HON. TOM TONGUE

A Few Plain Words With Our Representative in Congress.

HE WILL EXPOUND MCKINLEYISM AT THE ARMORY THURSDAY NIGHT

Another Distinguished Ex-Silverite Talks Tonight --- Nothing Small About the Journal, It Asks for Them a Courteous Hearing.

Salem is to be honored by the presence of two Republican leaders this week. The old Republican warhorse, ex-senator Mitchell, who committed the whole northwest Pacific coast to free silver, before the party dropped to the gold standard, speaks at the armory this evening. Another distinguished ex-silverite, Hon. Thos. Tongue, the able representative in congress from this district, is billed for tomorrow evening, Thursday at the city hall armory. These two ex-silverites will abuse Bryan by the yard and tell of the wonderful prosperity their party has brought upon the country, and Republicans will be expected to attend and swallow what is put up for them.

But that is no crime in a free country, and while THE JOURNAL does not agree with these gentlemen in what they are pleased to advocate for the salvation of humanity, it bespeaks for them a cordial welcome from the Republicans of this city—the strongest Republican city of a Republican state. It can even forgive them for having been silver men and yet it wants to warn them that they must not deceive the people too far with the idea that the present administration has given the country a gold standard currency.

Tom Tongue is a smart lawyer and probably the best man we can have in congress. If we have got to put up with a republican congressman of the regulation stripe, he is the best ideal of modern royalistic-imperialistic statesmanship—an ex Briton, a national banker and a corporation lawyer, an ex-silverite. No wonder he is a power with the present administration. But, to the gold standard bill. We challenge him to deny that it is not a rank fraud. It is not a gold bill at all. It is proof that the gold democrats were hanged in 1890 into voting for McKinley only to have a trust tariff slapped onto them, and then a national bank bill passed in the name of gold standard. Tom

Tongue you were there and you can't deny it. You legislated in your own interest, and will admit it if you tell the truth.

You will make a Republican speech, but you are no longer a Republican, although your admirers will pack that armory and holler themselves hoarse for you and imagine you are giving them straight goods. You will defend the present administration for being Republican, when it has stood by and allowed two Republics in South Africa to be wiped out in the interest of British expansion and gold greed, when you know that every representative of this government sent to South Africa, even an assistant secretary of state, came back and took the stump for the sturdy Republicans of South Africa whom you will disown.

Of course, you will uphold levying tariffs on our own possessions and all that sort of thing that the supreme court of the United States will knock so silly you will regret you ever voted for it. But you are a good Republican and have to vote as the caucus decrees. But we will not quarrel with you about these things. You stood in enough to get us the government building at Salem, and under the present high state of prosperity that is about the only kind of improvements that are possible.

An opposition paper, we would show you every courtesy that is due to our congressman. It is a fundamental principle of the American system of government that every official owes every courtesy to every other citizen, no matter how humble he may be. But you will pardon us for calling the attention of the public to what we deem are mistaken policies on your part, and are not in harmony with the principles the Republican party was founded on. We will again go out of our way to ask all our readers to get out and hear you, although that is a courtesy not frequently manifested by your side toward the opposition.

Many householders have appealed to the city authorities for protection in the last few days, and it is likely that a number of special policemen will be put on tomorrow night and that Sheriff Durbin will also put out some men to protect those parts of the city lying outside of the corporate limits.

The city authorities have decided to put on 10 special officers as above indicated.

"Knox successfully engaged Dewet October 27. During the Boer retreat Knox caught Dewet in the Rensburg drift. The Boers lost considerably and left two guns and three wagons in Knox's hands. Another ammunition wagon was blown up by a shell. The British casualties were nil."

ROOSEVELT ON FORCE IN POLITICS

ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 30.—The greatest enthusiasm of the entire trip was manifested in the city and at the train. This was due partly to the presence of Cornell College students.

The Governor dwelt upon the features of the McKinley Administration. He said to one of the committee: "I shall answer all questions in a good natured manner." In the crowd, circulated had been distributed asking him his record as to assertions that he was alleged to have made regarding farmers and laborers, and containing a piece of verse called "Ruffian Rider Roosevelt."

It was about an hour after the Governor arrived at the stand that he got well into his speech, the boys insisting upon singing college airs to campaign words and giving their yells.

The Governor said: "I want to call your attention to one or two phases of the campaign, but before doing so I want to preface what I say by a correction of a local Democratic paper. That paper stated in appropriate headlines that I had said four years ago that I would lead an army to prevent the inauguration of Bryan, if elected."

It seems to me, speaking seriously, a little humiliating, even to have to deny what is not merely a falsehood, but a preposterous falsehood, and those who cried it either do not know or ought to know that there is no truth in it; not merely that I never said it, but that I never dreamed of saying it.

I never said anything that by the most violent efforts could have been twisted into a statement of that character. Now, I trust that paper will not think that this is an evasive answer. If I can make it more positive, I will."

Enclosing, he said: "I want you to apply this football motto to civil life. Don't foul, don't shirk, but hit the line hard. In other words, act decently and honestly, but don't commit any act of trickery; don't do anything of any kind whatsoever for the purpose of political gain that will smirch the name of American citizenship."

If there exists a class in the community for which I have little use, it is the class of the timid good, the good people who are mighty good in their own parlors, but do not come out to do a man's work in the world. You have got to have virtue; but you must be a man."

"You're the stuff," said the audience.

DEBS AND WOOLEY

Expected to Be About Equal in Clackamas County.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 30.—J. D. Stevens, of the Socialistic movement in this county championing Debs' candidacy for President, estimated that the party would poll about 250 votes. The greater portion of these votes will be cast by Bryan Electors in the event that there were no Socialistic nominations. However, the Prohibitionists claim an equal number of votes in the county, which will draw more or less from the Republicans. At the June election the highest Prohibition candidate for Representative received 218 votes, and the lowest 188, so that the vote for Wooley cannot be expected to lessen the Republican majority in June to any great extent.
