THE OREGON HOP GROWERS ASSOCIATION

And Board of Directors in Session at Salem.
 The Organization Hear a Report on the Book-keeping and a Report on the Affairs Have Been Conducted.

The board of directors of the Oregon Hop Growers Association met this afternoon at the Liberty street office of the association. The most important piece of business that came before the meeting was the report of H. B. Thielson, who has been elected by the directors to act as the bookkeeper of the association. Mr. Thielson made an exhaustive report showing the affairs of the association to have been conducted, and the accounts kept in a business-like manner. Considerable discussion of the affairs of the association was indulged in. It has been suggested that the office of the association here be closed for a few months to save expense, but the members of the association do not seem to approve of the idea. The office is now a source of information and a central point to which the hopgrowers naturally gravitate, and it helps to keep alive the sentiment in favor of co-operation among the producers.

Manager J. W. Winstanley expressed himself as well pleased with the work of the association. Though no pool has been formed this season, as was done last year, yet the existence of the association has strengthened and steadied the market and helped to give confidence to the growers. In the matter of supplies the association has saved a large sum for the growers this season both directly and indirectly. It has handled a large amount of supplies, furnishing them to the growers at the smallest possible cost, and this has also compelled dealers to keep down to a very small margin, thus saving money for all the growers. Mr. Winstanley thinks, however, that the formation of small local associations would help greatly to strengthen the position of the hop growers. These small associations could be more easily formed and would perhaps take better with individual growers, as they could have greater relative influence in the management and could exercise a closer supervision over the business affairs than is the case in an organization extending all over the state.

Leads Stopped.
 The leaks in the court house roof which were during considerable damage letting in water which rotted the timbers and spoiled the plastering, have been fixed by Knox and Murphy with exception of a few which were not found. These have been revealed by the recent rains and will be fixed.
