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EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Republican orators all carefully refrain from taking up and arguing or endorsing a single proposition laid down by Blaker and Millionaire Corbett, as to the proper policy our government should adopt toward the Filipinos and island populations. They either have not the brains to take an enlightened statesman-like view, or they dare not oppose the administration's policy of imperialism. Corbett is too big, too broad and too independent a man for the McKinley crowd.

The Journal has been elected a member of the newly re-organized Associated Press, under the laws of New York.

This suits the partisan to a dot. And with lots of old glory and grand old party thrown in it makes a whooping, gushy and cockle-warming style of campaign oratory.

The Bookman for this month covers the field of literature in true journalistic style and there is little doing in the world of letters not recorded in some way in its pages. Under the head of "Here and There" the editor, Professor Harry Thurston Peck, discusses the important part played in presidential campaigns by the cartoonist, and pays a high tribute to Homer Davenport. The drama of the month is reviewed each month by Norman Hapgood, who seems to be the sanest and justest dramatic critic of the present day. There is a splendid illustrated article on opera in English. Altogether too much space is allotted to James Lane Allen, and the exploiting of the religious novel—the

most inexcusable form of fiction. We must confess we have not been able to bring ourselves to read John Uri Lloyd's story "Stringtown on the Pike," probably from lack of time. But if there were more people without idle time, there might be better novels written. The author's name as well as the name chosen for his story are not inviting, and not easily overcome by any but omnivorous readers. The poems in the Bookman are always above the average.

Editor Hofer of the Salem Journal has money to invest in school bonds, but none to bet on Bryan. We are pleased to see that friend Hofer is not so radical in his paper as he used to be. He is another man who will vote all right.—Woodburn Independent.

Are you trying to slander a man with the insinuation that he has got into the procession with the Porto Ricans that King George put on the colonists? No wonder Great Britain puts you fellows on the back, when you are removing the blackest stigma that stains the escutcheon of England—taxation without representation.

The President of the Willamette on the platform and the college quartet to sing and the college yell to help out the applause puts the old thing in its old attitude as a Republican sideshow. ROOSEVELT IS NOT A GRANT.

Governor Roosevelt takes the place of military hero on the Republican ticket, as General Grant did so successfully. Beyond that the parallel ceases. General Grant had the soul of a modest man. Roosevelt has not been accused of having that article in his possession. General Grant was not a voluminous writer or talker. He was very careful in the use of words. At Kansas City Roosevelt did some of his loosest talking. Here is a sample: "By trusts we mean, generally speaking, all the big corporations." Is it true that "the trust"

as applied in politics embraces all the big corporations?

The Southern Pacific railway and all the big transcontinental roads are big corporations, but they are never classed with the salt trust, the tinplate trust, the juice trust, the paper trust, the rubber trust, and many other capitalized commercial corporations, that had no existence a few years ago.

What Roosevelt seeks to do is to array all the corporations against Bryan. By his own definition the big corporations are all in the same class with the obnoxious trusts and he proposes to put them all in rapport with the next Republican administration. This is not just to well-managed corporations.

Roosevelt in the same speech showed how he had secured the passage of the bill to tax franchises in New York that had put \$300,000,000 of corporation property on the taxrolls that was never there before. He would thus make out that all the corporations are trusts, that they all ought to be against Bryan in order that the Republican party may compel them to pay taxes they never paid before! General Grant was never guilty of such wonderful contortions. But then he never descended to the level of a common hustler for office.

Exports of Manufactures.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Custom house experts say that all indications point to an exportation of American manufactures for this calendar year of not far from \$465,000,000. This is a large increase over the total exportations of last year. The rate of increase, however, has diminished, as last year's increase over the previous year showed a larger percentage. The problem is whether or not the slackening of the demand from the other side will be permanent, and whether we are nearing a period of stagnation and commercial depression, not in this country but in Great Britain or Europe, or whether the influences noted in August and September are due to temporary causes. Some of our financiers are of the opinion that in Europe

they are approaching a severe commercial crisis, due to several causes, not the least of which is the enormous exploitation of industrial undertakings, especially in Germany. If such crisis comes, then the industrial pendulum will swing the other way, pointing to a period of depression which may ultimately be felt in the United States.

Wonderful Engineering Feat.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12, 13.—It is announced that the work on the Great Northern tunnel through the Cascade mountains is being pushed rapidly forward and that it will be opened to trains within two months. The tunnel was begun in January, 1897, is the second largest tunnel in the United States, being 13,254 feet long, and has cost about \$34,000,000. Steam locomotives will not go through the tunnel, but an electric engine will handle the trains in order to avoid the trouble caused by smoke on so long a line. The work was carried on from each end, and when the two forces met the difference in grade was only about 2 1-2 inches, and the difference in alignment only a fraction of an inch.

Tin Plate Trust Removes Cincinnati Factory.
CINCINNATI, Oct. 12.—The Riverside plant of the American Tin Plate Co., here has been dismantled and the machinery taken to Elwood, Ind.

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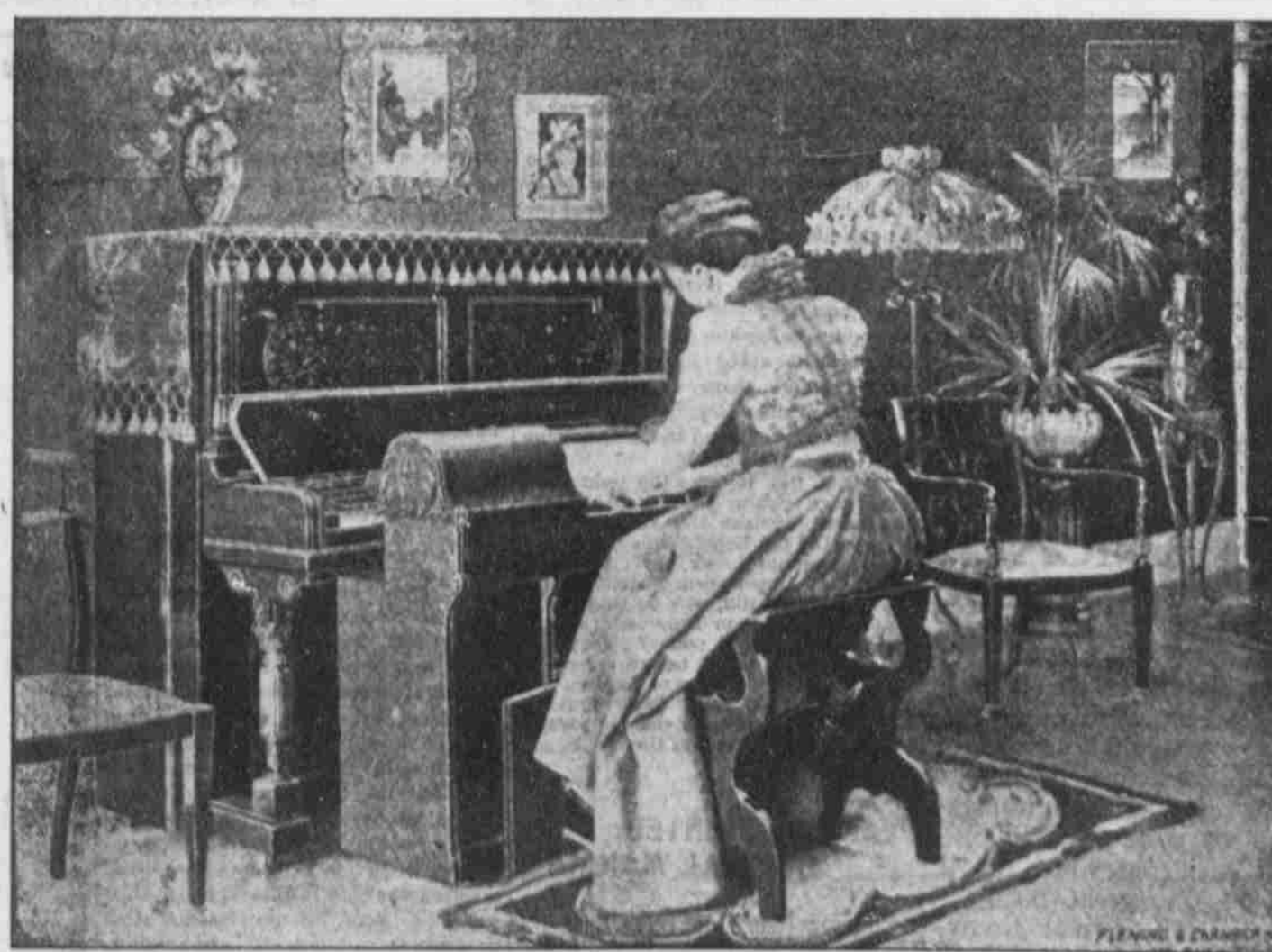
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
