Memorial to Yorktown Heroes.
PERRISVILLE, N. Y., Oct. 23.—The Sons of the Revolution today dedicated the monument erected at Yorktown, near this city, in memory of the Revolutionary heroes buried there. The state of New York marks the burial place of Col. Christopher Greene and Major Ebenezer Flagg, of the First Rhode Island Regiment of the Continental army, who were killed two miles south of the spot, May 14, 1781, and of Lieut. Abraham Dyckman, a noted Westchester guide, who was mortally wounded at Eastchester March 3, 1782. Senator Dewey, Col. Asa Bird Gardiner and Judge Wood delivered addresses.

Big Orange Crop in Florida.
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 23.—The coming orange crop will be the largest marketed here since 1894. Conservative fruit men estimate that the crop will be fully one million boxes. Price will range from \$1.75 to \$2 per box on the tree, the crops of many large growers in South Florida having already been purchased for \$1.85 per box on the tree. Next year's crop will be still larger, and it is expected to reach a million and a half boxes.
