M'KINLEY CARRIES MARION COUNTY

The Great Landslide Which Sweeps the Apostle of Imperial-ism Into the White House Extends to This Neck of the Woods

Tuesday night was a time of rejoicing for Salem Republicans and they made the most of it. After the first few dispatches showing gains for Bryan in some of the Eastern states the bulletins all came with a different complexion.

It was first seen that New York had endorsed the advance agent of prosperity, and the Bryan men were obliged to fall back on Illinois. But it soon became apparent that not only Illinois but Indiana had gone the same way, and then it could be seen that Bryan's case was hopeless.

The Bryan sympathizers gathered mostly at the Hotel Willamette, where THE JOURNAL's bulletins were posted as fast as received; while the McKinleyites were attracted to the place where the returns were thrown on a screen with a magic lantern.

As the evening advanced the street crowd became more and more demon-

strative and tin horns and other instruments were utilized for the purpose of making a noise.

It was a gorgeous victory and the Republicans were fully entitled to whoop it up—and they did it.

In the mean time the Bryan men slid out singly and in pairs and went home and went to bed.

So far as obtainable the returns from Marion county will be found tabulated below.

THE BULLETINS TUESDAY EVENING

Indicated McKinley Was Lead- in the Race

Returns Now Indicate that the States of Ohio, Indiana, Nebraska and Kentucky May Be Very Close on Final Result.

The receipt of Western Union and Associated Press bulletins at hotel Willamette on Tuesday evening drew a large crowd and excitement ran high as reports came in favoring first one side and then the other. Many farmers were in from quite a distance, some bringing their children to hear the news.

In the talk of those present it developed that quite a number of business men and some capitalists did not go to the polls at all. There was much real sadness visible as the returns indicated McKinley's election.

The returns as they came in up to midnight are summarized below for the states that are important and doubtful:

CHICAGO.—At 9 p. m. Chairman Rowe, of the Republican State Central committee, said that Illinois has been carried by McKinley by at least 100,000. Ex-Congressman Hendrichsen, who was at the democratic state headquarters, conceded the state to McKinley by not more than 40,000, but claimed that advice showed that Altshuler, democrat, candidate for governor, was elected by 10,000.

The total vote in the city was: McKinley 180,970, Bryan 172,524, Woolley 3335, Debs 2022, Barker 180, Maloney 235, Ellis 90.

Returns from 310 Congressional districts show the election of 168 Republicans, 139 Democrats, one Fusionist, one Silverite and one Populist. Of the remaining 46 districts, 23 are represented by Republicans, 17 by Democrats, one by a Fusionist. Should no more Republican gains be made, the next House will be composed of 189 Republicans, 159 Democrats, 7 Populists and 2 Silverites, but indications are that the Republican majority will be still further increased by later returns.

OMAHA.—At midnight 200 precincts out of 1611 in the state had returned results of today's election, 70 of these being from Omaha and Douglas county. A majority of them give Republican gains, which, if they hold good throughout the state, will indicate a Republican plurality of from 2000 to 5000. However, the fusionists say these returns are not significant of the real result, and that the outlying districts will overcome these gains and give the state to Bryan by from 5000 to 8000.

INDIANAPOLIS.—A conservative estimate at 12:30 a. m. places McKinley's plurality in Indiana at 30,000. The entire state Republican ticket is elected. Democratic congressmen have been elected in the 2d and 3d districts, while the Republican Congressional candidates were successful in the 6th, 8th, 10th, 11th and 13th districts.

RENO, Nev.—Late Returns throughout the state indicate that Bryan will carry the state by from 1200 to 1500 and that Newlands, dem., is re-elected by a safe majority. Washoe County, supposed to be largely Republican went Democratic and from present indications the Republicans will not elect a man on the ticket.

COLUMBUS, O.—McKinley has carried his own state without doubt by an increased majority, but at midnight it is impossible to give the figures, owing to the unusually meager returns received. The democrats have gained about 3000 in Cleveland, as much in Cincinnati, and less in some cities. The republicans have gained in the rural districts, in this city, and in Canton, the home of Chairman Dick, and in a few other cities.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., At midnight the result of the election in Kentucky was in doubt, with both sides claiming the state and Presidential tickets. The Democrats may be considered to have a trifle better of the argument. Ex-Governor McCrory, chairman of the Democratic state campaign committee, said: "Bryan and Beckham have carried Kentucky by safe majorities. The Democrats have elected nine out of eleven Congressmen, including Gilbert. In the eight, Kehoe in the Ninth and Rhea in the Third districts."

RICHMOND, Va., Virginia's majority in favor of Bryan is about 20,000. The majorities for the Congressional ticket will aggregate more than this. The indications are that certainly nine, and probably all of the Democratic candidates for Congress are elected. The Ninth District is at midnight the only one in doubt, and the chances there are in favor of the Democrats.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va.—William O. Dawson, chairman of the Republican State Committee, at 1:30 o'clock estimates McKinley's plurality at 17,000, and the election of all four Republican Congressmen and a majority of 20 on joint ballot in the Legislature, insuring the reelection of Senator Elkins.

THE CUBAN CONVENTION

Sends a Telegram of Gratitude to the American People.

By Association Press to the Journal HAVANA, Nov. 7.—The Cuban Constitutional Convention reassembled this afternoon and adopted resolutions to send to President McKinley the following telegram:

"The Cuban Constitutional Convention has the honor and satisfaction to respectfully salute the President and Congress of the United States and to express its sentiments of gratitude to the American people."

General Maximo Gomez, in a letter to Havana papers, says he will not accept office under the Cuban republic.

"As a revolutionist," he declares, "I have always understood that from the moment the revolution was over, my mission will be terminated. What remains to be done to attain the felicity of the land is not a matter to be decided by cavalry charges. The problems pressing for solution must be solved with prudence and calmness and without ardent patriotism that might be necessary at other times."

"Cuba now presents a great field for improvement which must be carried out judiciously. It is a field where all her children can work. My retired life and my persistent refusal of positions that have been offered me should be sufficient proof that my determination is irrevocable. I firmly believe the highest distinction which a man who has fought so much can take with him to the grave is the esteem of all, and this can only be attained by not governing anybody or anything."
