THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Promptly Accepts the Latest Chinese Move.

JUST IN LINE WITH THE AMERICAN POLICY

Of Maintaining the Integrity of Chinese Territory and Settling the Manchurian Claims in Some Other Way.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The state department has not yet been advised officially of the terms of the alliance reported from London to have been reached between Germany and England, to maintain the territorial integrity of China and to keep the ports open.

What probably has happened, they say, has only been the reaffirmation of the principles already agreed upon between all the great powers interested in China.

The records show that all the great powers have accepted the principle of this guarantee of territorial integrity. Their expressions on the point of commercial freedom were not quite as explicit as in the case of territorial integrity, and it appears from the British-German agreement that particular care should now be taken to clear up any doubt on this point.

The United States will promptly adhere to the principles contained in the agreement as it is directly in line of our aspiration. If Russia can be brought to accept its terms, there can be no doubt that a substantial move will have been achieved toward the final settlement of Chinese trouble.

GERMANY AND GREAT BRITAIN

Form a Defensive Alliance to Protect Their Chinese Interests

THEY OPPOSE THE PRINCIPLE OF TERRITORIAL AGGRANDISEMENT

And Fall in With the American Policy of Maintaining the Integrity of the Chinese Empire Against Russian Encroachment.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Germany and England have formed an alliance to maintain the territorial integrity of China and to keep the ports open.

The terms of agreement were arrived at October 16 between Lord Salisbury and Count Van Hatzfeldt, the German ambassador to England.

Both governments agree that they will not make use of the present complication to obtain for themselves any territorial advantage in the Chinese dominion.

STRIKERS OBSTINATE

Still Refuse to Accept Terms Offered.

PRESIDENT MITCHELL TALKS IT OVER

Details of the Complications That Stand in the Way of a Peaceful Settlement of the Situation.

HARRINGTON, Pa., Oct. 20.—President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers, has practically admitted today that if every operator in the region were to post notices similar to those now being put up, such action would in itself probably not end the strike.

Asked if the companies would post such notices, what the next step would be, he replied:

If all the companies post notices it would clear up matters considerably. It would remove such obstacles as now present themselves.

Notices similar to those already posted by individual operators in this region were issued by three more companies.

THAT DEAR OLD FRIEND HANNA

The Defender of Republican Principles in Bryan's State Draws Very Small Crowds.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 20.—Small crowds, made up mostly of farmers, were present at Humphrey and Platt Center, and Senator Hanna divided his time between making short addresses and handshaking. A more extended stop was made at Columbus. In this district, the Populist vote is in large majority, and Senator Hanna spoke at some length to a large crowd.

At Schuyler, Senator Hanna was given a new name by the local chairman. "Fellow-citizens, I want to introduce to you the man who commands the sun sometimes, if he wants to," said he.

"Well, I wish I could command every sun of a gun of a Populist in this state," said Senator Hanna, amid laughter, "and that of every good Democrat, too, because, my friends, I want the people of this state and this county to fully appreciate and understand the importance of this election."

More rapid running time was made between Schuyler and North Bend. Here the train runs through the fertile valley of the Platte River, part of the time along its flat banks, and a speed of between 60 and 65 miles an hour was reached. At North Bend, Mr. Hanna was presented a big bunch of flowers by a delegation of little girls.

An enormous crowd turned out to hear Mr. Hanna at Fremont, where the speaking took place from the front steps of the courthouse, nearly every window of which displayed a large lithograph of Mr. Bryan. In his address here, Mr. Hanna was frequently interrupted by the blowing of a near-by whistle, and finally, with a twinkle in his eye, he said:

"It must be that Mr. Bryan has heard of that valve and is trying to shut me off."

Waboo, the last trip before reaching Lincoln, gave Senator Hanna the best reception of the day. Excursion trains from near-by towns and villages brought

In several hundred people, and the Senator was given an ovation as he stepped from the train. A unique feature of the procession from the depot to the speaking stand was three women's uniformed clubs, the Ida McKinley Club, of Waboo; the Edith Roosevelt Club, of Mead, and the Ashland Marching Club, all of the members being dressed in the National colors.

About 6 o'clock the special train arrived in Lincoln, where the party was to spend the night, and where three meetings had been arranged for.

SALEM POST OFFICE BUILDING

Bids and Specifications for the Federal Structure are Received.

The plans and specifications for the new federal postoffice building were received today. They call for a building 50 by 100 feet on the ground, with the main entrance on Church street opposite the courthouse.

There will be a side entrance on Court street and a drive way on State street for the mail wagons. There will be no entrance from Cottage street. It is to be a three story structure of red pressed brick and granite with caps and sills of concrete and terrazzo—a kind of red cement and marble chips. The government is now ready to receive bids from contractors.
