Knight was chosen to serve on this occasion because he had officiated as clergyman at the wedding of the parents of the groom and several generations of the family of Dr. and Mrs. Jessup. He performed an impressive religious ceremony. The Genser orchestra played soft and appropriate music during the prayer, when the audience arose while he pronounced the words that made them one, and during the benediction when the bride and groom knelt at the altar. It was universally expressed opinion that of all the handsome assistants, the bride was easily the handsomest, and that no handsomer couple ever stood up in a Salem church to be made man and wife.

The service opened by singing of the bridal hymn by Mrs. F. K. Anson, who appeared in the balcony over the altar, which was richly decorated with autumn leaves, palms and ferns, with a lovers' knot in scarlet ribbons. The accompanying music from the screened bower made the very effective rendition of this song a singularly appropriate introduction to what followed. The beautiful decorations extended over the arches of the doorway and were put up under the superintendence of Mrs. Williamson and Mrs. Will Brown.

As the bridal procession entered the orchestra played the wedding march from Lohengrin. The Mendelssohn march was played as the bridal party moved out on the other side of the church in solemn, slow and measured tread. The ceremony had been perfectly rehearsed and was perfectly carried out and many exclaimed in voluntery "how pretty," as the long procession filed out to their carriages which bore them to a carefully prepared reception at the Jessup mansion on State street.

The parlors were a perfect bower of floral beauty, draped in nautism on the vines.

The bridal procession was formed of the ushers in pairs proceeding to the altar, wearing immense white buttonholes, followed by the bridesmaids, Misses White and Hill wore pale yellow, Misses Carter and Hill pale blue, and Misses Bean and Coshaw pink. The maids all had corsage bouquets to match.

Mrs. McNary, the matron of honor, was gowned in cream and carried red carnations. These dresses were all for the occasion and most effective under the brilliant lights of the church. The menu of refreshments was rich and up to the high standard of Mrs. Jessup as an entertainer.

Dr. and Mrs. Jessup took the late train for Albany amid continued festivities and congratulations showered upon them until they disappeared from view in the Pullman. They will remain at Albany a few days and will return to Salem Tuesday when they will be at the Jessup home to see their friends.
