For the Recovery of an Amount of Property Alleged to Have Been Appropriated by Defendant.

The Salem Light & Traction Company, plaintiff, vs. F. R. Anson, defendant, is the title of a new case filed in Department No. 1 of the state circuit court for Marion county. The complaint alleges that between June 1 1898, and October 20, 1899, the defendant was the managing agent of the plaintiff's business, in and about Salem, and that the plaintiff then received large payments for furnishing lights to the City of Salem, to Marion county and the State of Oregon, the payments being in city, county and state warrants, which, the plaintiff alleges, the defendant converted into cash; that defendant converted to his own use the sum of \$3,387.18. The plaintiff alleges that on October 12 it demanded of defendant that he account to and pay to the plaintiff the said sum of \$3,387.18.

For a further and separate cause of action, the plaintiff alleges that on the day of October, 1899, the plaintiff was the owner of a warrant for \$153.05, issued by the city of Salem, No. 5912, in payment of electric lighting furnished by the plaintiff to the city for the month of September, 1899; the plaintiff also alleges having been the owner of a county warrant for \$35, issued by Marion county, No. 45,972, in payment of lighting for September 1899. The plaintiff alleges that the defendant secured and converted these two warrants, aggregating \$188.05, to his own use, and that, though a demand for possession of them has been made, the demand was refused. The plaintiff demands judgment for \$4,582.18, and costs and disbursements of the action. Ramsey & Bingham are attorneys for the plaintiff.

THE CLASS IN MUSHROOMS

Organized by The Journal Will Please Stand Up and Take Another Lesson.

The pretty bunch of chocolate capped creamy-stemmed little fellows is reported by the class physician to be the now look out—"Piziza Choccolata," or a bunch of chocolates.

The shaggy-coated or horse mushroom is coming up more freely on the court house square, and a number of samples have been brought in. It is one of the very finest edibles, remaining a creamy white after it is cooked. Scientific name, "Agaricus Campestris," says the doctor. It can be eaten without the name, which is the only thing about it that is not digestible.

More students have found the "Amanita Frostida" than any other. The books say it should not be eaten after the gills begin to turn black. This variety is the nearest to an oyster of anything that is not an oyster, having the real bouquet of the bivaler. Even after the gills are black on the edges, it is fine eating. Just trim off the black. All the richest and most delicate kinds turn black after they open out and are exposed to the air, except the large creamy white kind that is found on cultivated ground. That is called "Amanita Phallades," and has a hollow stem. The cap is covered with a velvety skin that feels as soft as the plum of a lady's hand.

The latest contribution, so far unnamed, is a cluster of golden stemmed reddish, brown-capped little mushrooms that have the same form of growth as the "Piziza Choccolata," and Dr. Hall kindly tell the class at the next lesson what its name is and whether it is poisonous or not. It eats all right, as the horse mushroom reporter tried one. It is best to wait until we get an official report from the health-officer of the club before following the reporter's example. Salem has some fine comestibles but none of us ever saw one so well kept we'd like to occupy it. And it may have a name with a fuse to it, like the chocolate, and we'd hate to have one of the Drs. scientific names explode and kill somebody.

E. F. TUCKER FALLS DOWN

Gets Drunk and Tries to Break into a Japanese Resort With a Rock.

E. F. Tucker, of South Salem, whose wife died a few days ago, does not seem to be able to bear up under his bereavement, or to conduct himself with the decorum due to the occasion.

He filled up with intoxicants last evening and repaired to one of the Japanese houses of ill-fame. Being denied admittance, he procured a rock and smashed it through the window. Later he was lodged in jail on a charge of breaking glass in a building not his own.

He was brought before City Recorder Judah at 1 o'clock. He waived examination and was bound over to the circuit court in the sum of \$150, and committed to the county jail.

RECEPTION TO PROFESSOR GARRISON

The reception Monday afternoon, given by Prof. Francesco Seley at the College of Music in honor of Professor Illit Garrison, the new head of the piano department, was one of the most enjoyable affairs of the season. A great many of the city's best musicians and society people were present.

The affair was very informal. Professor Garrison during the afternoon favored the assemblage with many piano compositions on the instrument of which he proved himself a thorough master. All were delighted and enthusiastic, and Prof. Garrison easily takes the leading place among the pianists of the city. Every one pronounced his technique wonderful and he played with a true and soulful expression that was a revelation to most of his auditors.

Between two and three hundred people visited the college during the time of the reception, from 3:30 to 5 o'clock, and met Professor Garrison, who made a very favorable impression both socially and musically. The professor is a polished gentleman and met his new acquaintances with an easy and charming courtesy. It was also very pleasing to him to be received with such cordiality in Salem, and he is charmed with this city and its environments. Professor Garrison will give a new impulse to the study of the piano here, and it is fortunate that Mr. Seley has been able to secure the services of a musician of his ability.

HANNA AND ROOSEVELT

The National Republican Committee Man

Is After Senator Pettigrew's Scalp—In Ohio's Hoodlum Hit Roosevelt on the Head With a Rock as He Was Leaving a Tent.

Huron, S. D., Oct. 18.—The special train bearing Senator Hanna and Frye traveled up and down through the counties of central South Dakota, in the districts where the voters are close, and where the farmers compose the greater part of the population. Fourteen stops, varying in length from three minutes to an hour, were made during the day.

A good deal of spice was put into the speeches at times, by the sharp questioning on the part of the audiences who desired to hear about trusts and imperialism, and were not slow to make their wishes known. This was true especially at Aberdeen, where Senator Hanna was constantly interrupted during his speech by questions regarding the various phases of the trust issue.

Senator Hanna apparently enjoyed these interruptions, and invariably answering them. During the afternoon while the train was running through the thinly populated part of the state and stops were brief and infrequent, Senator Hanna spent about half his time at the various stations in shaking hands with the crowds, who nearly dragged him from his car on one occasion in their efforts to shake hands with him.

Cleveland gave Roosevelt a reception rivaling any such demonstration ever made here. There was an immense parade, consisting of half a score of brass bands, dozens of political organizations, including many which had come hither from other places to do honor to the candidate for Vice President. This was the fourteenth speech which Governor Roosevelt made.

At Newburg, Ohio, a boy threw a rock at Governor Roosevelt, as the latter was leaving the tent in company with National Committeeman Herrick, of Ohio, and others. The rock struck the Governor on the head. Quickly the Governor's companions closed around him, and hustled him into a passing car.

"I was not hurt at all," said the Governor. "The rock was thrown by one of a number of hoodlums, and I saw him throw it. It struck my head, but my hat prevented it from wounding me. In the light of the splendid reception Cleveland has given me, the stone-throwing is scarcely worth remembering for a moment."

The Tobacco Output.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The report of the production of the tobacco companies shows that the business has fallen off compared with the previous year. The production of cigars, cigarettes and tobacco in the second and third district of New York as shown by stamps receipts during September was as follows: Output of cigars 55 1-4 millions, against 77 3-4; paper cigarettes 101 millions, against 138 million; little cigars 13 1-2 millions, against 32 3-4 millions; manufactured tobacco 619,689 pounds, against 558,543.

The output for the year to October 1 makes the following comparison: Cigars 513 millions, against 585 millions; paper cigarettes 1,108 millions, against 1,081 millions; little cigars 109 1-2 millions, against 180 3-4 millions; manufactured tobacco 33-8 million pounds, against 47-8 million pounds.
