A LIVELY MEETING

Prohibition Rally Develops Some Surprises.

TWO SPEAKERS NOT ON THE BILLS

Take Issue With the Probs on Their Own Platform and Make Things Interesting for the Spectators.

The Prohibitionists held another rally Wednesday evening at the W. C. T. U. rooms. The attendance was small but it compared favorably with that at John H. Mitchell's meeting the night before, and before the evening was over the liveliest unpremeditated joint discussion that has been seen in Salem.

Two speakers not on the program were heard, and neither of them endorsed prohibition.

The program opened with a song and prayer, and there was also a solo well rendered by U. J. Lehman, and very enjoyable recitations by Mrs. C. L. Wait and Mrs. U. J. Lehman.

There were two speakers on the program, Rev. Lockhart, of Lafayette, and Rev. Morehead, of the Lincoln circuit. Both gentlemen seemed very much in earnest. Both devoted considerable time to the canteen question, and enlarged upon the culpability of President McKinley in his encouragement of the liquor traffic, drawing dark pictures of conditions in Manila.

After Mr. Morehead sat down, the chairman announced that this concluded the program and invited any one else who could think of anything to say to come forward and say it. Mr. Fred Kandret, the shoemaker, arose and asked that the prohibition platform be read. This caused quite a flutter. Chairman Oliver Jory reluctantly admitted that he didn't have a platform about him, but after some delay a copy was found.

In the meantime some one called for E. C. Minton. Mr. Minton professed not to be in a speaking mood, but after considerable urging and an invitation from the chair he came to ward—and he spoke.

It was not, however, just the speech that they were looking for, but quite the contrary. It was a rousing old hand and forcible demonstration of the fact that there are other issues than prohibition before the people, and he claimed that a comparatively small part of our ills flow from the liquor traffic. He thought that the Pennsylvania miners, working for \$250 a year, could not be charged with poverty because they spent their money for liquor. He cited an instance of a strike in San Francisco of girls who had been making overalls a 6 cents per pair, while the son of their employer gave a banquet costing \$1000. He claimed that our girls needed protection as much as our big, husky boys in the Philippines.

He said that when a farmer asked him why he should be obliged to pay \$7 for a plow which cost but 97 cents to manufacture if he should tell the farmer "liquor traffic" the farmer would call him a fool. He advised them to help get the initiative and referendum, and then the people could enact and enforce prohibition whenever they should want it.

In fact Mr. Minton threw a double-act bombshell into camp in his 20-minute talk.

Then in the horror-stricken silence which ensued when he sat down, Fred Kandret arose and he asked permission to say a few words, which was granted.

Mr. Kandret covered considerable ground in his talk, going into the question of "Romanism," among other things. He also advocated the idea of making prohibition a party issue, and advised his hearers to go back to the earlier method of prayer. He also opposed any union of church and state in the way of Sunday laws or any other restriction of personal liberty in religious matters.

After Mr. Kandret sat down Chairman Jory read the platform of the Prohibition party. Then he whacked Mr. Minton's knuckles for making a Socialist speech in a Prohibition meeting, but was rebuffed by Gid. Sherwood that he had invited Mr. Minton to speak.

Then Mr. Minton asserted that it was all right; he didn't mind a little criticism; when he spoke he usually spoke his convictions, and considered that the proper way to do business.

Mr. Lockhart gave some parting admonition and the meeting adjourned with everyone a side awake.

AN OLD SOLDIER

TAKES A SHOT

At the Hon. Thomas Tongue on the Old Green-back Question.

Hon. Thos. H. Tongue—Dear Sir: A few years ago you spoke at the old armory in Salem. As near as I can remember you said: "I will admit that it may be possible for the government to issue paper money, make it a legal tender, and compel people to take it. But I have no hesitation in saying that it would be repudiation."

I stepped forward and said: "About five hundred thousand of our old comrades enlisted before the enactment of the legal tender act, when only silver and gold coin were a legal tender, and of course our contract with the government was for coin. We could not receive, vary, or change our obligation except under penalty of death, or imprisonment for life at Dry Tortugas, for desertion. Then the government issued partial legal tender paper money, called greenbacks, and authorized banks to issue their notes, not a legal tender for debts or taxes, and neither redeemable in coin, and worth, as compared with the full legal tender coin promised, about 50 cents on the dollar, and compelled us to accept both these kinds of paper money at par, and as full compensation for our services, our limbs and our health. Then I asked: Did the government repudiate its obligation to its defenders?"

Then from the throats of Republicans all over the hall rang out: "Put him out! Put him out! Hip, hip, hurrah!" When this little tempest in the Republican teatop had subsided you were standing with your back to me pronouncing an eloquent apostrophe to the stars, and failed to answer my question. 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A FOOTBALL CHALLENGE SENT

To Give the Eugene Boys a Chance to Retire Their Fortunes.

The result of a number of undignified publications has been a challenge issued by Manager F. W. Durbin, of the Salem team, to the Eugene eleven, signifying the readiness of the Salem football team to meet the U. of O. team on any gridiron in the state. The challenge is as follows:

"Mr. L. L. Goodrich, Eugene, Oregon:

"Dear Sir: The Capital Amateur Athletic Football Team hereby challenges the U. of O. Football Team for a return game, to be played on any gridiron in the state of Oregon, at any date that you should see convenient to set for your team, and will agree to accept any referee who you may desire, or you may submit three names and we will submit the same number under seal; if we fail to agree then we will make a choice outside of the state. In other words, we will agree to almost any terms in order to get a return game. Very respectfully,

"F. W. Durbin, Manager."

At the same time Manager Durbin wrote the following open letter to the Eugene Guard:

"To the Editor of the Eugene Guard, Eugene, Oregon:

"Dear Sir: Would you be kind enough to give space in your valuable paper for the enclosed challenge? The Capital Amateur Athletic Football Team have very much to issue the challenge, but we have been forced to the matter by newspaper reports from your city. I assure you there is no ill feeling existing among our boys, for they feel as though they were royally treated in your college town, but it seems that the citizens of Eugene are very ungrateful towards Mr. Clarence Bishop, who acted as referee in the game on the 27th inst. We feel as though Mr. Bishop has been done a great injustice by the several newspaper correspondents from your city, and we only ask for a return game to show that we are Eugene's supporters."

"Trusting you will receive this communication in the same spirit that it is written. I am respectfully,

Discussing the matter of the recent football game, and the action of the Eugene players, coach and correspondents, Mr. Durbin, last evening, gave out the following signed statement:

"After reading Mr. Kaarsburg's correspondence in today's Oregonian, I am surprised that a man of his standing as a gentleman and authority on football, would take the position of a kindergarten sportsman in accusing the Salem team of playing dirty ball, and also questioning the integrity and honor of Mr. Clarence Bishop, who acted as referee in the game between Salem and Eugene, on the 27th inst. Although not an eye witness to the game, I understand Mr. Kaarsburg did not accuse the Salem team of unfairness at the time the alleged unfair play of pushing the ball back over the line, nor did he accuse Mr. Bishop of unfair decisions during the game. But for an excuse of the defeat he takes the advantage of newspaper gossip in order to gain cheap notoriety for himself and team."

"It was by the request of Manager Goodrich of the U. of O. team that Mr. Bishop acted as referee. He stated in a letter to me that Mr. Bishop was a gentleman of high standing in their city and was honored for his truthfulness and integrity, and he was the most satisfactory person that they knew of in these parts, to referee the game. Upon the solicitation of the U. of O. team and the Capital Amateur Athletic Club, Mr. Bishop acted as referee, for despatch. I consider it gentlemanly and unsportsmanlike of the citizens of Eugene, and the managers of the U. of O. team to accuse Mr. Bishop at this time of being dishonest, and to seek to stir into any newspaper controversy, but my challenge, which I have issued, explains the position of the Salem team. If the Eugene team feel a ill they have been robbed, we are more than willing to give them an opportunity of playing a return game and settling our superiority."

Coach Kaarsburg's Statement.

In a letter to a Portland paper Coach Kaarsburg considers the score of minor importance, and looks to the benefits his men acquired from the contest. His eleven learned several valuable lessons which will greatly improve the team work. He said:

"I am highly pleased with the showing our eleven made. I expected to give to win, but I am not surprised that they failed to do so against such weight. The Salem line averaged 20 pounds heavier than ours. The sloppy field and several unfair decisions defeated us. Smith certainly made a touchdown in the first half, and the Salem men sneaked the ball back over the line. That was the dirtiest trick I ever saw on a football field."

"Salem scored on the fourth down. The score should have been five to nothing, with the nothing on Salem's side. I don't think the rotten decisions were intentional; but we played in hard luck. I am proud of the Oregon team, and I think they can play ball with anything their size in the country."

It is to be hoped this will end playing the game in the newspapers. The Eugene sporting people had done far better to represent that the Salem team played a strong game and are a strong team. That is the true view of an opponent for a defeated team to take before the public."
