STARS AND STRIPES.

Flying Over Lifesaving Deeds Licensed by the Military Authorities.

Rev. Herbert S. Bigelow, of the Vine Street Congregational Church, preached his first sermon yesterday morning after his return from a lecturing tour through the Western States and the Pacific slope. "Lead Us Not Into Temptation" was his text. He concluded with practical applications to the industrial and governmental problems before the country today.

"That prayer," said he, "comes to you and to me from the coal miners of Pennsylvania. How would you like to support a family on 70 cents a day? That is the average wages of the miner. And probably, that is so in this land of plenty, wherever men work at simple manual labor \$5 a week for the men who carry the heaviest burdens! As some one has shown when deductions are made for rent and other absolute necessities what is left from the miner's earnings would not pay for the board of a horse at a stable. If that were God's fault then I suppose there would be nothing to do but to urge the miners to try to live the life of men on less than the brutes require.

"And we have no objections to the work of churches which are trying to help these men to live like men in the condition of beasts. But we know that a monopoly of the railroads and a monopoly of the mines drove these men to these conditions. We cry out to the waking conscience of the nation, demanding that these monopolies be owned by the people for the common good. We do it, not that men may have full dinnerpails, but because they are men. Because it is their right to enjoy the good of all their labor.

Social Justice Demanded.

"We demand social justice for man because there is no other condition in which righteousness can flourish. 'Lead us not into temptation,' these men are praying. Do not tempt us to destroy property. Do not tempt us to become enraged and take life. Do not tempt us to lose hope and waste our lives in drink. Do not tempt us to steal, when our wives and children have been reduced to want and are desperate. What shall we say to that prayer? We say to them: 'We cannot right your wrongs in a day. But one thing we know. We know that you are ground down by the injustice of laws that give to a few a monopoly of highways, water ways, wharves, building sites and business sites.' Monopoly is slavery. As soon as men know what it is they are going to rise up against it. What if the reformation does not come in our day? We are working for the right, for justice, for freedom. Tyranny we hate. We do not want to make men good. We are going to repeal the iniquitous laws that lead men into temptation, and force them to live in conditions where they are surrounded by evil. We shall do what we can to answer the prayer of these miners by giving all the strength

of our life for the truths we know can make them free."

After putting the same prayer into the mouth of a City Councilman, Mr. Bigelow contended that the average man in politics was as good as the average man in other pursuits, but his career was exposed to more temptations. It is our duty to take those temptations away by changing our political system. The citizens of our cities are directly responsible for much of the municipal corruption, first, because they retain an unsentimental system of voting, whereby unknown men are able to slip into office, and in the second place, where City Councilmen have been unwisely chosen, they are entrusted with power that should be exercised directly by the people. He stated on good authority, that when John P. Altgeld was governor of Illinois he was offered a bribe of a cool million to sign the "eternal monopolist" bill. He resisted the temptation, and came out of office unscathed. But we have no right to subject our public servants to such temptation. Amend the laws so that politicians cannot have the final word in these concerns. Let them be referred to a vote of the people.

Terrible Picture Revealed.

"Finally," he said in conclusion, "this prayer comes to us from the soldiers in our army, and when we allow them to enlist to wars that are not necessary we become responsible for the temptations and dangers of army life. It is well, perhaps, that we have only a moment to glance at the moral phase of this army life. In one of the principal hospitals at Manila 60,000 American soldiers have been treated, and of this number 10,000 were treated for venereal diseases. If the welfare of the virtuous Filipino is nothing of them, the fathers and mothers of this land ought to know the fact that the first year their boys were in Manila 800 respectable women from ports of the Orient reached there. They were procured by the same army authorities that sent the troops. They were licensed under the orders of the army doctors, some being quartered in houses for the exclusive use of officers; others in houses open only to men in the ranks.

"Two hundred of these brothels, with 600 inmates, are now under direct control of our military authorities, and the business is as much a part of army life as the canteen. No woman can open one of these houses without the consent of the military powers. They require the women who receive licenses to take out, in addition, a wine and beer license, and the army authorities collect \$4 a week from each one of these women.

"An eyewitness, whom I would believe even if partisan interests required half the press of the country to deny it, writes: Two streets are wholly taken up with houses of ill repute. At night these streets are filled with drunken soldiers, rioting, yelling Americans and half-naked women. In this settlement of last there is scarcely a house of prostitution which is not decorated with American flags, inside and out. Some of them have
