OFFICIAL REPORT OF ST. PRISON

Supt. J. D. Lee Files His Quarterly Statement.

A Decrease in the Number of Convicts Kept There—New Wages Causes Increase in Expenditures.

Supt. J. D. Lee, of the Oregon State Penitentiary, has filed his report for the quarter ending September 30th in the Department of State, a number of prisoners under care, and the statistics on earnings, receipts and expenditures of the big institution. The report shows a decrease in the number of prisoners while the expenditures are higher than usual, owing to the construction of the new wing, and other improvements on which large payments have been made. Following is the statistical part of the report:

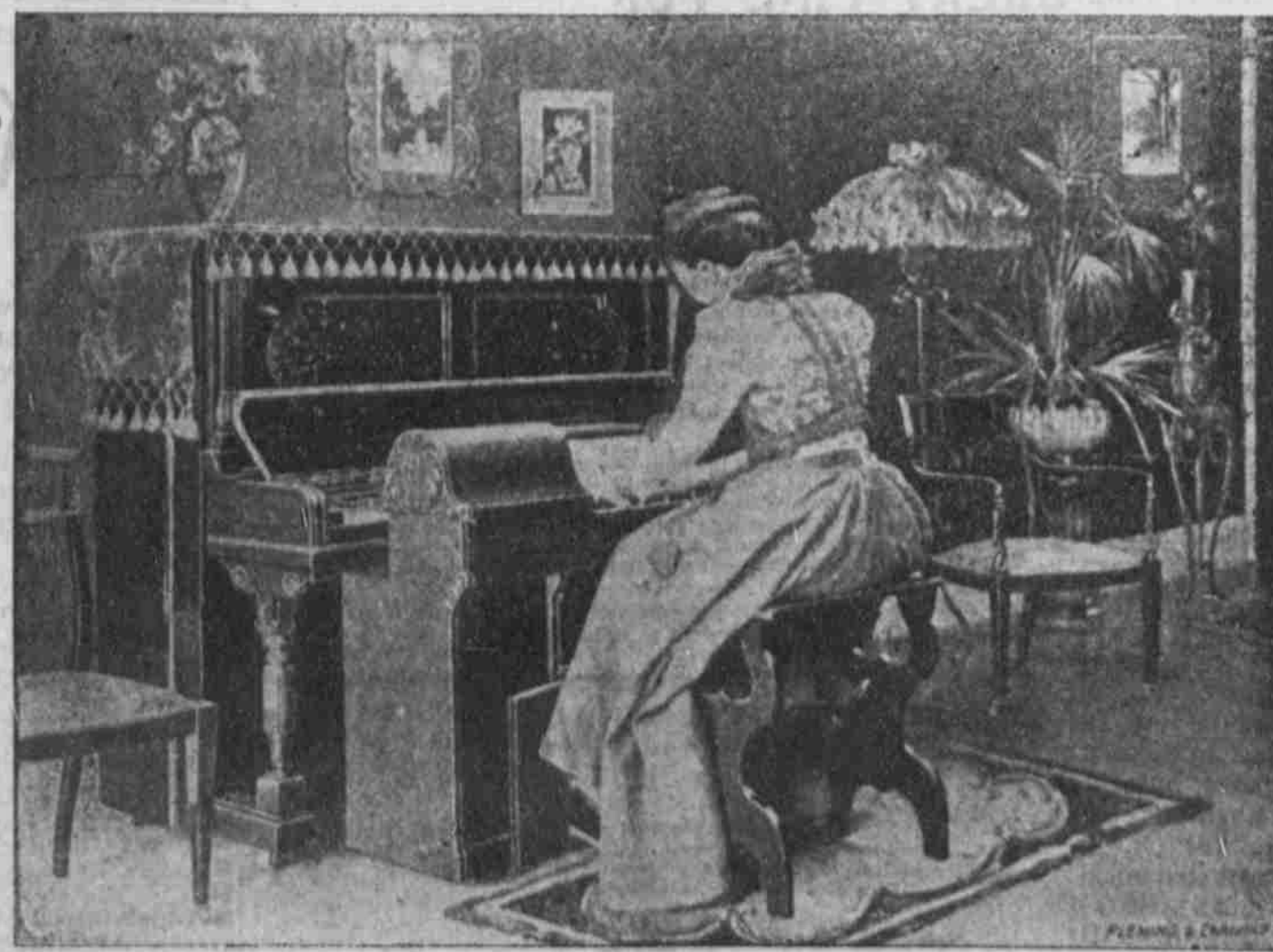
