THE GATHERING OF THE CLANS

First Republican Rally At the Armory.

Timon Ford Entertains a Good Sized Gathering and Everything Passes Off Pleasantly.

The grand Republican rally advertised for Saturday night was pulled off according to program, and it may be safely said that it was the most successful rally of the campaign—as it was the first.

Promptly at 7:43 p. m. the Reform school band struck up a lively air in front of the Hotel Willamette and shortly thereafter led the way, followed by a procession less than ten blocks in length to the city hall.

The Armory hall was comfortably filled. The five hundred chairs were nearly all occupied, and there were probably enough people standing up near the door to fill the empty chairs which were scattered through the room.

The audience was about equally divided between the two sexes, and there were quite a number of Democrats and Populists who wanted to hear what old Tim had to say.

On the platform were seated Superintendent Leo and Book-keeper Racer, of the State Penitentiary, Superintendent Calbreath, of the State Insane asylum, State School Superintendent Ackerman, W. H. Odell, ex-clerk of the State School Land Board, Dr. Cusick, physician for state institutions, Geo. P. Litchfield, who wouldn't mind being superintendent of something, and others.

Presently the orator of the evening, Timon Ford, came in, with Governor Geer and mounted the platform, and then it was seen that the Journal's report that Tim had been seen wearing a white shirt in Europe had not been as incredible as it seemed. He not only had on a white shirt but a standing collar and a necktie. To be sure, it was not a high collar, nor a tight one, but it was a standing collar just the same.

Governor Geer acted as master of ceremonies and opened the festivities with a few remarks in his characteristic vein.

A song by a quartette composed of Epley, Wenger, Snyder and Judd, was really fine and they were endorsed.

The "Roosevelt March," composed by Clifford Kautner, was played on the piano by Miss Elma Weiler and was generally applauded.

At last, a few minutes before nine o'clock, and after most of the people had been in their seats an hour and a half, orator of the evening was introduced by Governor Geer. He spoke for a little over an hour and entertained his hearers in good shape.

He devoted his remarks mostly to the issue of imperialism, and while he neither defined nor directly defended the Republican policy, he indirectly defended it by endeavoring to show that it is identical with that of Jefferson, Jackson and other fathers of the Democracy.

He said no one was in favor of imperialism, and asserted that congress has instructed the president to do everything that he has done. He characterized as "tomfoolery" the idea of "consent of the governed," in territory purchased of other nations. He said, "Take Aguinaldo out of the Philippines and quiet would be restored in a very short time." His assertion that "we are going to hold them Philippines," aroused less applause than one would expect.

He said that the constitution was intended for the original 13 states and no more, and only extended over our possessions by action of congress. He quoted the Revised Statutes of 1804 to show the three divisions—"states, territories, and countries over which the United States exercises sovereignty and jurisdiction."

He devoted a little time to the trusts, claiming that the Democrats are a deep in the mud as the Republicans are in the mire, and expressing a preference for building up trusts in this country rather than in some other.

He said the silver trust was the biggest trust of all, and all there was to free coinage was an attempt to double the value of the silver mine product and stocks.

He touched the tariff, and tackled the Nicaragua canal with unflinching courage. He claimed that until the Hay-Pauncefote treaty was made it was impossible for this country to build the canal, as the Clayton-Bulwer treaty prevented, and the abrogation of the former now would leave us tied up by the latter and unable to build the canal without England's co-operation.

But it is easier to commend Mr. Ford's speech for what he left out than for what he put in. There was no bitterness, no abuse, no reference to the "rag-tag and bobtail." He made his arguments like a fellow-citizen and a gentleman, talking to his friends. There was no abuse of Mr. Bryan and no sickening eulogy of Mr. McKinley.

The crowd listened with the closest attention. There was no considerable applause, but none of the wild, spontaneous sort. Several persons had tin horns but did not wear them out. There was no cheering after the meeting was over, but the people got up and filed out in a subdued and decorous fashion. The band played on the street for several hours after the meeting, and it may be said that the boys make pretty good music.

CIRCUIT COURT CRIMINAL BUSINESS

District Attorney Dispenses With Grand Jury.

Three Indictments Brought in—Turner Man up Against N. Burdard and Beardsley Cases Dismissed.

No grand jury was drawn for this term of circuit court, the district attorney handling the criminal business himself. Ed Reiser, who was bound over a short time ago on a charge of forgery having passed a forged check with Governor Geer's name upon it, in a Salem house of ill-fame was arraigned.

He pleaded guilty and will be sentenced on Thursday.

Wm. Hubbard was arraigned on a charge of larceny from a dwelling, and will make his plea Tuesday morning.

The district attorney brought in an indictment against Josh Lindsay, the Turner saloon keeper, on three charges: selling liquor without a license; selling liquor to a minor; and allowing a minor to loiter in his saloon. A bench warrant was issued and the accused was placed under arrest by Deputy Sheriff Colbath.

Two criminal cases were disposed of as indicated below:

State of Oregon vs. O. P. Beardsley; bound over to keep the peace. Dismissed by District Attorney.

State of Oregon vs. Willard Burdard; rape. Dismissed by District Attorney.

The case of Francis Feller vs. John H. Gates, an action for money was placed on trial before a jury after dinner but only occupied about an hour, resulting in a verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$126.40.
