Hammond's New Road.

From Tuesday's Examiner:
A. B. Hammond, the owner of the
Astoria and Portland railroad and a
well-known capitalist in Oregon and
Montana, is at the Palace. Mr. Ham-
mond has just returned from a trip to
Humboldt county. He has been inspect-
ing the Eureka and Klamath River rail-
road, which he recently bought from
the Vance family, of Eureka, together
with the latter's big sawmill and tim-
ber interests. About 30 miles of the
road are in operation. It runs from Sa-
moa, which is just across the bay from
Eureka, by the way of Arcata up into
the Mad River country.

Mr. Hammond intends to extend it by
the way of Trinidad to Crescent City.
A branch line starts from Arcata and runs
around the head of the bay to the city
limits of Eureka. The Klamath and Cal-
ifornia and Northern roads are fighting to
prevent Hammond from getting into Eu-
reka. A bitter legal battle is on about
the matter. Mr. Hammond declined to
discuss the suit further than to say that
he will devote most of his time to de-
veloping his Humboldt county investment
and feels confident that the people in
that part of California will accord him
fair play.

The California and Northern is the
enterprise of San Francisco and Nevada
capitalists. The road, which is now in
process of construction, is to run from
Arcata to Crescent City and develop a
great timber region. Through an
arrangement with the Klamath River
company it has an entrance into and through
Eureka. It is a powerful rival of the
Vance properties Mr. Hammond has
just purchased and the fight now on is a
struggle between timber barons in that
part of California.

IMPORTANT CASE.

Sinclair Fishermen Bring Injunction Suit Against
Fish Traps.

The growing discontent of the Sinclair
river fishermen against fish traps has
finally resulted in a suit being brought
to force the owners of the traps to re-
move them from the river, thereby
enabling the fishermen to ply their voca-
tion freely throughout all portions
of the various streams.

A suit was filed Friday in the circuit
court for Lane county, enjoining the
use of the traps perpetually. The main
point of the complaint is as follows:
"That defendants have built con-
structed and placed in said Sinclair
river, at drivers points and places, and
in said lower Sinclair bay, and in the
tributaries of said Sinclair river, par-
ticularly the North Fork, large station-
ary fish traps. That said defendants
have unlawfully and wrongfully so
placed said fish traps in said rivers as
aforesaid, so as to entirely obstruct the
channels of said streams rendering it
impossible for plaintiffs and the per-
sons whom the plaintiffs represent, to
fish in said streams with drift nets and
gill nets for the purpose of catching
salmon and other fish. * * *

"Wherefore plaintiffs pray for a de-
cre of this court enjoining and re-
straining the defendants and each of
them and the servants, agents and em-
ployers of said defendants and each of
them, from obstructing and blocking
said streams with such fish traps.

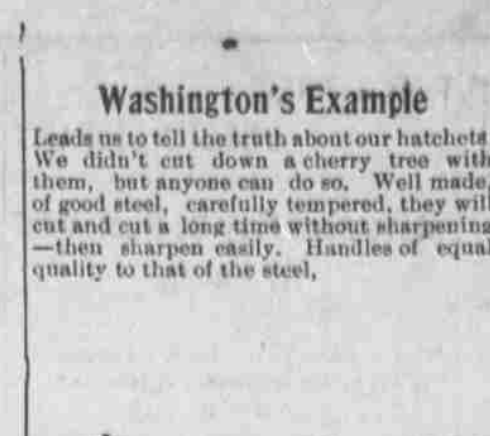
