PRICES OF MEATS, WAGES AND OTHER PRODUCTS.

The Salem correspondent of the Oregonian sends to that paper an interview with a Salem butcher, giving figures touching the prices of meats in 1894 and now, drawing therefrom an argument in favor of Mr. McKinley's election to the presidency.

The Journal has no thought of questioning the accuracy of the figures given, but before passing to a discussion of the conclusions reached, would remark that as a comparison of prices under the two administrations, of Cleveland and McKinley, was intended, it would be interesting to know how the books happened to "fall open" at 1894, rather than at 1896. The question arises: were not meat prices higher in 1896 than in 1894, showing that even under Cleveland the prices of meat had materially recovered from the extreme depression of 1894.

Again, if prices in the first half of Mr. Cleveland's administration were taken, why not also in the first half of Mr. McKinley's?

As a matter of fact any one at all informed about the stock business on this coast knows that it has always been subject to great fluctuations. It is not like wheat farming where the crop is planted and gathered in the same year, and where the supply of seed and acreage is practically unlimited.

A year or two of good prices for meat causes men and capital to turn their attention to stock. The calves and young stock are raised instead of being killed and all the ranges are stocked. By the time the "crop" is ready for market the country is full of cattle, and the price comes down. But the over supply can not be at once "shut off," and the price continues to fall. Then people want to get out of the stock business and their entire herds are thrown on the market, depressing it still more.

Cattle become a drug in the market, especially young cattle. Farmers butcher their calves instead of raising them and veal gets down to 3¢ cents a

quarter, or 6½ cents per pound, just half of the present retail price. He certainly had a margin of profit when he paid \$2.28 per hundred for dressed beef and got ten cents per pound for round steak.

But this butcher's profits have little to do with voting for McKinley; as little as McKinley has had to do with the fluctuation of the cattle market. Had Mr. Bryan been elected four years ago the movement outlined in this article would have brought the price of meat up, and no matter who is elected this time the market will again go down to bed-rock inside of the next four years.

Is there a surplus of cattle to ship out of the state does the Oregon producer have to take what the market will give him?

Is not the advance in the retail price of meats to the consumer, whether it be a family or a restaurant, out of all proportion to the increased earnings of common labor?

Have wages paid in Salem butchers' shops been advanced in proportion to the advance in the price of meat?

Have not wages been actually reduced compared to the time when meats sold for much less money at Salem and the people actually bought more?

If the farmer is getting more for his cattle and sheep, is he not getting less for his grain, and is he not paying more for sugar, hardware, taxes, drygoods and other necessities and luxuries, than he was in 1894 or 1896, or in 1890?
