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EDITORIAL NOTES.

H. E. Huntington of San Francisco is the most logical candidate for President of the Southern Pacific Railroad, an office that seems to be going begging. He is a man of about fifty years, and was left large property interests by the late Collis P. Huntington, his uncle. So far as expressions of confidence in his character and ability can be gathered from his acts, the uncle intended to be succeeded by his nephew. The younger Huntington is a practical railroad man, who has been for years identified with Pacific coast interests. The interest of the producers and business men of the coast in who shall be President is great, and it is hoped a man will be chosen who is closely identified with the real interests of the people. Such a man will protect the real interests of the great corporation.

If Bryan holds his vote in the country he will surely be elected, because he shows signs of immense gains in the cities. Nearly all the large cities have Bryan Mayors and will roll up immense majorities. For instance in Chicago.

There were added to the registry lists by the second and last day of registration 116,913. These, taken with the 204,490 names placed on the books on Monday, give a total of 401,403 names as the registration in the 35 wards of Chicago for this year. Although a revision of the figures may reduce this total some,

this is the largest registration in the history of the city. As compared with the registration of 380,245 of 1896, the total this year is 21,158 greater and exceeds that of 1898, which was 325,745, by 75,056.

Chicago will very nearly overbalance the Republican majorities in the interior of Illinois. The defection of the Prohibition and religious elements from McKinley are large and unless they are rallied back into line as they were in 1896, McKinley is a defeated man sure.

The victory for organized labor in the coal regions of Pennsylvania is the greatest triumph for human rights that has been accomplished since the abolition of slavery in our country. Those who mine the coal are entitled to a living for themselves and their families. They are entitled to comfortable homes and common school privileges. Upon their labor depends the welfare of organized society.

We would rather have achieved the bloodless victory for humanhood that President Mitchell has secured for the associated miners than be a general or admiral wreathed with laurels of battle conquest.

Did you ever think about it, who gets the dollar levied upon the consumer by the trust? Again, if the trusts can't trust one another, how can we trust them? The sugar trust is fighting the great Arbuckle coffee trust.

At Trenton, New Jersey, in the case of Robert J. Trimble against the American Sugar Refining Company, in the Court of Chancery, before Vice-Chancellor Pitney, Trimble states that he is a stockholder in the American Sugar Refining Company, and he charges that the funds of the company are being dissipated in a fight being made against the Arbuckles, who are in the coffee business. The

Vice-Chancellor has reserved his decision. The trusts do not fight each other in the courts to benefit the people but to concentrate greater power in the hands of one trust. Each link in the trust chain that is welded in the courts becomes that much more oppressive and difficult of final overthrow.

Expansion for the people is all right. Expansion for the trusts and corporations and shipbuilding syndicates that want subsidies is all wrong. Give the people of the islands free institutions. Give us free trade with our possessions. That will develop shipbuilding without subsidies. It will develop the ability of the annexed people for self-government. It will be in accordance with the constitution.

The presence of the most offensive man to rule over the destinies of the former Transvaal Republic caps the climax of the British conquest of the South African republics.

Sir Alfred Miner, who, it is announced will be appointed Governor of the conquered republics, has arrived at Pretoria. He was met by Lord Roberts at the railway station, and was assigned a house near headquarters.

The triumph of the monarchy over Republican institutions in the Dutch continent is a deplorable result. The sparks of truth for which the Dutch burghers contended on the veldt will never be extinguished. They may be covered, smothered and buried, but they will leap into fiercer flames for that when the time comes in the world's history.

Governor Roosevelt continues to reap the harvest of violence. He started into the campaign calling all the dark people traitors, and compared them to the boxers in China and followers of Aguinaldo in the Philippines. He has shown his unfitness for the high place he seeks by arousing the hoodlum element to resent his severe methods of treating the opposition. The charge that Bryan is too violent in his denunciation of Trusts falls to the ground when compared to Teddy, the tedious tergiversant.

Yet even these two men seem to be on friendly terms when they chance to meet — and that fact tells to keep your choler down. Several varying accounts came from East Louis regarding the passing of the Bryan and Roosevelt trains at Alton, Ill., but the truth seems well stated in this report:—

Their private cars came alongside in the yards. Each stepped upon the platform and recognized the other at once.

"Hello," said Roosevelt trusting forth his hand.

"Hello," quoth Bryan, grasping the extended hand. "How is your voice?"

"It's rough as the poplar platform."

"How is yours, Col. Bryan?" laughed Roosevelt.

"Mine is as broken as republican promises," retorted the Nebraskan, laughing, too.

Then everybody laughed and cheered, the democrats with Bryan shouting "Hurrah" for him, and Roosevelt's followers yelling for McKinley. The meeting came wholly by chance and was as cheerful as it was picturesque.

OLD SOLDIERS AND VOLUNTEERS

Asked to Endorse the McKinley Administration.

The Grand Army and Oregon Volunteers Not Willing to Be Used as a Political Side Show Any Longer.

Much has been said lately in the Oregonian concerning meetings of the old soldiers and ex-volunteers to endorse the present administration, and it has been given the public to understand that these meetings were held by the unanimous consent. Much to the contrary, however, the meetings have been opposed by a large majority of the old soldiers and the Republican party has met with severe condemnation for its attempt to arraign the old soldiers as a body upon the side of the administration. Col. Sumner has also come in for his share of the blame for having called the meetings and making it appear that the volunteers were unanimously upon his side, thereby attempt-

ing to further his own political ends at the expense of the organization which fought under him.

At the meeting called last Monday evening for the purpose of endorsing the administration a strong objection was raised by a number of the volunteers to the unseemly proceedings. Among those who spoke in opposition were Robert J. O'Neill, Comany H; F. C. Wallace, Company B, and C. E. Sanders, Company L. There were but 85 in attendance (instead of 250 as the Oregonian stated) and out of this number 22 old veterans were there for the express purpose of opposing the resolutions which were to be adopted. Nineteen volunteers were also present and it was a noticeable feature of the meeting that not one of them spoke in favor of the proposed endorsement of the administration, and at the end of the meeting but four volunteers signed the roll.

An adjourned meeting was held Thursday evening in the Tabernacle, which had an attendance of 68, composed almost entirely of old veterans. With this meager attendance it is difficult to see where the Republicans found the "large" number of volunteers to join the Rough Rider Club. The fact of the matter is that the volunteers are opposed to any scheme which shall array them as a body upon either side and being divided among themselves they will join whichever side the inclination dictates. A noticeable feature of this movement is that those most solicitous as to how the volunteers shall vote now were the very ones who were willing that every one of them should be killed in the islands to uphold what it pleased them to term the "honor" of the flag.

The following speech delivered by Mr. Sanders before last Monday's meeting puts forth in concise form the objections which the volunteers had to the movement.

Mr. Chairman:—Since the birth of this nation it has been the sacred right of its citizens to assemble as patriotic members of this republic to endorse or condemn the policy of any administration. It has not been the custom to meet and parade any virtues which they may have, or claim any special superiority over their fellow beings because of any acts which they may have performed in the fulfillment of their duty to the republic, and especially as members of a non-political military organization to which they may have belonged at a remote or recent date.

Now Mr. Chairman, I have noticed that for this meeting in the Oregonian and while some of its articles have specifically called for only those who wished to endorse the administration, yet other articles, and especially the headlines, have been so constructed that the unwary would be led to believe that this action was to be taken by these organizations as organizations and would be endorsed by their unanimous consent. Having gone thus far it is my belief that in giving a report of this meeting the Oregonian would not hesitate to say

that the old soldiers and Oregon Volunteers met and endorsed the administration and by unanimous consent condemned as "flag furies" all those who did not so agree.

Now Mr. Chairman, as a member of the 2nd Oregon Volunteers I wish to enter an earnest and vigorous protest against this proceeding and say that while I have no objection to any member of the regiment to which I belong expressing his views as an individual, still the volunteers of Portland have no right to speak for the members of that body in the entire state, and the 18 or 20 volunteers assembled here, the majority of whom are opposed to these resolutions, have no right to speak for the members of the regiment, even in the city of Portland. Furthermore the questions on which you have appointed a committee to draw up resolutions have been the leading issue of the two great political parties of this country, and by endorsing one side or the other as a body we make of our regiment a political tool. By condemning all those opposed to this policy we are offering an insult to at least one half of our citizens, men who yield to no one in their devotion to their country's flag, not so much for the flag's sake but for those principles of which it is the symbol. It is evident that we ourselves are honestly divided on the question, many of the volunteers believing that the war with the Philippines was provoked by the administration and has since been prolonged for political purposes, and under these circumstances, by the bringing of political questions into our ranks we will inevitably create dissension among ourselves, thereby destroying the harmony and fraternity for which we have organized since our return.

And now fellow comrades, I have only this to say in behalf of those opposed to these proposed resolutions, that to gether we enlisted and crossed the seas to fight together against our common enemy. Together we crossed the rice fields and stumbled over the rice paddies. Together we plunged into the jungle and through the swamp. Together we returned and were mustered out, and have since stood shoulder to shoulder supporting each other in every vicissitude, bound together in a common fraternity whose bonds we should never allow to be severed. We cannot afford at this late day to let those seeds of discord enter our ranks which, in due time, will certainly disrupt our organization. It only remains for me to say that while I yield to no one in the respect I have for the man who led us through that struggle, and will support our Colonel in any way I can and will confer upon him any favor within my humble power so long as it is consistent with honor, yet I must refuse to follow him in entering upon so partisan a policy which, if pursued, would in the end destroy our friendship, for no man can dictate to me my political faith.

WAS THE OREGONIAN A PROPHET
Editorial From Portland Oregonian, May 4, 1900:
"Already we are in one of the gravest perils of war—the clamor for territorial aggrandizement. The fever of conquest once in the blood is hard to allay. We have no further rightful use for the Philippines than as a base of present operations and a hostage pending final settlement. A coaling station let us retain there, but our professions in this war debate us from the retention of even Cuba, which is more naturally within our scope than the Philippines. If the war is prolonged we shall certainly see a rapid growth of vehement demand for the acquisition of territory we should not take. It may be strong enough to turn the scale of a presidential election."

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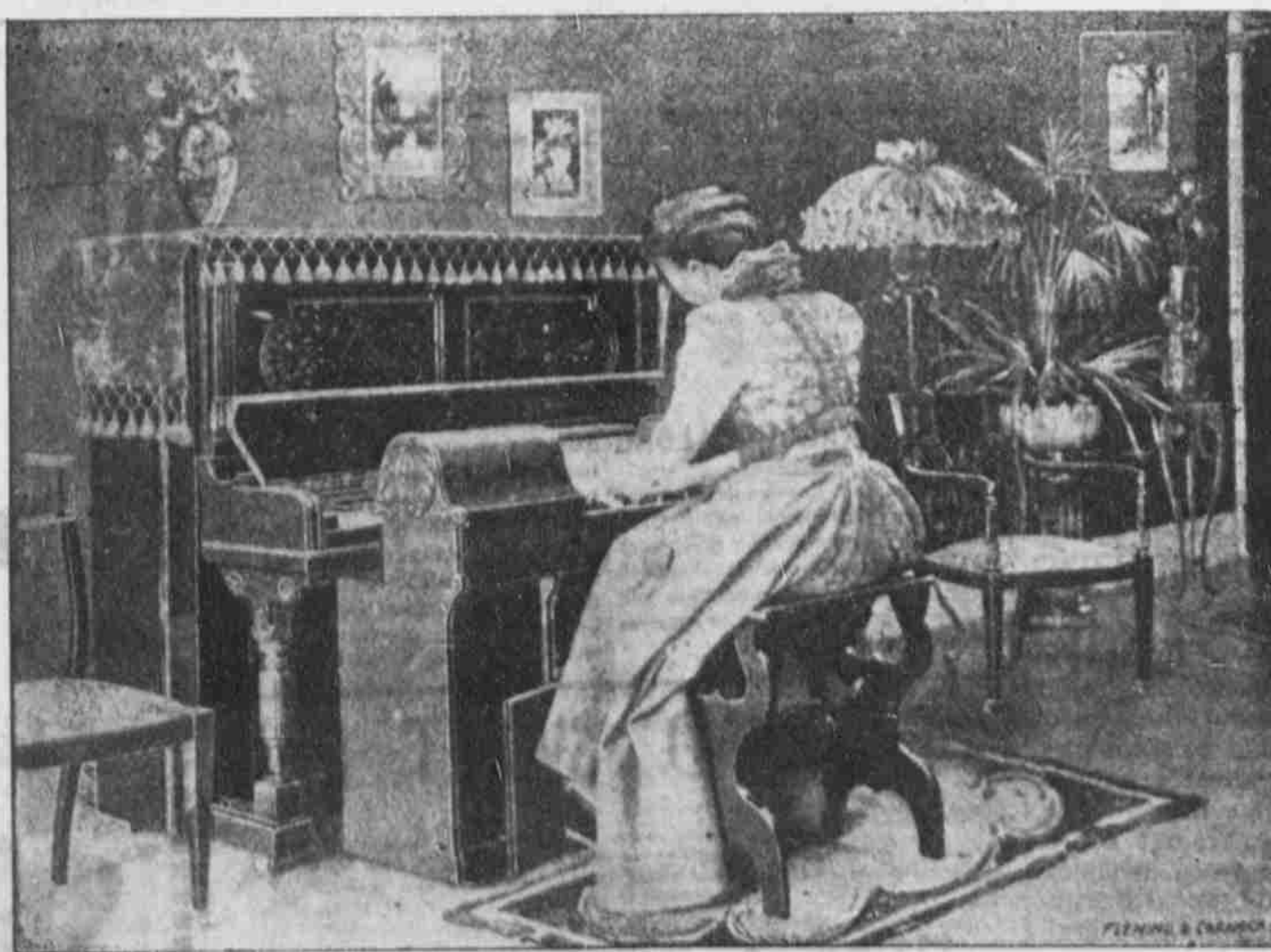
