YOUNG VAUGHN FOUND GUILTY

A Bicycle Trade of Unusual Features Lands Its Beneficiary in the Midst of Trouble.

The examination of Cecil Vaughn, the 15-year-old boy charged with larceny by bailor of a bicycle, by Harry Zue, a Japanese, took place before Recorder Judah this morning. Chas. McNary appearing for the state and John Bayne for the defendant.

It seems that Vaughn, with a companion, was riding his wheel on Wilson Avenue, when the Jap rode up behind on a wheel belonging to his Japanese mistress. Vaughn claims that he traded wheels with the Jap, while the latter claims that Vaughn asked to try his wheel. Vaughn rode off on the Jap's wheel, which is a lady's model in good condition, leaving his wheel, which is an old one, with the Jap. Later, Vaughn's brother traded the wheel for another and \$5 to boot at Geo. F. Smith's second-hand store.

After hearing the testimony, Recorder Judah found the defendant guilty and imposed a fine of \$25 and costs.

Vaughn's attorney says he will appeal the case to the circuit court.

HELPED OREGON PRUNEGROWERS.

Prices Fixed by California Association Market in That State.

A. W. Prescott in a special to the Oregonian says that the California Cured Fruit Association helped the Oregon prunegrowers to dispose of their crop at fair prices, become every day more apparent. While California growers have trouble in marketing their crop the Oregon product has practically all been sold. On September 1 the California Association fixed its prices at one-quarter of a cent above the highest expectations, and has stood by the prices. It has been said from the first, and appears to be true, that the prices named were too high. Buyers looked outside the association for goods, and this has helped the market in this state, although Oregon produces a different class of fruit from that grown in California.

While the market in Oregon has been brisk and fruit has been disposed of rapidly, the latest report from California says:

"The prune market is exceedingly quiet; prices for outside prunes weak and the demand light. There are six or seven large packers and handlers of prunes outside the association, and they are all very busy, packing, grading and filling orders booked at from 2 to 5 per cent below the lowest association price. Sample are in the hands of brokers representing hundreds of cars, which are being offered on this market way below association prices. Now, until this class of business is over, and the outside prunes marketed, the demand for association goods will not be as brisk as the insiders might wish. If the reports received from outside packers prove correct, there must be some heavy holdings outside of the association."

THE AEOLIAN AND PIANOLA

First Concert Given at Salem Causes Universal Expressions of Pleasure.

A number of prominent Salem people last night heard the first public presentation on their merits of those two twentieth-century wonders in musical demonstration—the pianola and the aeolian. These instruments are American inventions that are going into use in homes and hotels and churches and music halls by the thousand all over the world. The American people are very quick to take up a revolution when it adds to their pleasure and capacity for making enjoyment out of a hitherto dumb instrument—and the piano is a dumb instrument so far as the great classical compositions are concerned in nine homes out of ten.

Both the pianola and the aeolian have expert demonstration of their charms and qualities as producers of the highest grade of musical composition at the hands of Messrs. Wells and Ballard, who executed the most beautiful selections before ladies and gentlemen last evening to the hotel Willamette public. These gentlemen played some pieces that they had never before executed with almost equal success. This does not mean that skill and a general knowledge of the piece to be played is not required to attain perfect results on these instruments.

As a matter of fact, the touch and expression are so completely under control that the highest results in expression in playing, even a single note, are attainable. But the means by which it is reached is so simple, almost a purely mechanical contrivance, that it is in the power of anyone with a few rehearsals to play a composition that it would take a skillful pianist months of patient study to accomplish the same result in execution. The repertoire of these instruments is unlimited.

The writer has heard the Thomas orchestra a number of times but can say he never heard a full orchestra under that wizard director play the overture to William Tell with as fine effects as it was rendered last night on the aeolian by Mr. Wells. Pianists and music teachers and lovers of good music will be interested in the daily programs as announced, as well as the following selections which were played last night as a purely informal and extemporized program:

"Alle Stella Confidente" (Bright Star Hope) by Robandi, rendered on the Aeolian Orchestrette.

"La Sirene," by Terschak—Aeolian Orchestrette.

Rossini's immortal "William Tell" Overture, the full orchestral score, rendered in the Aeolian Orchestrette.

"Titt'li's Serenade"—Aeolian Orchestrette.

The ever welcome Intermezzo from "Cavaleria Rusticana."

J. B. Underwood, of Turner was arraigned on a charge of selling liquor to a minor. This morning he made a plea of not guilty, and will remain under bonds to appear before the February term.

RAMSDEN'S ERROR WAS FATAL

Died Monday Night From Effects of Carbolic Acid, Buried Today in Lee Mission.

Richard Ramsden, the Howell Prairie farmer who took a dose of carbolic acid by mistake on Saturday, died Monday evening from the effects.

He seemed to be feeling fairly well Monday until about 5 p. m., and even asked for something to eat, which could not be given him. Then he suddenly grew worse and expired about 9 o'clock.

Dr. J. N. Smith, the attending physician, says that the immediate cause of death was undoubtedly perforation of the stomach, eaten through by the deadly acid.

The funeral was set to take place from Pratum at 1 p. m. today, with burial in Lee Mission cemetery at this city.
