben brought home a few nuggets and many interesting photos of Alaska scenery. He lost nothing financially on the trip and is well satisfied with his experience. He advises no one to go to Nome unless he has a job ready for him there or a claim to go to work on.

W. A. RUMMEL'S INJURIES FATAL

From the Effect of the Emery Wheel Explosion

Pieces of the Emery Wheel and of His Hat Were Found Driven Through His Skull and Into His Brain

W. A. Rummel, who was injured Thursday noon by the bursting of an emery wheel, as related in the JOURNAL, died at the Salem hospital at 8:55 p. m., without recovering consciousness.

His injuries were such that no reasonable hope of recovery was entertained. Pieces of the broken emery wheel and of the hat were driven into the brain and the wonder was expressed by the attending physicians that death was so long delayed.

About a year ago Mr. Rummel had a narrow escape from a similar accident. An emery wheel on which he was working bursted but none of the pieces struck him.

Wm. A. Rummel was born in Richland county, Ohio, Jan. 31, 1863, and there he was married on Dec. 24, 1889, to Miss Effie Kaylor, who survives him. He came to Salem about 8 years ago, bringing a cider mill and combined forces with Mr. Mize, who had a feed mill in South Salem. Afterward he established a feed and cider mill on his own account. When the old South Salem school building was sold, Mr. Rummel bought it and moved it down to the present location on Commercial street where he fitted it up and there conducted his business for about a year, making his residence in the same building.

Deceased was an industrious, hard-working man, with considerable mechanical ability. He was a member of the Congregational church in the East. He left no will, and his property consists of the mill property where he met his death.

Besides his widow, he leaves his parents, three brothers and three sisters, all except the bereaved widow residing in Richland county, Ohio. An uncle, Alfred Rummel, resides in Southern Oregon.

The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. Saturday from the residence of Mrs. Mize, two doors west of the brick store in South Salem. Rev. W. C. Kantner will conduct the services and burial will take place in City View Cemetery.

HOP S ADVANCING
Contracts at 12 and 14 Cents Being Made

C. Bunning, of St. Paul, has sold 5000 pounds of hops to H. J. Miller, of Astoria, at 12 cents. The contract for this sale was made on August 28, and it is the first contract filed in this county in which the stipulated price is above 11 cents. According to reports, there is strong competition among buyers and still better prices are expected. One grower's reports having refused an offer of 14 cents.

A contract executed August 18 by Albert Carlson, of Astoria, conveys to L. L. Hentel Bros, the crop of hops on 14 acres of land near McKee, Marion county. The crop, which will amount to about 4000 pounds, goes at 10 cents. There is little doubt but that 12 to 14 cents is being offered for hops at Salem on the quiet.
