MURDERED BY A JANITOR

Young Girl at Jefferson Lured Into the Basement and Killed

ONE OF THE MOST DASTARDLY CRIMES COMMITTED IN MARION COUNTY

Clyde Vaughn Accused of the Deed — He Has Disappeared and Will Probably Meet With Lynch Law if Found — The People of Jefferson in a High Pitch of Excitement

Lulu Jones, a thirteen year old daughter of widow Jones, was called in to the basement of the Jefferson public schools at 9:40 this morning and brained with an axe in the hands of Clyde Vaughn, the janitor. She was alive when found but is unconscious and will probably die.

The girl that has probably been killed is a sister of ex-county superintendent Jones, and Prof. Chas. Jones of Salem. She was a bright scholar and of pleasant winning manners, and the murder has cast a deep gloom over the entire community.

A telephone message was received at the sheriff's office about 10:30 this morning bringing the first news of the tragedy and asking that Sheriff Durbin take steps to help run down the assassin, who had disappeared.

Story of the Dastardly Crime. Miss Jones was called out of the school room at 9:45 o'clock, and not returning was found twenty minutes later in the basement of the schoolhouse in a semi-unconscious condition, where she had been felled by a blow of an axe.

She was still alive when found by Principal Wiley and he with the assistance of the other teachers carried her to the residence of E. V. Johnson near by, where she is being cared for. The wound was on the temple over the right eye and was evidently a full blow from the corner of the back of an axe swung by a strong man. The skull was cut through and driven into the brain so that the blood flowed freely and the brain matter oozed out through the wound.

At noon she was still alive, but unconscious and no hope for her recovery. Local medical aid was not deemed sufficient to perform the necessary operation and a physician was sent for from Albany.

The skull will have to be trepanned, to relieve the brain from pressure if by any possibility she is to recover. The man accused of the deed is Clyde Vaughn, the janitor of the school, a young man aged 19 or 20, whose parents live at Jefferson. He has disappeared and search is being made. Excitement is running high. Parties are out in search all directions and if Vaughn is found it will be almost impossible to keep the people from taking justice in their hands.

NEXT SATURDAY'S FOOTBALL GAME

Eugene Acknowledges the Strength of Salem Team.

Game Will Be Close and Hotly Contested. Athletic Club Getting Its Men Into Shape to Do Some Good Work.

The Oregon Weekly, the University of Oregon paper, has this to say, touching the football game set for next Saturday: "The football season of 1900 will be formally opened next Saturday afternoon, when the 'Varsity' lines up against the team of the Capital Athletic Club, of Salem. This will be by far the best exhibition of sport ever seen in Eugene, for an examination as to the respective merits of the opposing elements shows the chances are about even. The Salem team contains some of the strongest players in the state; among them may be mentioned 'Spike' Young, a former Maltomah Guard; Gault, who played on O. A. C. in '97 and captained Pacific University last year; and Reuben Sanders, the Chemawa full back; Chaucery Bishop, a young brother of the 'Varsity' veteran, Jessup, who played on U. O.'s pioneer team, and Harry Olinger, formerly of Willamette University, will also be found in the line-up. Jarvis, Judd and Williams, three heavy men, are trying for line positions, so the clubmen should bring up a most formidable representation."

The 'Varsity' men are gradually rounding into form and ought to put up a good, snappy game on Saturday. Coach Kaarberg has been drilling the men on the finer points of play, and he is pleased at their rapid progress. Wagner, who has been on the shelf for a week, will probably be able to play, although his condition is not the best. Edwards will re-appear today after an absence of three weeks. He will probably be able to resume his playing, although it is not thought that he will be in form by Saturday. Waddell has discontinued playing for the season, but the squad has been strengthened by the addition of several new candidates. Among them are two of the renowned Templons, who have helped to make U. O. athletics famous. Goodall, a promising candidate for guard, and McClanahan, the veteran quarter-back. About twenty-five men have been showing up for daily work, and some exciting practice games have been played.

Coach Kaarberg is confident that his men will give a good account of themselves, but is of the opinion that the game will be close and hotly contested.

The Salem team was out for practice last evening, and drilled on the signals for the first time, Jarvis, who arrived yesterday, taking a hand in the game. The boys are confident that by the last of the week they can put up a game that will give their opponents something to do.

It is probable that a practice game will be played with the Chemawa team some day this week, though it was found impracticable to have it today. It would be extremely difficult for the members of the Salem team to get away from their business for the half day necessary to go down to Chemawa for a practice game, and it is hoped that the Chemawa boys will be accommodating to the extent of piling into the big carry-all and coming up here.
