The Veritas was towed to the Liverpool side where her cable parted and she collided with the steamer Earl of Powys, causing the latter to break from her moorings. Both steamers drifted down the river, and the Veritas crashed into the iron booms stretched from the pier head. She is now a submerged wreck.

STAYTON
BRIDGEMarion County Pays Half of
PriceAGREED ON FOR
STAYTON BRIDGEA New Order About Delinquent Taxes—No
Particular Time Has Been Set for a
Penalty to Apply.

The court formally accepted the work on the Stayton bridge and ordered a warrant issued to J. B. Tillotson, the contractor for the \$1849.50 one half of his bill, the other half to be paid by Linn county.

It will be remembered that the contract for repairing the bridge was let by the county courts of Marion and Linn counties acting together on August 30, to J. B. Tillotson for \$3699, his being the lowest of four bids ranging up to \$5100.

The contract was for the retimbering of the bridge, excepting the needlebeams, which were put in last year. It seems, however, that this exception was somehow made to apply to 10 other pieces of timber which needed renewal and \$50 extra was allowed for that.

There has been some inquiry as to why the repair of the bridge should cost so much more now than when, under Judge Terrell's administration, bids were received as low as about \$2200. Judge Scott's explanation is that the former bids did not include the planing of the bridge also that owing to the lateness in season, the contractor took chances on a rise of the river washing out the false work and letting the structure fall.

Nothing but been done for the protection of the north end of the bridge which the river threatens to washout at the first high freshet, the Linn county court being unwilling to spend any money for that purpose.

About the Delinquent Taxes.
Before adjournment Friday the Marion county commissioners court rescinded its order of recent date declaring taxes delinquent after Saturday Oct. 15th.

As a matter of fact this order seems to have been in the nature of a hurry-up order to some of the backward taxpayers rather than a serious piece of lawful county business. The law fixes the time for taxes to become delinquent, on April 1. As the assessment roll does not reach the sheriff's hands until after that date, it has been impossible to comply with the terms of the law in all respects. The sheriff is still collecting taxes without penalty, but before the next meeting of the county commissioner's court, the books will be closed and placed in the hands of the county clerk, who will prepare the delinquent tax roll, and the court will then issue a warrant to the sheriff to sell the property to collect the tax, following the course prescribed by law.

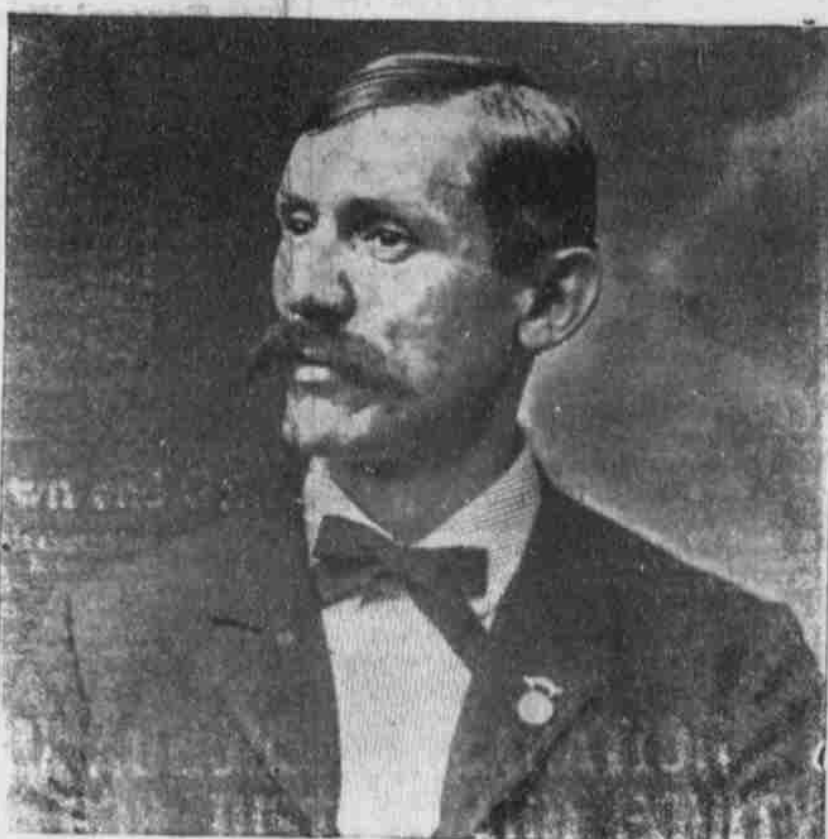

THE CZAR
PROPOSESThat Chinese Difficulties Be
Settled.BY INTERNATIONAL
BOARD OF ARBITRATION

The Diplomats at Tientsin Declare That the
Chinese Ringleaders Have Not Been
Adequately Punished.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The Russian suggestion that the international court of arbitration of The Hague be given jurisdiction over the divergencies of views arising on the question of Chinese indemnities, was suggested to Secretary Hay in a note of October 3. It has received the adherence of the American, French and Russian governments, thus giving the suggestion of approval of three of the foremost powers, and strong assurances of its general adoption.

It is understood also that Austria and Italy, and probably Japan, look with favor upon the Hague suggestion.

The movement promises to give the first practical realization to the Czar's movement in bringing about the international congress of The Hague. The court of arbitration has received the approval of the various governments represented at the Hague and its formal organization is in progress.

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—A dispatch from Tientsin, says: At a conference of the diplomats at Peking October 8th, German note of October 1 was discussed. In regard to first point, whether list of ring-leaders contained in Chinese edict was complete, conference declared the name of Chief culprit, Tung Sian and Yu Hsin, were omitted.

On point two it was decided that the punishment was inadequate.

On point three it was concluded penalties must be carried into effect by delegates of legations.

GAVE THIEVES
ACCESS TO TREASUREOfficial of the Vatican Arrested on the Charge of Being Ac-
cessor to Recent Big Robbery.

ROME, Oct. 13.—A minor official of the Vatican has been arrested on the charge of giving the thieves access to the room from which about \$30,000 lire was recently stolen.

The boys ran and all escaped but two who were pursued to their rooms by egg-battered policemen. The two boys spent the night in the lockup and were charged with breach of the peace and fighting a bonfire. The youths were fined \$5 on the breach of peace charge and are today facing the second charge. They have been out on bond signed by George I. White, the proprietor of a popular students resort.

Magdalen School Dispute.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.—The attempt to reopen the Manitoba school question, which played so large a part in the politics of Canada in the last campaign, are being discouraged by even the Roman Catholics. These seem to think that no thing is to be gained by a return to the coercive legislation of 1890. Sir Wilfrid Laurier some three years ago interceded on behalf of the Catholic minority with the Manitoba government and secured a modification of the school law by which the localities where there is a large number of Catholic pupils certain concessions were made as to the teaching of religion and the use of the French language.

Sowing Grain By Sacks Full.
