Mrs. Shafer had her infant son in her arms and had no power over the animal.

For Commutation of Sentence.
Mrs. Lou G. Marsters, of Gold Beach, a sister of Coleman Gillespie, who is under sentence of death for the murder of Mrs. Christina Edson last winter, was at the Governor's office Wednesday interceding for the life of her brother.

Gillespie has been sentenced to be hanged on October 5. The object of the intercession was to obtain a commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment.

It is urged in his behalf that he was weak minded and easily led by others. It is also claimed that he did not have a fair trial, and it is claimed that the prosecuting attorney did not give the defendant a fair prosecution.

Hopicking Ending.
In many of the yards in Marion and Polk counties they have finished picking and in all yards a good yield has been reported. Some of the yards will finish up about Saturday, while in one or two of the large yards they will not finish before the last of next week.

In the Francis and Croican yards they will finish about next Tuesday. In the Al Jermain yard, on Howell Prairie, they will also finish up about next Tuesday.

The McNary yard, in Polk county, is through picking. If good weather continues they will soon have this year's crop all under shelter, which means many dollars to the growers.

BARRIE.—On Wednesday, September 12, 1900, at 7:45 p. m., at the home of her son, W. B. Barr, in Albany, Mrs. Ellen E. Barr, of Salem, at the advanced age of 83 years.

A Chinese Soloman.
Three men appeared before a judge in Honan, China, and each laid claim to the same woman as his wife. Not one of them would retire in favor of the other two, but each insisted that justice should be done to him. Finally the judge exclaimed, "Well, if you three men cannot come to some agreement nothing remains for me but to order that the woman shall be killed, as there is no other way in which the matter can be satisfactorily settled."

He then called for a large cup of wine, and when it was brought he poured in it to some dark powder and compelled the woman to drink it. Excited as she was, the woman speedily began to feel the effect of the strong liquor. She staggered when she tried to speak, and her flushed cheeks were an indication to the observers that the poison was working and that her end was near at hand.

This was the climax for which the judge had waited. When he saw that the woman was apparently dying, he called one of the three men who claimed her as wife and bade him remove her from the courtroom. This man, however, showed no inclination to do so, and the judge thereupon insisted that he renounce all rights to her. This he willingly did and so did the second man. Only one claimant was now left, and he agreed to remove the woman and to care for her until she died. Satisfied that he was her real husband, the judge called him and said: "You will not be sorry for acting in this manner. Have no fear for your wife, since she is in no danger of death. The liquor which she has drunk was ordinary wine, and the powder which I poured into it was nothing but brown sugar."

AT THE STATE FAIR GROUNDS

More Stalls Built to Accommodate Stock Entered.

Finest Display of Best Breeds and Animals on the Coast—Big Races Well Filled.

All indications now are favorable to one of the best state fairs ever held here, and the most successful for many years.

A JOURNAL reporter visited the fair grounds on Wednesday and picked up the following pointers:

W. T. Jackson, of Washington county, assisted by his wife are on the grounds preparing the Washington county exhibit and no doubt will have a fine display.

Sparks, of Reno, Nev., will exhibit 30 head of Herford cattle. This herd has been shown at all the Eastern fairs and is the finest herd on the coast.

Davis Brothers, of Dyer, Ind., will show 40 head of Victor hogs. This is a new breed and has never been shown in Oregon before.

Session & Co., of Los Angeles, Cal., will exhibit 30 head of Berkshire hogs and it is said to be one of the finest herds on the coast.

Glyde, of Sacramento, Cal., will exhibit a herd of Rambouillet sheep. This is a new variety of sheep and have never been shown in Oregon.

C. M. LaFollette, son of Alex. LaFollette, of Mission Bottom, has charge of the Marion county exhibit, and is now preparing the exhibits. Mr. LaFollette has two wagons out at present gathering up products. Mr. LaFollette invites the farmers of Marion county to join him and if any farmer has anything worthy of exhibition they will be glad to receive it.

Frank Galloway, of Central Point, Jackson county, will have headquarters near the stock yard and will show Galloway's waste proof feed box. F. E. and W. E. Hoover will assist Mr. Galloway in his display.

Hon. David Looney, of Jefferson, will arrive on Friday with 15 head of thoroughbred Jersey cows from one of the best herds in Oregon.

Supt. Savage, of the pavilion, says that the demand for space is large and that every foot of space will be taken up.

The Portland Land Company are asking for a space 10 by 40 to exhibit the display that they now have at the street fair. Letters are received daily from all over the state wanting space, and Eastern and Southern Oregon will have a fine display of fruits, grains, etc.

Work in the pavilion is progressing and carpenters are busily engaged in building new stalls and repairing the old ones.

A new judge's stand will be built and other improvements which add to the looks of the grounds.

During the absence of Thos. Holman, A. W. Veatch will have charge of the electric plant at the fair grounds and the lights are now ready for use.

The track is in the best of a condition and the grounds in general are much improved.

The camp grounds are as fine as can be found anywhere and plenty of good water.

Secretary Wisdom has received a letter from Dr. James Withycombe, of the Agricultural College, who is now at the California state fair in Sacramento. Dr. Withycombe writes that the cream of the California exhibits will be forwarded to Salem as soon as the fair closes at Sacramento.

A letter has also been received from A. L. Gage, of Union, saying that that gentleman will be down the latter part of this week with an exhibit, including 50 varieties of apples grown by himself.

Many varieties of these apples are new to Oregonians, and will form an interesting display to every visitor at the fair.

Every article placed on exhibition will be in its place by 6 o'clock Monday morning, September 17, so that when the gates are thrown open there will be no confusion to mar the pleasure of sight-seeing.

In former years the State Fair Board has been troubled to find stock to fill its stalls. The entries this year are so numerous that 100 extra stalls have been built, and from 50 to 100 more must be erected before Saturday. President Welner says that accommodations will be provided for all who come.

The speed programme promises to exceed any previous year and among the horses entered are the best to be found on the coast. About 100 harness horses will enter the races besides the many runners of note. On Wednesday the Salem Chamber of Commerce \$1000 stake for 2:18 class will be paced and the following entries have been made for that event.
