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HOLD ONTO WHEAT AND HOPS.

The Journal does not think the growers of wheat and hops have any risk to incur by holding onto their wheat and hops. If the wheat is in a good granary or store-room or well warehouse it is safe from any further reduction in price. Dollar wheat will not be realized. Mr. A. F. Myers returned this week from Sherman county where he sold his wheat for 44 cents a bushel. When the wheat is in market that has to be marketed by those in need of money right after threshing, buyers will begin to find difficulty in getting lots of good grain and the price will go up.

The same is true of hops. There is a short crop and the grower who can hold his crop in the bale until the most favorable market is found for him will make money in doing it. We do not usually offer advice on these matters but it seems to us wrong to hasten sales under all the circumstances. Usually in a presidential year there is a falling market but this year the worst that can happen, or is claimed to happen if Bryan goes in, is the blow to the stomach that the trusts will get. They may not be able to maintain prices on what they sell.

But no one predicts a fall in wheat or any staple product. The Republicans are not promising the farmer a dollar a bushel this year for his wheat. They are not claiming that they put up the price of hops or prunes. In fact, they know these things are beyond the reach of control of any party or administration. Organization of the producer, as well as of the manufacturer may advance the price of an article. The fruit growers and the hop growers have felt the benefits of organization and should rely more on the benefits they will get on that line than on political promises.

MARK HANNA SHOULD BE RETIRED.

There is a feeling among thinking people that Mark Hanna is an inflammatory element in this presidential campaign. As chairman of the National Republican committee he has gone on the stump of his own accord, and he has brought upon himself and his party not a little ridicule and criticism. His pretense to be talking to the labor elements is offensive, because until he was alarmed at the prospect of Bryan's success this year he has never been known as a sympathetic friend or adviser of organized labor.

It was announced early in the spring that the National committee would be reorganized, and he would not be chairman. He said himself he would not again take the office of chief director of the campaign. But after all Republican had drawn a sigh of relief at the mere thought of getting rid of him as the head and front of modern Republicanism, lo, and behold he was plumped back into the party's neck and he has been a veritable old man of the sea.

He has an idea that he is popular with the people and the idol of his party. He believes that he is a great debater and challenged Bryan to a joint canvass. He imagines himself a champion of the strikers in the Pennsylvania coal fields. He thinks that he is a great brass epigot through which the Almighty Father taps the resources of the universe and permits prosperity to trickle down on the feet

and the unjust. And a great many Republicans honestly believe and worship him as a great man and model of destiny. But the general public does not believe these things. They can see through the coarseness of the man. They can see in him the stinking death's head of commercialism and materialism that has very little regard for the rights of the masses except to look to it that they may have enough to eat. The higher aspirations for justice and equality and good government do not spring from the breasts of such as Hanna and if the Republican managers do not retire him the people will retire the party that tolerates his leadership.

REFUND THE COUNTY FLOATING DEBT.

Just at present the county officials in charge of county finances are happy because a large collection of taxes has reduced the floating debt, and they see no necessity for employing a popular loan to put the county on a cash basis, but the bulk of the taxes are in and for the next six months debt will again pile up. So long as the county does not cash warrants all warrants issued must be stamped and draw interest and in their turn be called in. So the debt even if smaller operates as an endless chain, the warrant dealers taking their six per cent cream off every dollar of county taxes expended by the county.

If the county court would secure money enough on a popular loan to put the county on a cash basis it would save the difference between six per cent interest and whatever it could get money for. Some say the county could get money at 3 or 3½ per cent. But even at four per cent the county would save one-third of all the interest and have no more floating debt created. The treasurer would cash all warrants at par and the county warrant ring would have little to call them to the courthouse, except to pay their taxes. Put the county on a cash basis and there would be no temptation for the county treasurer to buy warrants with county funds or private funds. This has been the custom in the past.

But unless the county court is disposed to take the popular view of this subject nothing will be done. Objections can be found in the constitution and the laws to refunding by means of a popular loan. There are interested parties who would enjoin the county court, if they could, from undertaking a popular loan. But it is doubtful if the courts would sustain any scheme to restrain the county court from acting as financial agent for the county. The county court has general control of the county finances. It is its duty to reduce the burdens of the people as far as possible. The county court has made loans in the past and could do it again. The banks, then why not of the people? There is a disposition in the minds of some lawyers to always find obstacles in the way of a reform when anything is asked to be done for the taxpayers. But almost everything has been undertaken and some things have been done against the taxpayer in spite of the laws and the constitution. In fact the present county debt is unconstitutional.

HIGH PRAISES FOR THE STATE FAIR

From an editorial in the German paper, at Mt. Angel, we translate as follows: The fortieth state exposition or state fair, that was first held at Oregon City, closed its doors on the 12th of September. The Board of Agriculture can look back with satisfaction and just pride upon its labors. Their pains and exertions are well repaid by the many compliments that have been showered upon them. It can be confidently claimed that the fair just closed was the best and the most far-reaching in its results than any that has been

held. The exhibits were of a general state-wide character, while in former years they were mostly local, a county fair in reality, while labelled a state fair.

The happy result of this year's exposition is due to the selection of men on the Board from various counties who had had experience, were competent, and who pushed the work. The fair was in fact well worth seeing. It was in some respects magnificent. The various kinds of stock and dairy cattle were represented by beautiful specimens that were daily paraded. The poultry exhibit was interesting and rich. Displays were sent from remote centers of this industry. This part of the exhibit was very attractive and lively.

The pavilion offered a surprising variety of exhibits, in which the products of native industries, agriculture and horticulture, were heaped up in an attractive manner. Whoever gazed upon it all, especially the glorious displays of nut and stone fruits, must have been impressed with the thought that Oregon is indeed a richly blessed region. Most noteworthy, as was perfectly proper, was the section allotted to Marion county. But Lane, Linn, Benton and Washington counties had fine displays. The Agricultural college, at Corvallis, was also well represented.

The fair will prove very beneficial for the whole State of Oregon. The fact is established that it is possible even in a thinly-settled community to conduct a successful state exposition if the right persons are placed at the front of the enterprise.

"ONLY A FARMER."

At a recent address, Webster Davis, lately assistant secretary of the interior, told the following story, and paid this eloquent tribute to the men who till the soil and earn their bread "in the sweat of their faces." Mr. Davis said:

"Not long ago in the capital of our Republic I took occasion to tell of the heroism and chivalry of the fighting Boer, when a British sympathizer sarcastically remarked: 'Oh, he is only a farmer and nothing more.' Then I thought of the men who in the long ago planted the first germs of civilization in South Africa, whose I there followed William the Silent when he wrested liberty from the hand of the Spanish tyrant, and I remembered that they were only farmers and nothing more. And who was it that fought the wild beasts and the still wilder savages of that mysterious land in order to lay the foundation of two splendid little Republics, for the happiness of their posterity? It was only farmers and nothing more."

"Ah, yes! It was only a farmer, and nothing more, who climbed the steep sides of Majuba Hill to drive from the summit the soldiers of British tyranny and oppression, and who at Brinkfontein sprang and Laing's Nek fought like chivalrous knights of old for liberty, justice and equality."

"It was only a farmer, and nothing more, who at Spion's Kop performed deeds of war, who, leaping like a panther from bowlder to bowlder, ascended that hill amid a fearful storm of leaden hail, and covered its summit with wounded and dying British, and drove the survivors back across the Tugela river."

"It was only a farmer, and nothing more, who in the embankments of Modder River, with but 3,000 comrades, with only four cannon and two Maxim's, for six days held in check the flower of the British army, consisting of 40,000 men, under command of the greatest general of the British Empire, with 100 of the greatest cannon to be found in all the world, but finally yielded to overwhelming numbers and now lies dreaming at St. Helena of liberty and a free Republic."

"I remember, too, that in our own land it was only a farmer, and nothing more, that poured out the crimson tide of his life on Lexington green, as a willing sacrifice on Liberty's altar, who suffered with Washington amid the sorrows of Valley Forge, and who at Saratoga, Monmouth, Bunker Hill and Brandywine performed deeds of valor that wedded his name to glory and undying fame."

"It was only a farmer, and nothing more, who stood with brave old Andrew Jackson behind the cotton bales at New Orleans and taught old England that easier were it to hurl a rooted mountain from its base than to force the yoke of slavery upon men determined to be free, and who at Chapultepec, Palo Alto, Cerro Gordo and Buena Vista carried the banner of the republic to triumph and glory."

"It was only a farmer, and nothing more, who climbed the side of Missionary Ridge over shrieking musketeers, belching cannon and valiant men to behold the flowers of victory that blossomed upon its crest, and who walked above the clouds on Lookout Mountain, swept down the valley of the Shenandoah, and

marched as a conquering host from Atlanta to the sea."

"It was only a farmer and nothing more, that stood like a granite wall at Gettysburg as the mightiest tidal wave of war in all the world rolled against him, and receding left him the victorious defender of the Union he loved so well. Ah, yes it was only a farmer, and nothing more, who in all the battles of the past fought bravely for the old flag, until finally upon its staff the God of our nation brought the eagle of victory to nestle with the sweet dove of peace."

"And in the future as in the past, it is only a farmer, and nothing more, that will be the safeguard of our nation, and will protect our republic from the clutches of agents of selfish, greedy monarchies and still more selfish, greedy traitors and will let it be known to all men that liberty has erected its altars upon our mountains, in our valleys, on our spreading plains and amid our picturesque woodlands, and the weary, deserving pilgrim from every land and clime may come to worship at those shrines—shrines so long as chivalry girds on a sword, shrines where patriot knees will bend in all the years that are yet to be."
