SOME PLAIN QUESTIONS

Put to the Hon. Thomas H. Tongue
Thursday Evening.

A SQUARE ANSWER DEMANDED
TO A FEW SQUARE INQUIRIES

From the Ablest Republican Congressman that Has Ever
Represented this District from
Oregon.

Congressman Thos. H. Tongue speaks at Salem, Thursday night, in the interest of the Republican party. He will no doubt fill the Armory with his admirers and they will no doubt endorse all he tells them. He is an able man and a fine representative of the pro-British imperialistic tendencies of the Republican party of today. If the Republican party is not defeated for its departure from bedrock Republican principles, he is probably destined to represent this district in congress, while we have a Republican congressman, and we wish to say that for the kind he is the best man the Republicans can send there and we say this without any reservations whatever, and with the highest courtesy and respect for the Hon. Tom Tongue.

The editor of THE JOURNAL does not imagine himself a match for so able a lawyer and orator as Tongue, but would like to show how the modern apostle of Republicanism has wandered from the faith of the fathers in this consequential matter as the treatment of struggling Republics, the treatment of new territory, the surrendering of hundreds of square miles of Alaska to England, the levying of tariffs on our island possessions, the refusal to give our possessions a territorial form of government as advocated by Mr. Corbett, and other important matters.

But we are going to ask you a few hard questions and we shall enjoy seeing you answer them or dodge them to the best of your ability. We shall do this in the greatest spirit of courtesy and with only the best of good will toward you personally, and solely for the purpose of being enlightened ourselves if that is possible, as we do not pretend to have solved all these problems, or that you have not honestly acted to the best of your ability and intelligence on all these matters.

Mr. Tongue, you will no doubt tackle the trust question. We would like to ask you one point blank question, and get a square answer. If you, Mr. Tongue, were on a congressional investigation committee, and the great coal miners' strike in Pennsylvania was before your committee, and the fact was made apparent that as a result of that strike the great coal syndicates had reduced the price of powder to the miners from \$2.75 a keg to \$1.50 a keg, would you put the question to the syndicates: WHO HAS BEEN GETTING THE \$1.25 A KEG DIFFERENCE?

Would you put the question, has not this \$1.25 a keg been a clear robbery of the half-starved miner? Has it not been kept out of the living of his wretched family?

Have not the coal trust and the powder trust, made possible by Republican legislation, enabled the powder trust and the coal trust to thus rob labor in this instance, and probably in thousands of other ways?

In other words would you ask questions of the coal barons and the trusts that would embarrass them, and compel them to surrender some of their millions they have taken from labor and the consumer?

To come nearer home, the sugar trust is taking \$1.50 a sack out of the people. The people are getting four to five pounds less sugar for a dollar than they were four years ago under the Wilson tariff.

Who gets this robbery on one of the common necessities of life? Do the laboring men who work in the sugar refineries get it? They may get a little of it, but does not the sugar trust get the bulk of the advance and do you not favor tariff protection of the sugar trust?

Of course, you can twist and squirm around and make your partisans believe what you want to tell them. But tell the audience who gets the difference on powder and sugar? Does any of it leak into Bryan's campaign fund? Of course, it would be disloyal for a Bryanite to insinuate that a cent of trust money got into McKinley's campaign fund. That would be pulling down the sacred flag all stained with the blood of our patriotic soldiers, etc.

FIRST DOOR NORTH OF POSTOFFICE.

COMMANDER BOOTH OF THE SALVATIONISTS.

Coming to America to Take Charge of That Organization. In New York, Nov. 1.—General William Booth, commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army, is coming here next September to take practically the control of the Salvation Army in the United States for at least six months. This announcement was made last night by Commander Booth-Tucker who arrived here from England on the steamer Teutonic. He went there early in October to invite the General to come over and assist in the solution of problems which the Salvation Army is endeavoring to solve. One of the chief problems he said was that of organizing and maintaining the farm colonies which the Army is establishing in some of the states.

"The Army which has the power under its charter to issue bonds," the Commander said "may issue bonds to the amount of \$150,000 to put the colonies on a firm basis. It has been said that the poor in the cities do not want to go into the country to live. They do want to go into that country."

"I have 5,000 more applications for homes in our colonies than I can grant. General Booth is a great organizer and will be able to aid us in a satisfactory solution of the problems."

When asked as to the rumor that he was to be transferred to some other command, Commander Booth-Tucker said he knew nothing of it.

DANGEROUS TO NAVIGATION.

By Associated Press to the Journal. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—Officers of the fish commissioners' steamer Albacore state that nearly all the North Sea islands are mischarted from two to a dozen miles, making steering by chart extremely dangerous.

In the middle Behring sea, the Albacore discovered a bank 200 fathoms below the surface, while the charts showed 2000 fathoms depth. This bank is from five to ten miles in extent.
