HE HAD A PRESENTIMENT

A. A. Bashor Knocked Overboard in Berlin While On His Way Home From a Prospecting Trip.

As announced in THE JOURNAL Monday, Messrs. Gilbert Bros., received a letter from Seattle that conveyed sad news to one family in this city. The letter was written by E. P. Wilbur, of Chico, Montana, a returning Alaska gold-hunter, and it gave the details of the death at sea, by accident, of A. A. Bashor of North Salem. Mr. Bashor had gone to Alaska on a second trip for gold and he leaves a wife and three children, two daughters, Gertrude and Chloe, and one son, Elmer, all of them residing in North Salem. He was 43 years old, and belonged to the Hubbard lodge of Old Fellows. The family was apprised of the death of the husband and father by Rev. W. C. Kantner, pastor of the First Congregational church.

The text of the letter received by Gilbert Bros., is as follows:

"I regret to inform you of the misfortune that has befallen a family of your town. A. A. Bashor, of your place, was lost at sea on a trip from Bristol Bay to Dutch Harbor in the early part of this month. There was a party of us who had been up the Nushagak river and its tributaries, on a prospecting trip. On our return about the last of September we were all looking for some way to get out, when a small schooner came there and offered to carry eleven persons to Dutch Harbor.

"Mr. Bashor and myself were among the party of eleven who took passage. When some distance east of Unvik Pass, Mr. Bashor was knocked overboard by the swinging of the fork of the main-sail as the vessel was trying to go about in quite a strong gale. Timbers and boxes were thrown overboard and a boat was gotten off, but to no avail. Mr. Bashor was talking with one of the party, named McMullen, of going to White Horse, so he (McMullen) took charge of his effects and will, I presume, write you or his family. I had no heart to break such news to his wife and children, so write you as I had often heard him speak of you during the two months we were together.

"In concluding I will say that I have never known a more pronounced case of presentiment. Mr. Bashor was told to say, several days before the accident, that he hardly thought he would ever see his wife and family again.

OREGON PROHIS

Open the Campaign in Behalf Of Their Own Ticket.

A PLEA FOR JOHN G. WOOLLEY

Rev. Ray Palmer Delivers a Red-hot Address—Scores McKinley for Allowing Liquor to Go Into the Philippines.

The Woman's Christian Temperance rooms on Court street were crowded Monday evening to hear the Rev. Ray Palmer discuss the issues of this campaign in behalf of the Prohibition candidate for the presidency, John G. Woolley.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by the Rev. Ronald McKillop, after which a quartette consisting of Mrs. Henry Vandervoort, Mr. and Mrs. Uri Lehman and Will Lehman, rendered a campaign song with fine effect.

President Oliver Joy introduced the speaker of the evening who spoke for a little over an hour. The Rev. Palmer is a ready and forcible speaker and carried the sympathies of his audience, as was evidenced by frequent applause.

He commenced his address with an eulogy of America as a country containing the greatest natural advantages of any on earth. Then he at once attacked the great evil which is the special object of the prohibitionists' aversion.

He placed first the duty of parents to control their boys and keep them from falling into bad habits and especially to set them a good example, and he emphasized the importance of keeping the young man from taking the first drink.

He thought it time for the churches to either pull down their steeples and close their doors and cease their work for humanity, or else to turn their backs upon the liquor traffic wherever found and devote themselves to its suppression.

He then turned to the political phase of the question.

He said that both the old parties are ridden by the great brewers of the country; that they make their demands and get them. He scouted the idea that the salvation of the country depends upon the election of either Mr. McKinley or Mr. Bryan. He said the question of the day was not imperialism, or the trusts, but the liquor traffic. He said the Republican party especially was in league with the rum traffic. He poured some very hot shot into those church members who "pray for temperance and vote for temperance." He thought it time to lay aside the issues of the civil war, and take up live issues. Because a man carried a musket to free the slaves was no reason to vote the Republican ticket and enslave the white man.

He said Mr. McKinley was a good man but he was ruled by the brewers of this country. To prove it he cited the fact that as soon as our flag went up on the island of Luzon, the brewers went to President McKinley for permission to send liquor to the Philippines and he told them to go. The people of the Philippines are being transferred into drinkards by the American saloon by the permission of president McKinley.

He also found fault with Mr. Bryan not devoting himself to the suppression of the liquor traffic.

He claimed that the prohibitory law of Kansas is a success.

He expressed the greatest confidence that the American people will settle the liquor question and settle it right, and ended with an eloquent appeal to his hearers to have the courage of their convictions and to vote for John G. Woolley.

There is no doubt that if any of his hearers were on the fence, Mr. Palmer's talk must have had a strong influence upon them.
